CONFERENCE SPEAKERS

- **Gordon Graham**
Risk-management consultant

Gordon Graham started his 33-year career in law enforcement as a California Highway Patrol officer, rising through the ranks to become captain. While working, he also attended classes at California State University, Long Beach, where he earned a teaching credential. He later graduated from the University of Southern California with a master's degree in Safety and Systems Management, and from the Western State College of Law. He went on to become a successful attorney and educator. Graham used his background in law enforcement, his education in risk management, and his experience as an attorney to co-found Lexipol, a provider of policies and procedures for public safety organizations. For his work, he has received numerous awards including the Governor's Award for Excellence in Law Enforcement Training and a lifetime-achievement award from the International Public Safety Leadership and Ethics Institute. Today, Graham works as a consultant on risk management and lives in Southern California.

- **Chuck Rosenberg**
Acting administrator, Drug Enforcement Administration

Chuck Rosenberg became the acting administrator of the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) in May 2015, when he was appointed by U.S. Attorney General Loretta Lynch. Before joining the DEA, Rosenberg served as the chief of staff and senior counselor to FBI Director James Comey. He previously served as the U.S. attorney for the Eastern District of Virginia. As the chief federal law enforcement officer for the district, Rosenberg supervised the prosecution of federal crimes and the litigation of civil matters involving the federal government. For 10 months, Rosenberg was the U.S. attorney for the Southern District of Texas. He also served in several senior posts at the Department of Justice, where his work focused on counterterrorism, counterintelligence, national security, and criminal matters, including service as chief of staff to then-Deputy Attorney General Comey, counselor to Attorney General John Ashcroft, and counsel to FBI Director Robert Mueller. From 1994 to 2000, Rosenberg was an assistant U.S. attorney in the Eastern District of Virginia. Rosenberg received his bachelor's degree from Tufts University, a master's from Harvard University, and a law degree from the University of Virginia.

- **Danny McKnight**
Commander of the 75th Ranger Regiment during the 'Black Hawk Down' battle

Col. Danny R. McKnight retired in 2002 after serving more than 28 years in a distinguished career as a U.S. Army Ranger. McKnight's final assignment was as the chief of staff for First Army, based at Fort Gillem, Georgia. His efforts as the commander of the 75th Ranger Regiment in 1993 in Mogadishu, Somalia, were chronicled in the book and movie *Black Hawk Down*. (Tom Sizemore portrayed McKnight in the film.) In addition to McKnight's expertise in military matters, highlights of his skills in the leadership and management aspects of his career include, providing financial management, guidance, and oversight of an annual operational budget of about \$50 million; and directing a staff of more than 200 military and civilian personnel. McKnight has received numerous awards including the Legion of Merit with two oak leaf clusters, Bronze Star for Valor, Purple Heart, Meritorious Service Medal with five oak leaf clusters, National Defense Service Medal with Bronze Star, and Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal with Arrowhead and Bronze Star. He graduated from the U.S. Army War College; Air Command and Staff College; Infantry Officer Advanced Course; Ranger School; Airborne School; and Infantry Officer Basic Course. He also served as an assistant professor of military science in the University of Florida Army ROTC Department. McKnight earned a master's degree from the University of Florida and a bachelor's degree from Florida State University.

CONFERENCE WORKSHOPS

1. The Role of the State of Ohio Board of Pharmacy/O.A.R.R.S. for Law Enforcement

Prescription drug abuse is the nation's fastest growing drug problem and has proven to be a leading gateway drug to heroin. This workshop will cover the role of the State of Ohio Board of Pharmacy and the use of the Ohio Automated Rx Reporting System (O.A.R.R.S.) when investigating the diversion of prescription drugs.

2. Combating the Heroin and Fentanyl Epidemic

Joseph M. Pinjuh, chief, U.S. Attorney's Office – Northern District of Ohio
Derek Siegle, executive director, Ohio High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (HIDTA)

As heroin and fentanyl deaths continue to skyrocket in Ohio, the U.S. Attorney's Office in the Northern District, along with partners from the medical and treatment communities, medical examiner's office, pharmacy board, and local, state, and federal law enforcement, have implemented a multifaceted Heroin Action Plan aimed at combating the threat. The workshop presenters will talk about various approaches to the heroin and fentanyl problem, including the creation of Heroin Involved Death Investigation Teams, as well as alternate funding mechanisms through HIDTA and the Organized Crime Drug Enforcement Task Forces (OCDETF) program. The workshop will also focus on prosecution responses to the problem at the state and federal level.

3. Bulk Cash Smuggling

In 2010, the Department of Homeland Security recognized the need to crack down on the drug profits, in the form of U.S. currency, being returned to the Southwest border. The Central Ohio Bulk Cash Smuggling Unit began operations in 2012 as part of an existing Ohio Organized Crime Investigations Commission (OOCIC) Task Force. To date, the unit has seized more than \$10 million along with a substantial amount of narcotics. The Central Ohio Bulk Cash Smuggling Unit has also trained numerous other units throughout the United States. The workshop will present an overview of the unit's operations.

4. Customer Service - Creating Some 'WOW'

Today, the public sector is being analyzed like never before. Customer service has always been important, but now the survival of government organizations is dependent on the maximization of the concept. This workshop will explore the topic.

5. Investigating ‘Drone’/UAS Complaints, An Uncharted Territory

With the increase in the use of “drones” — Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) — law enforcement will be called upon to investigate related complaints. The workshop will address nuisance complaints, privacy issues, criminal activities, evidence, “no drone zones,” accidents, reckless operation, when to involve the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), and possible criminal charges.

6. Effective Partnerships With Law Enforcement

The concept of problem-oriented community policing is a work in progress, but there is a consensus on four elements of the strategy: prevention, problem-solving, partnerships, and organizational change. This workshop describes police and social service partnerships that serve as a community response to crisis situations. Partnerships between social services and the police are the next logical step in the development of community policing. Such partnerships meet the mandate to work together for the benefit of the community and to deal with chronic repeat service issues. Effective partnerships can serve as a referral resource for law enforcement, benefit the community served, and help the social service agency meet its mission.

7. Tools of the Fire Service That Can Help Law Enforcement in Drug Investigations

The workshop’s presenters specialize in various aspects of the work of the Division of State Fire Marshal. The speakers will focus on the application of the Ohio Fire Code and associated laws as they relate to suspected sites of drug activity and the collaboration between fire and law enforcement officials. They will also cover the State Fire Marshal’s Fire and Explosion Investigation Bureau’s (FEIB) experiences with drug cases and the role of the State Fire Marshal’s Forensic Lab. The forensic lab can identify the precursor chemicals used to manufacture drugs.

8. Trending Drugs in Ohio: Fentanyl and Hashish

Ohio’s heroin epidemic is well-documented. In addition to seeing a record number of heroin submissions, BCI’s Crime Lab has also noted an increase in fentanyl and hashish submissions. This workshop will explore details of the drugs, the way they are made, and the safety hazards associated with them. The speakers will also discuss the number and types of samples being submitted to BCI throughout Ohio.

9. Profiling the Fatal Drug Scene

Doyle Burke, chief investigator, Warren County Coroner’s Office

The workshop will cover potential evidence to look for at a fatal overdose scene, and what that evidence will mean to the investigation and prosecution. In addition, the speaker will review how to prepare and present the evidence at trial and some common pitfalls to avoid when presenting such cases.

10. Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events Training – Part 1

The workshop will examine an active shooter response training that law enforcement can present to empower citizens in their communities to take action in the event of an attack by a shooter. The speakers conducted 120 presentations last year training more than 3,000 people in Franklin County and are on schedule to double that number with trainings in 2016. The presenters will discuss how such trainings promote a positive relationship between the community and law enforcement. (This two-session event is paired with Workshop 16.)

11. Mindfulness and Yoga for Law Enforcement: Managing Stress, Trauma, and Emotion

The stress and trauma of life plays itself out as increased anxiety, illness, fatigue, emotional outbursts, and lack of focus. This workshop will teach simple yoga movements, mindful meditation, and somatic (body) awareness that will enhance your daily alertness, decrease stress, relieve fatigue, and build positive work habits of compassion and vigilance.

12. Post Traumatic Stress in Military and Police

In conjunction with Veterans Affairs, the Cincinnati Police Department has developed a program that assists law enforcement in dealing with veterans struggling with post-traumatic stress disorder. The workshop will provide basic information on the disorder and include case studies.

13. Drug Epidemic Prompts a Charitable Response

Many new charities have sprung up to respond to the critical demands of communities reeling from the drug crisis. While the charities are focused on developing meaningful programs to respond to local needs, some of their leaders don't adopt effective board governance processes and can find themselves out of legal compliance and jeopardizing the programs. This workshop will cover the legal responsibilities of charitable board members.

14. Medicaid and Prescription Drug Diversion

This workshop will highlight the work of the Attorney General's Medicaid Fraud Control Unit in fighting prescription drug diversion, both in the form of medically unnecessary prescribing (such as from "pill mills") and from the residents of Ohio care facilities. The presenters will use examples from successful prosecutions to illustrate common schemes. In addition, the workshop will outline initiatives to identify aberrant provider behavior and address ongoing efforts to coordinate joint, multijurisdictional investigations and prosecutions.

15. Leveraging Digital Forensics in Drug Investigations

Behind every drug investigation is digital evidence that could be the key to piecing events together. In this workshop, presenters will discuss how best to work with a digital forensics examiner and use the data provided to obtain vital intelligence and evidence in drug investigations. Participants will gain insight into an examiner's abilities and the examiner's need to understand investigative strategies. The workshop will go into detail on the challenges that digital audio and video evidence present and some of the simple ways to overcome them.

16. Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events Training – Part 2

Every local law enforcement agency is expected to investigate cyber crime. This workshop will cover the types of cyber crimes commonly reported, how to respond, and when and how to get help from the FBI.

18. Interacting With the Middle Eastern Population and Muslim Persons

The workshop will cover the Middle Eastern culture, the basic beliefs of the Islamic religion, and common misconceptions. The presenters will discuss the typical family structure, gender roles for children and adults, assimilation with other cultures, domestic violence, sexual abuse, tips for interviewing and gathering facts, officer safety, and more.

19. Connecting Crime Victims Impacted by Drug Addiction to Victim Services

Workshop participants will learn about the affect drug addiction has on people who have fallen victim to crime. The presenters will discuss how vulnerable people — often homeless youths, and victims of human trafficking and domestic violence — who are struggling with addiction, are more susceptible to victimization and less likely to report the crime. The Ohio Attorney General's Crime Victim Services Section will offer information about the wealth of programs and services available through the programs they fund, as well as less-traditional services a victim may need to move forward after a crime.

20. Naloxone and Police Officers

The drug naloxone reverses the effects of heroin and other opioids on the brain and can limit or stop an overdose. This workshop will discuss the success of implementing the use of naloxone by police officers in a larger department; the impact it has had on the community; the law that allows police officers to carry and administer naloxone; naloxone policies and training; the hurdles of getting some veteran officers to accept the policy change; and the partnerships within the community that have made the lifesaving drug affordable to carry and use.

21. The Interplay Between Illegal Drug Use and the Commercial Sex Trade

In 2014, Lorain County pimp Jeremy Mack was found guilty of human trafficking, drug crimes, witness tampering, and obstruction of justice charges and sentenced to life in prison. This workshop, to be presented by those who prosecuted the case, will discuss how it is emblematic of the emerging trend of drug dealers incorporating the commercial sex trade into their criminal enterprise. Mack used his victims' drug addictions, as well as threats and force, to control them. The presentation will focus on witness/victim support, investigative measures, and prosecutorial considerations. The presentation will also include an interactive video demonstration to help attendees learn what to look for when potentially encountering a sex trafficking victim.

22. Implementing a Citizen Police Academy

Successful policing in the 21st century requires a positive relationship between a police department and the community it serves. This workshop focuses on how a citizen police academy can forge and maintain such a relationship. Academy classes can keep the public aware of what is happening within the law enforcement agency and community and inspire confidence and trust between residents and police. The lessons can be tailored to what best suits the department, including a day in the life of a police officer, a tour of the police facility, or crime trends in the area.

23. Fourth Amendment/Search and Seizure

The workshop will focus on street-level policing issues, including consensual encounters, investigative detentions, pat-downs, uses of force, arrests, and searches of people and vehicles. The presenters will review recent case law about home entries and searches, search warrants, and other investigative methods affected by the Fourth Amendment. Throughout the presentation, recent police videos will be shown to bring clarity to the issues.

24. Blue Courage

During the workshop, attendees will be presented with "Nobility of Policing," one of the modules from the curriculum.

25. The Human Side of Addiction

Participants will come to know the private and personal experiences of the families by hearing their stories, learning why and how their loved ones became addicts, and finding out what it was like for them to deal with first responders and law enforcement.

26. Trauma-Informed Care: Creating Environments of Resiliency and Hope

A person's life experiences can have a significant effect on his or her overall well-being. The adverse childhood experiences a person has correlates directly with health and social issues that occur later in life. This workshop will examine the impact of trauma, the principles of trauma-informed approaches, and healing and recovery.

27. The Investigation and Prosecution of Wiretap Cases for the State of Ohio

A wiretap might be the perfect tool to move a narcotics case forward. Workshop attendees will learn about wiretap cases from the inception of the investigation through the final prosecution phase. Speakers will offer information on the mechanics and the execution of a wiretap, and discuss pertinent sections of the Ohio Revised Code, lessons learned, and helpful tips for organizing and planning. The session will cover the application of criminal intelligence and open source research techniques.

28. De-escalation Communication

Presenters with more than 50 years of training and development experience in the law enforcement community will focus on the dynamics of the relationship between civilians and law enforcement and how each group can improve the other through communication. The workshop will have a concentration on de-escalation, implicit bias, and law enforcement taking the lead.

29. Considering and Implementing a Body-Worn Camera Program

Body-worn camera programs are being adopted by police departments throughout the country. At this workshop, participants will learn from the experience of the Akron Police Department about preparing for and implementing such a program. The speakers will address the benefits and drawbacks of having a body-worn camera program and discuss ways to analyze the resulting videos, how an officer's perception may conflict with what is seen on video, and considerations in purchasing cameras. The videos are agency records and subject to public records requests. Two recent Ohio Supreme Court cases have clarified the public records status of law enforcement video recordings. Speakers will discuss application of the confidential law enforcement investigatory records exemption to agency video, the factors to be considered in setting retention periods, and available tools for redacting exempt information.

30. Everything You Need To Know Before Implementing a Community Policing Strategy
