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MR. SARAYA: While everybody's getting their tablets put together, we've already introduced ourselves. I'm with BCI. I'm about 15 years here. I've been involved in officer-involved shootings for quite a while. We've been appointed as the head of this investigation.
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This is a criminal investigation, not an internal. All right? And our rule is as a criminal investigation you're entitled to all rights and privileges just like everybody else, so we're going to give you your Miranda warnings.

It doesn't mean we think you did anything wrong, it's just what we do here. All right?

MR. GARDNER: I'm Scott Gardner, detective/sergeant out of East Cleveland assigned to Major Crimes.

MR. SARAYA: In the course of this investigation we have a list of questions.

Everybody's being asked the same thing. So you might consider it an eye-roll, "I don't believe you're asking me that." It's nothing personal.

It's just what we're asking everybody.

We will ask at some point -- we're going to let you ramble and tell us everything that happened from your perspective and from the perspective of what happened that night.

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At some point we'll ask you what you've learned since then. But that's okay, if you don't know an answer, obviously say, "I don't know." This is all about honesty.

What else, what else, what else.

As we go along if it comes to a point that you want to check with something before you answer, by all means say something. You can step out of the room and talk and come back in. If you want to ask us a question at any time about what we're asking or to clarify something, please do that.

Please don't feel that the questions we're asking you are to belittle you or we think less of you. We're trying to get you to elicit more details in some circumstances.

Fair enough?

THE WITNESS: Fair enough.

MR. SARAYA: Okay.

MR. SARAYA: So we're going to start off

  - Q. Okay. First question on the situation, how are you holding up with all of this?
    - A. So far so good. A lot of support.
  - Q. Good. All right. What is your current assignment at Cleveland?
    - A. The Second District Vice.
  - Q. Okay. How many years have you been at Cleveland?
- 11 A. '92. I came out in '91. 1-6-92. 21 12 years this January.
  - Q. Thereabouts, yeah.

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Any experience prior to Cleveland as a police officer?

- A. As a police officer, no, sir.
- Q. Okay. What shift are you on time-wise?
- A. It's a 6 to 2 a.m., 6 p.m. to 2 a.m., what we call a (inaudible) hours.
- Q. Okay. What were your days off last week?
  - A. Saturday, Sunday.
- Q. Saturday and Sunday off.
- Okay. Who was your supervisor on

6 1 Thursday night? Sergeant Coleman. Α. Q. Okay. Did you work any side jobs or 4 overtime shifts last week? 5 A. Yeah, I worked a part-time job. 6 Q. Okay. What day? Where? A. I think the 28th and the 29th; and it 8 was four hours each day, 7 in the morning to 11 in the morning. 9 10 O. Where at? 11 A. It's called DCA, Downtown Cleveland 12 Alliance. 13 Q. It's a foot patrol gig? 14 A. It's a cop patrolling, patrol the area, downtown area. 15 16 MR. GARDNER: Is that secondary 17 employment or is that through the City? 18 THE WITNESS: Secondary. BY MR. SARAYA: 19 Q. Thursday how were you feeling for your 20 21 shift? Tired? Sleepy? Sick? Sneezy? 2.2 A. Felt fine. 2.3 Q. Fine? 24 Any type of medications,

7 over-the-counter or prescribed? 1 2 Α. 3 4 Q. Okay. Wear your glasses or you wear 5 contacts when you're on duty? 6 Α. No. Wear my glasses. 7 Q. Glasses? 8 Wearing them Thursday night? 9 A. Yes. 10 Q. Okay. All right. What are you wearing while you're working? What are you wearing 11 12 Thursday night? A. I had a black Under Armor shirt on, 13 14 khaki pants, my vest, and my badge clipped on my 15 vest. Okay. Regular vest or a tac vest? 16 Q. Regular vest. 17 Α. 18 A jacket or anything with police logos Q. 19 or --Left it in the office when I ran out. 20 Α. 21 0. Okay. What gear are you carrying with 22 you? 2.3 A. Just my service weapon. 24 Q. Just the pistol, no extra magazines?

- A. No extra magazines.
- Q. Okay. No handcuffs, no nothing?
- A. Just flashlight and service weapon. No handcuffs, nothing.
  - Q. Okay. Which pistol are you carrying?
  - A. The Glock 26.

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- Q. And how many rounds does that carry?
- A. Thirteen. Twelve in the magazine, one in the chamber.
- Q. Okay. Are you carrying any type of personal recorder, digital recorder, videocamera thing, anything like that?
  - A. No, sir.
  - Q. What kind of car are you in?
- 15 A. The Dodge Charger, black Dodge Charger.
- 16 I'm not sure of the year. Maybe their '09s or
- 17 '10s or something.
- 18 Q. Unmarked? Marked?
- 19 A. It's unmarked, but it's equipped with
- 20 lights and sirens. Strobes.
- 21 Q. Who are you riding with?
- 22 A. Bill Salupo.
- Q. Who was driving?
- 24 A. Me.

9 1 Okay. Lights and sirens were working? Q. Α. Yes. Q. Okay. Got a camera in the car? 4 Α. No, sir. 5 Q. What channel are you operating on? 6 Α. Channel 2. Q. What was your call sign? 8 Α. 2 Victor 82. 9 Q. What kind of training -- any 10 specialities, instructors, certificates, SWAT certificates, anything like that? 11 12 Α. No, sir. 13 Q. Any military background? 14 Α. Yes, sir. Which -- what branch? 15 Q. 16 Α. Army. 17 MR. GARDNER: Your MOS? 18 THE WITNESS: 76 something. Victor 1P. 19 MR. GARDNER: What did you do? 20 THE WITNESS: Paratrooper. 21 MR. GARDNER: 82nd you say? 2.2 THE WITNESS: Yes, sir. 2.3 MR. GARDNER: Thanks for your service. 24 MR. GARDNER: From when to when?

10 1 Trick question. THE WITNESS: '86 to '89. BY MR. SARAYA: Q. All right. Qualified with your weapons 5 in the past year? 6 Α. Yes, sir. Q. Which weapons? 8 Α. My Glock. Any long gun? 9 Q. No, sir. Shotgun. 10 Α. 11 Q. Shotgun? 12 Α. Shotgun. Okay. During any of your trainings did 13 Q. you have use of force training, review policies, 14 all that stuff? 15 16 A. Yes. 17 Q. Okay. Your OPOTA certificate is good, 18 up-to-date? A. Yes, sir. 19 Okay. Have you ever been involved in 20 Q. 21 any prior shootings? 2.2 A. Yes, sir. 2.3 Q. How many? 24 A. September of 2000 I was shot.

Q. September of 2000?

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- A. Correct. January of 2003 I was involved in a shooting. I was one of the shooters. And then September 2011 I was also involved in a domestic where I was a shooter.
- Q. Your very first one in 2000, you said you got shot?
  - A. Yes, sir.
  - Q. Did you return fire?
  - A. No, sir.
- Q. Okay. How was your shift going that night? Tell me about the shift. You started the shift. What were you doing?
- A. Started the shift off in contact with some informants. One informant came through. We made a controlled buy, and we had just got done following the suspect; and I was back at the district filing paperwork, began typing the search warrant.
  - Q. Okay. What happened?
- A. Someone was yelling, "They're chasing."

  I think it was Sergeant Coleman. I walked out in the hallway and I said, "Who's chasing?" And then I could hear that they're chasing.

Billy, my partner, said, "We're not -not ready to go." I mean, they're just car
(inaudible). And then they came over that
they're shooting at a policeman. I said, "Well,
we're going now."

So we -- I grabbed my vest, flashlight, and ran out to my car -- or a car.

- Q. Is that the car you normally used, that Charger?
- A. Well, we have three. So we have -primary is a silver and black Charger. Yeah,
  either the black one or the silver one. I
  believe Sergeant Coleman likes the silver one, so
  we kind of just said, "We'll go with the other
  one." That's hers.
  - Q. Okay.

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- A. So as I was running down the hall in the district I yelled, "Get keys. Get keys." And Billy said, "The keys are in the visor." So we were set.
  - Q. Okay. What happened then?
- A. We left the district parking lot, crossed over Fulton and north on 41st. We got to Clark and -- westbound on Clark. That's when we

heard, "He's on Clark." The chase is coming towards us.

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We were getting to about before the bridge, so it would be 60, 61st, and I could see them coming. I'm center lane, so I move over.

Well, he moves over. I move back, he moves back. So then I really move over and just let him go by.

So then the trail of cars went by, and I did a U-turn and just fell in behind everybody.

- Q. Okay. Keep going.
- A. There's a lot of broadcasting going on.
- Q. What's going on? What are they broadcasting?
- A. I was only paying attention to some of it, because there's a lot of cars there. I wanted to focus on driving. I didn't want to ram another police car, because there's a lot of stopping and going. Not stopping, but a lot of slowing down, a lot of braking.

When we get to the bottom of Quigley -- or the bottom of Clark, somebody is saying about a gun. That's coming over the radio. At the time I thought they were talking about they threw

the gun out of the window.

So I'm telling Billy, "If somebody stops (inaudible)." He goes, "No. Just keep going."

I said, "All right."

So we -- you know, we just stayed behind, you know. I was just telling Billy that, "We're just going to stay in line. We're not going to -- you know, I'm not trying to jockey for position or anything. I'll just stay behind the car in front of me."

And a couple zone cars were coming out, so we let them have the right-of-way, let them go by. We just stayed behind them in line and went up the hill to the turn-around, north on 14th, and then up onto the freeway.

Q. Okay.

A. Again, we were -- now that we're on the freeway, I kind of backed off a little bit, just staying behind everybody; and we just followed the trail of cars to 72nd.

When we got off at 72nd, I got lost.

I'm not an eastsider, so I had -- I know we got
up to St. Clair, but after that I didn't know
where I was at. I just stayed with the cars

until somehow we turned around and we're coming back west on St. Clair. And somebody says,
"We're passing Eddy Road." I said, "All right.
I know where I'm at." So I knew Eddy Road.

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And then we went south on Addison and we got -- you know, side streets back there. And, again, I have no idea where we were at as far as directions or streets. But the whole time there's people talking on the radio. We didn't say anything. At least I don't think Billy did. Because I told him, "We'll just let them talk. You know, we're not close enough to be calling this out. Just listen and follow."

There's chatter, you know, people -- you know, officers seeing guns. You know, he's hanging a gun out the window.

Towards the end of it there was talk about it looks like they're loading or somebody's loading a weapon. Weapons out the window.

Somewhere in there -- again, I can't remember exactly where we were at when these things were said because I'm paying attention as I'm driving. I don't want to ram a police car. I mean, there were so many police cars.

So I don't recall where we were at when they were saying these things, but I recall some of the stuff being said. And it was, you know, "Gun out the window." "He's pointing a gun at me." Just went on from there.

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And then we went up into this -somebody said it was a water treatment plant. I
had no idea where it was at. I didn't even know
it was in East Cleveland.

But we really fell behind -- well, we fell way behind or a little bit more behind at that point, because there was some driving on sidewalks. And we went up this hill; and there was dust, dirt. I thought it was a dirt hill or dirt road. And then he went down this other road that was a hill; and that's where somebody said, "It's a deadened. It's a deadened."

And as we were coming down the hill, you could see that they were like -- it looked like they were chasing him in circles or he was going in circles or half circles. But somebody yelled, "Shots fired." And he starts coming up the hill at us again.

So I went to the left up by this little

island median, came back around up on the like the playground median or a little bit of grass and back into those streets; and that's when I stopped. The cars were stopped up there. They had, you know, a blockade or whatever they had.

Q. Okay. What happened next?

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A. That's when I got out of my car; and the second I got out there was just bullets everywhere, just bullets flying by me. I mean, literally just -- I still can't believe it.

And I -- I returned just fire as a suppression fire. I ran for cover.

During this time I see a police officer -- I don't know any of these guys.

They're all young kids. I see a police officer fall. And by the time I got to the sidewalk, I was out of rounds. And the volume of gunfire stopped, so I ran back to my car.

When I got back to my car, all the rounds went off; and I just laid on the ground.

And I was grabbing a patrolman by the belt, "Give me your magazine. Give me your magazine." He gave me one. I locked and loaded. And then (inaudible) I just stood up and tried to approach

the car.

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Uniforms were approaching a lot quicker than I was, so I just stayed at the ready behind them.

- Q. Did you fire anything from the second round -- or the second magazine?
  - A. No, sir.
- Q. Okay. This is the driveway they came in. Come up here. Black Charger is right here. That's the license plate that's on the car. Silver Charger. Suspect vehicle.

Got your orientation there?

- A. Yes.
  - Q. Okay. You pull in. As you're coming up, you're watching what's going on up here by the aisle as you said, right?
  - A. About somewhere in this area. When they're doing this --
    - Q. Just draw on it.
  - A. On our way down we're, I don't know, between here and here, right where the car is, almost in this area. I'm not sure if we were this far or this far, but right in here.
    - Q. Okay.

A. They were doing some -- you know, just madness. You know, I didn't see where -- I couldn't tell who was who. It was smoke and dust and everything.

It was when we were in this area somebody here was yelling, "Shots fired." So when I come down this way, the bad guys' car is coming this way, or the suspect's car, the Malibu, was coming up this way; and we just miss it. All right. Just misses us. I go this way. I go up onto this. And I wouldn't have done this, but there were cars everywhere. We come up this way just like that, just cut across probably a little more into that.

- Q. Okay.
- A. Basically that's where I came to rest.

  I get out and I go this way.
  - MR. D'ANGELO: Over to that sidewalk?
  - A. Yes.

- MR. D'ANGELO: Okay.
- A. The second I get out, I see an officer go down here; and I -- they were -- it was just ridiculous. The rounds were just flying. I didn't want to stop. I just kept running. I

just had my weapon like suppression fire.

- Q. Okay. What are you aiming at?
- A. The back window here.
- Q. The back. Okay.

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A. The window blew out. Rounds were just coming right at me. I -- I could literally hear them just pinging by my head. I didn't -- I didn't know what to do. I just kept running straight.

I was out by the time I got to the sidewalk, and the (inaudible) stopped; and I ran back to my car, this time on the passenger side.

- Q. Okay.
- A. And there's an officer here, and I laid on the ground or sat on the ground. I was tugging at him, "Give me a magazine."

  (Inaudible) didn't even give me one out of his extra magazines. He drops the magazine out of his gun and gives it to me and then he reloads with a fresh one.

But then we -- we never left the car again. The (inaudible), and then we just stayed there. We didn't fire from there. Nobody fired from there.

- Q. Do you know who the officer was that gave you the mag?
  - A. No, I don't.
  - Q. Okay.

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- A. I found him later on that night and gave it back to him. I have no idea who these guys are. I don't -- (inaudible) I don't know their names.
- 9 MR. GARDNER: John, do you have those 10 pictures?
- MR. SARAYA: No, I don't have those here.
- 13 BY MR. SARAYA:
  - Q. Back up a little bit here.
  - You cross Fulton, northbound on 41st,
    you hit Clark westbound, and the pursuit's coming
    at you. You were taking him head-on, right?
    You're watching --
  - A. We were in our -- I was in my lane.
    - Q. Right.
    - A. I was in my center westbound lane. He came over towards me, so I moved to the right a little bit; and he moved to the right. I moved left, he moved left. I moved back right, and he

just went right by me.

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- O. So you moved two more times, and he's --
- A. I went right, left, right. So yeah.
- Q. And he stayed with you each time?
- A. Until the final right.
- Q. Okay.
- A. Then he just blew by me.
- Q. How many cruisers -- how many marked units were behind him when they went past you, do you know?
- A. I'm only guessing. I'd say four or five. Five, six. There was a handful of them.

  Because we couldn't -- I turned, I got up on the curb, and I tried to get back in; but I couldn't. I had to wait until they all passed.
  - Q. Okay. That's fine.

You're (inaudible) you're driving,
you're seeing a lot of braking. About how fast
do you think you're going at this point?

- A. Down Clark, you know, I wasn't even watching.
  - Q. What's it feel like?
  - A. I would only be guessing. 60, 70.
    - Q. Okay. Okay. Lights and siren the whole

time?

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- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Shooting stops, things start calming down a little bit. Let me back up. Back up.

Did you know what your suspects looked like, who they were, or anything?

- A. No, sir.
- Q. Did you hear the original broadcast of the description?
- 10 A. No, sir.
- 11 Q. Since Thursday have you heard names
  12 mentioned on the news at all?
- 13 A. Yes, sir.
  - Q. Okay. Are you familiar with the names at all?
- 16 A. Yes.
- 17 Q. You are familiar with them?
- 18 A. One of them.
- 19 Q. Okay. Which one are you familiar with?
- A. I just read it this morning. The
- 21 | Malissa Williams.
- 22 Q. How are you familiar with her?
- A. I apparently arrested her in '09. I
- don't remember.

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              MR. GARDNER: Is that -- you're making
     it sound like -- how do you know the person?
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               THE WITNESS: On the paper, the
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     paper.com or whatever, says I arrested her in
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      '09. I don't remember. But....
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              MR. GARDNER: (Shows photographs.) Do
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     they look familiar at all?
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               THE WITNESS: No.
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              MR. SARAYA: Take a deep breath. It's
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     okay.
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               THE WITNESS: All right.
              MR. SARAYA: All right?
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     BY MR. SARAYA:
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          Q. About how far do you think -- when you
     bail out of your car here, here, okay, about how
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     far do you think you're running?
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          A. It seems like there was 3 feet
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      (inaudible). From my door to the sidewalk?
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          Q. Yeah.
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          Α.
              Twenty or thirty feet.
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          Q.
              Okay.
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          Α.
              Maybe.
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          Q. And how far do you think you were away
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     to the subject vehicle? Again, these are
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estimates, your best quess.

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- A. I'd say a little bit further. Maybe 30,
  - Q. Okay. That's fair. Whatever your interpretation is, that's what I want.
    - A. Okay.
  - Q. I'm not asking you to sit there like an NFL judge and be able to say that's 3 yards or --
    - A. Oh, no, no, no.
  - Q. Okay. Okay. From where you're at, are you hearing anybody giving verbal commands to the subjects? Did you hear anybody yelling?
  - A. No. The sirens were so loud. As a matter of fact, after -- after it was settled -- like I said, settled down, I was yelling, "Shut the sirens off." It was so loud.
    - Q. Okay. Again, your interpretation.
  - What was the lighting like there?

    Parking lot, cruiser lights. What's it looking like to you?
  - A. For being at nighttime hours, it was lit up I thought pretty good.
- MR. GARDNER: Could you see in the vehicle with the lighting?

26 THE WITNESS: Could I -- I'm sorry? 1 MR. GARDNER: Could you see into the 2 3 vehicle with the lighting? 4 THE WITNESS: No. Because my angle --5 the glass blew out at me, and it was just glass. 6 There was like, you know, a big hole in the glass. That's all I had. I couldn't see 8 anything in the vehicle. BY MR. SARAYA: 9 10 Q. Do you know where your partner was while this was going on? 11 12 Α. No, sir. 13 Q. Do you have any idea where any of the 14 other officers are at? A. No, sir. I mean, there were some in 15 front of me up on the sidewalk, like grassy area. 16 17 I don't know who they were. There was uniformed guys there. Because I was kind of running 18 towards them. 19 20 But, no, I have no idea where anybody 21 was at. 2.2 Q. I'll use this one. There's no cars on this. 2.3 24 So were you on this side of the sidewalk

here?

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- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Okay. There's other officers over here?
- A. There's some officers up here. There's like a little wall there. I didn't realize it until after, but there's like a --
  - Q. Like a retaining wall-type thing?
- A. Yeah, like a foot-high wall for (inaudible) or something. What do you call those, landscaping wall or whatever. It's the sidewalk, the little wall. And that's where I was running to try to get try to use this guy this zone car is covered. By the time I get to the sidewalk, I just dove and I ran back to my car.
- Q. Okay. This is a question and, again, your reason.

Why did you fire?

- A. I thought I was getting fired on.
  - Q. Okay.
- A. I can't believe I didn't get hit.
- Q. What did you think when you saw the other officer go down?
  - A. I thought he was shot. I -- I mean, the

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volume of rounds, you know, shots fired at the bottom of the hill, officers were seeing weapons, they're not giving up. I'm like, this is -- this is crazy. Who in their right -- I don't know.
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There's -- I thought he was going out in a blaze of glory. I didn't know what he was doing. I thought he was -- the back window blows out. Rounds are flying by me. I didn't know to run, walk, stop. I -- I just stayed the same pace and kept going.

- Q. Okay. You said that as you're pulling in --
  - A. (Inaudible.)

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Q. That's fine. That's fine.

You said the guys up here are broadcasting, "Shots fired."

- A. Up here. When I came down the hill --
- Q. You're coming in.
- A. When I see cars making turns, somebody was saying, "Shots fired. Shots fired." And he he came around and came right past us as we went this way. Whew. I went maybe not that far.
  - Q. That's fine.

- A. I know I went over a median. I don't know, it could have been that one. I don't know how far I went down.
  - Q. Okay.

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- A. I went over a median there; and then I know I went over here, because I found afterwards -- I went back and looked and there were some tire tracks.
- Q. Okay. All right. So the suspect's vehicle is there. That's got to be where the shots are being fired at.
  - A. Correct.
  - Q. Okay. That's what I want to know.
- When you're driving up, are you hearing the shots being fired up there?
- 16 A. No, sir.
- 17 Q. No? Okay. Bear with me a second.
- 18 You said something else. Oh, okay.
- They come down, they're coming at you.
- They come down on your side of the car or your
- 21 partner's side of the car whenever you're down in
- 22 the parking lot?
- A. Billy's side, I believe. The passenger
- 24 side.

- Q. Okay. Did they hit your car at all? Were they close enough to hit you at any time up there?
- A. They were close; but they did not hit me, no, sir.
- Q. Okay. All right. Under the circumstances are there any other options you felt were available that you could have done?
  - A. No, sir.

- Q. Okay. What are the officers doing?

  Things are calming down there. What's happening?
- A. The patrolmen, the uniformed guys, were taping off the scene up there. And I'm like, wait a minute, there were shots fired down there, we've got to find these rounds.
- So I'm trying to get guys to come down and help me. And everybody was busy up there, so I went down to this area --
- Q. So they're taping off down here around the suspect car and everything, and you come up here --
- A. I come up here. I locate a casing here.

  I direct Billy -- and there was a zone car down

  here. I told -- well, they were actually up

here. I said, "Can you move down over here? We need to block this off down here further." So they moved -- drove over here. I had Billy find something to place by the shell for us.

- Q. Did you pick it up?
- A. No.

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- Q. Pick up any shells?
- A. No. I would not touch them.
- Q. How many did you find? Just the one?
- A. Just the one.
- Q. Did the zone car come up there to put the headlights in the area or just to kind of like guard the area?
- A. Just -- they were parked right here with their lights on. I just asked them to come down here so we would have, you know, a further point.
  - Q. Okay.
- A. I advised them there was a shell there, nobody kick it or anything. Then I went to -- I walked -- I didn't want to go by the car. I walked all the way up here through the park, through the (indicating) and found a car over here with some -- looking for tape. And a zone car guy gave me some tape. I went back down here

and I --

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- Q. Okay.
  - A. -- and I taped it off.
- Q. Okay. Did you hear anybody call for EMS?
  - A. No. I -- I just taped it off and then went and sat in my car.
  - Q. What are the other officers doing? What's the conversation? What's the tone? What's the attitude of anybody?
  - A. I just sat in my car. Sergeant Coleman found me. She went and collected up her guys, asked, you know, is everybody all right, who was shot, hit. I just sat in the car.
    - Q. Okay. Did you get hit anywhere?
- 16 A. No, sir.
  - Q. Nothing hit you in the vest?
- A. (Inaudible.) I went out and unpacked my
  vest yesterday and checked it five times. I went
  yesterday. I went Sunday. And I just can't
  believe I didn't get hit. It's ridiculous.

  (Inaudible) God was on my side.

  - A. Yes, sir.

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- Q. Were the other officers involved, were they acting within what you think how they were trained as well?
- A. I didn't see what they were doing. I -you know what, you go into a tunnel vision mode.
  All I was worried about was getting to cover.
- I've been fired at once and walked away, but I've
  never been fired at multiple times in just a few
  feet. I just wanted to get to cover.

I wasn't watching nobody. I wasn't looking -- I kept my eyes on the target car, the suspect vehicle. When it finally stopped, I went back to my car for cover.

- Q. Okay. How long did -- here again, subjective. How long did it feel like that first volley lasted?
  - A. Hours. But it was only a few seconds.
  - O. It felt like hours?
  - A. Yes, sir.

- Q. There's this lull, there's this first volley and then there's this break. How long did that feel to you that it took, that it gave you the time to move back to cover?
- A. Not very fast. But when you're scared out of your mind, you run pretty quick. So I was kind of left out in the open there, so I turned around and ran as fast as I could. So just seconds, a second.
- Q. Okay. All right. Bear with me on these questions here. All right?
  - A. Yes, sir.

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- Q. Did you use your cell phone at the scene?
  - A. No, sir.
  - Q. Did you use your cell phone to take any pictures at the scene?
