If we ask you what you think is silly, we're trying to get you to just expound on your answers so we pull out the details that we need.

There are some questions here that we admit might sound like -- you know, roll your eyes, "What the hell are you thinking," but it's just questions that we need to ask. Okay?

These are questions -- we have this sheet we're going through. Everybody's getting the same batch of questions.

At one point we're just going to tell you, "Roll with it, tell us everything that happened," and then we'll come back and fill in details.

If at any time you've got any questions of us, ask. If you don't know, you can say, "I don't know." Every cop wants to know -- to act like everything -- we understand.

So, like I said, we're going to go through things, take our time, whatever we have to do. Okay?

THE WITNESS: Okay.

MR. GARDNER: If you need to take a break, just let us know. If you need to step outside and talk to counsel or your union reps, feel free. All right? I mean, this is going to be real informal. Okay?

THE WITNESS: Okay.

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MR. GARDNER: The -- the big formal part, as I'm sure that -- I'm hoping that counsel let you know, we are doing a criminal investigation. Therefore, you are entitled to all your rights just as anyone else. So we're going to advise you of your Miranda.

You have the right to remain silent.

Anything you say can and will be used against you in court. You have the right to consult with an attorney and have an attorney present during questioning. If you cannot afford an attorney, one can be provided to you before questioning at no cost.

Do you understand the rights?

mind, do you wish to speak to us?

THE WITNESS: Yes.

- Q. All right. This is sort of where it becomes your -- your floor. All right?

Just, if you can, tell me what you were doing just slightly prior to learning -- however you learned -- I don't know if you learned by radio --

MR. SARAYA: Let's start with the shift.

Tell us about the shift. You and your partner

get in the car, log in service?

THE WITNESS: Right. Approximately around -- they put us on there about ten till nine.

MR. SARAYA: Okay.

THE WITNESS: I believe we did have one or two radio sirens to answer. I couldn't recall. He was the passenger, so he was doing all the paperwork.

I think actually at the time that the first broadcast came over we were just basically patrolling our zone that we were working.

BY MR. GARDNER:

- Q. Do you remember where you were when --
- A. Not exactly, no.
- Q. What -- I mean, how did you learn that there was a pursuit or whatever, whatever you learned?
- A. I first learned it when officer Nan came over Channel 2 and advised the radio dispatcher that shots were fired down by the Justice Center. He believes they were shot towards him, and that's when he gave the description of the vehicle along with the license plate.
- Q. Do you remember what that description was?
- A. Just an older model blue vehicle. I can't actually remember what he said.
- Q. No, that's fine. I'm only asking for what you can remember.

MR. SARAYA: What happened next?

THE WITNESS: Okay. At -- at that time,

where our zone is, we're very far from the

Justice Center. Okay. We're up by, like, Brook Park Road.

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So I just started heading northbound and was just listening for the next broadcast to come over, where the suspect vehicle might have been, and I believe that officer Nan lost the vehicle for a few minutes.

I think he advised to notify Channel 3, District 3, which is the downtown district there, and so I really didn't have any idea which way I was going to go.

I just -- I was the furthest south as you can get in the Second District, so I just started heading north waiting for the next broadcast to come over.

And I couldn't tell you how long, maybe a few moments, a minute or two, that is when 2

Adam 31 actually spotted the vehicle on the Detroit Superior Bridge.

So now I had an idea of where they're at, so I started heading that way, you know, a little more north, kind of waiting for the next broadcast.

I guess they turned around in the car,

put on their lights and sirens, and the car refused to stop. That's what I got from the broadcast.

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They were heading westbound at that time, so I was kind of heading westbound. You know, me and my partner were discussing it in the car like we would do in this kind of situation. You know, where do you think he's going to go next? Okay.

So he was heading west. We were heading west, you know, kind of like maybe northwest, trying to get down to that -- that area of the district, because we started in the furthest area we could be.

And just kept listening to the -- to the broadcast, you know. And a lot of times we both believe amongst ourselves that these suspects try to get to a highway. When they didn't jump on the highway by, I think it was like, by West 85th and Clark area, they turned back around and headed eastbound on Clark.

So I started heading eastbound.

I remember going up Fulton to Denison and also continuing to listen to the broadcast. That is

when I was hearing they took Clark to Quigley up to West 14th. When they headed north on west 14th, we both know that the highway's right down the street.

So at that time I was about Denison approaching 176th Northbound. He -- the suspect vehicle already got on the highway at West 14th (inaudible) and that's right when I was getting on the highway I found I-176 Northbound, you know, heading downtown. Because if you know the highway, they actually meet. When you pass the Steelyard Commons, that's -- you're going to meet.

I heard -- I can't recall when, when or what location, but Officer Seifer (written as spelled), who was in the lead car, broadcasting the whole chase --

MR. GARDNER: Can you -- I'm sorry.

S-e-i?

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MR. KINAS: F-e-r-t.

21 THE WITNESS: No. There's no T.

22 Seifer.

MR. KINAS: Yeah.

24 THE WITNESS: Uh-huh -- he broadcast,

"The passenger is pointing a gun out the window.

2 Heads up. Heads up. Everybody be careful."

You know, I could still say at this time I still haven't seen the suspect vehicle. I'm on the highway on 90 heading towards Deadman's Curve.

They're -- they're a ways in front of us. You could just -- you know, listening to -- they're saying they're passing East 55th, approaching East 72nd. They got off at East 72nd.

You know, I can't say minutes or seconds. We were just a little ways behind him. So I decided to get off at East 55th Street and like parallel them. In case they decided to go back westbound, they would, like, come towards us.

Actually going down East 55th and starting going a little more east down some streets, I don't have no idea where I'm at. I'm basically following other police cars. You know, someone in this chase has got to know where they're going, and there was a bunch of them in front of me. And I think we were on Wade Park.

I know we ended up on Euclid.

During that time period there, I think it was Sergeant Coleman yelled -- broadcast that a police car was struck by the suspect vehicle.

- Q. This is when you're on Euclid?
- A. I can't actually remember. It was all happening so fast.
 - Q. Do you know what police car was struck?
 - A. No, I do not.
 - Q. Okay.
- A. I think it might have been an undercover car, I think. Just by people talking. I don't know, though.
 - Q. Okay.
- A. So the chase was continuing. The suspect is refusing to stop. We already know in our minds they shot off a gun, pointed a gun at officers, and just refused to stop at a high rate of speed.
 - Q. Okay.
- A. Like I said before, there was -- there was a lot of police cars ahead of me. I couldn't tell you how many. Maybe ten, fifteen.
 - So when we're on Euclid, I guess we're

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in east Cleveland now because, like I said, I have no idea that neighborhood. I've never been there.
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And when -- when the suspect vehicle hung a right to go up a hill, I think, was the street Wymore or something along that? I can't recall.

But I remember them saying, "Just be advised everyone, we're heading towards the water treatment plant."

- Q. This is showing you here -- let's see.

 This is Euclid on here. Wymore is here. Terrace is a cross street between Wymore, and you also have Lee Boulevard on the opposite side.
 - A. This is Euclid?
 - Q. Euclid would be down here, yeah.
- 17 A. We're on Euclid heading east.
 - Q. So you would actually be coming this way.
 - A. Oh, like this?
- 21 Q. Yes, you're coming up this way.
- 22 A. Okay.

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Q. You turn down Wymore, I'm assuming, that's what you just said.

A. I do remember hearing that street name, 1 2 yes. Q. Okay. 4 I didn't actually personally look at all 5 the street signs, because I had cars in front of 6 me. 7 MR. SARAYA: You're driving -- you're 8 driving, right? A. Plus, I was following the other police 9 10 cars. 11 Q. Right here Wymore technically Ts. What 12 you can't sort of see on this overhead view is, where the trees are, there's an access drive that 13 14 comes up and goes into this parking lot. All 15 right? 16 A. So this is the road we hit. 17 Q. You just went straight up? 18 Α. Where's the school? 19 Q. The school is right here. This is the school right here. 20 21 Α. Oh. 2.2 Q. This is the parking lot where the incident --23

A. Yes, whatever street this is, it was

like a dirt road. When I was driving up it, all I could see is like smoke and dirt and dust and, you know, really having no idea -- again, like I said, just following the police cars in front of me. But right when I started going up that road, I heard an officer broadcast, "Shots fired, shots fired."

- Q. Just as you're coming up the drive?
- A. Yes. Don't know who they're shooting at. But, again, with all the previous things that these suspects have done, we believed they're shooting at the police.
- Q. Okay. So just so you're understanding here, here's the access road. This is the access -- or this is the main access road. All right? Which is this road right here.

Do you remember, did you -- did you continue into here, come along top?

- A. No. When I got to the top of this hill,
 I went to the right.
 - Q. Okay.

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A. Just went a little ways, not real far.

And at that time the suspect did go -well, I know because I saw it. That's the first

time I saw it, it was actually coming at us.

So we went from, like, the tenth or the fifteenth car in line to the second. Because as I looked up straight at the vehicle, I saw it struck 238 on the left and 217 was on the right. I'm not sure if it actually hit 17. I couldn't see that. But I could see he was trying to get through the two police cars and he couldn't make it.

And right when he hit 238, the shots started firing -- ringing out. I put the car in park and inside I'm thinking, "Oh, shit, they're firing at us, I mean, they're actually shooting at us."

So I kind of went down to the floor.

Because the windshield does not cover bullets

flying at you, so I went down to the floor.

My partner actually had the shotgun in his hand at that -- a few minutes prior.

Whenever he took it out, I'm not sure.

He exited the passenger side. I exited the driver's side. I got onto the ground because the shots were still being fired. And, again, like I stressed, I thought we were being shot at.

So I kind of got on the ground and crawled over -- I went to the front of the car and got over to the right side of 217.

I don't know if you have -- oh, there it is right there.

At that time I got to about the passenger door. The door was open. My partner was to the right of me. I looked inside the vehicle and saw the windshield was just riddled with bullet holes.

Q. Of which -- which --

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2.3

A. 217. And the shots were continuing to be fired.

I tried to look over the police car, but I couldn't get a good -- good site of the suspect vehicle to let any rounds off, because I was -- you know, they're shooting at us. I'm trying to help out other fellow officers who are also getting shot at.

So what I did, I went around to the right of my partner and I went to the front right part of 217, right front fender.

MR. SARAYA: Do me a favor.

THE WITNESS: Yes.

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MR. SARAYA: All right? Draw your --
your cruiser where you parked at and where --
approximately. Obviously, where you --
THE WITNESS: Like right around here.
MR. SARAYA: Okay. And so you bail out
and you run up here?
THE WITNESS: Yes. I ran this way.
MR. SARAYA: Okay.
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THE WITNESS: I stopped here. The shots were continuing to fire. I could literally hear them go past my head. Very, very scary. I mean, I've never been in that situation before.

So, like I said, I couldn't really get a shot off here. I believe the light bar was in the way. You know when I looked up, I'm not a very tall person to begin with, so that's when I went around to the front — the right front fender right here. I didn't go to the front of the car. I went to the side.

The shots were continuing to be shot at us. You know, I was scared to death, so I -- all I could think, "We have got to get these people to stop shooting at us," so I got up, let some rounds off, got back down on the ground.

MR. SARAYA: Do you know how many times you shot?

THE WITNESS: I do now. I did not really at that time, no.

MR. SARAYA: Okay.

THE WITNESS: The shots are still being fired and I basically told myself, "I'VE got to get back up, let some more rounds off to stop these people." And right when I went to stand back up, they stopped.

BY MR. GARDNER:

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- Q. Did you hear anybody calling out anything or --
- A. I -- just, it was so hectic. I -- once we knew it was done, the shooting was stopped, I remember looking at my partner. He was feeling his chest. He thought he might have got shot or something hit him in the vest. So he was doing that.

And then probably within seconds, I felt like something running down my forehead. I went like this and I had blood on my hand. So I'm thinking inside, "Did I get shot on my head?"

Because it doesn't hurt. You know...

1 MR. SARAYA: But your head was bleeding? THE WITNESS: Yes. A few people --2 3 because they looked at me and they said, "What happened? Did you get hit?" 4 5 I said, "No, I don't think so." 6 It must have been from, like maybe the 7 glass from the windshield; or also the side 8 mirror of 217 was shot off, so I'm not sure what 9 cut my head. 10 EMS was on scene and they just wiped it off and said it was fine, and it was. I mean, I 11 12 think it's gone by now, but it was right here. MR. SARAYA: Okay. 13 14 BY MR. GARDNER: Q. You said at that point you didn't know. 15 Do you know now how many shots you fired? 16 Nine. 17 Α. 18 Q. Nine shots? 19 A. Yes. And how do you know that? 20 Q. 21 A. Because we counted how many were 22 missing. 23 Q. Who counted them out for you, do you 24 remember?

- A. Our homicide unit.
- Q. Who from homicide? Detective?

 Sergeant? Lieutenant?
- A. I'm thinking, like, four of them.

5 MR. D'ANGELO: Was it your boss?

THE WITNESS: I can't think.

BY MR. GARDNER:

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- Q. But it was somebody from the homicide unit?
- A. Yes. I unloaded my weapon in the one

 school -- room in the school. I actually gave it

 to Sergeant Stacho, and he handed it off to

 whoever counted it. That's why I can't think who

 counted them.

THE WITNESS: What side is Stacho in?

MR. KINAS: (Inaudible)

17 BY MR. GARDNER:

- Q. All right. So I'll ask, at any point did you see anybody climbing on this -- stepping up on the cruiser or getting up on the trunk lid or anything?
- A. No. I was just focused on getting from here over to where I could see the suspect vehicle, so I was just probably just looking this

1 way.

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2 MR. SARAYA: Okay. What -- where were 3 you aiming at when you fired?

THE WITNESS: The driver.

MR. SARAYA: Through the windshield or through the side window?

THE WITNESS: It would be through the side window. No because -- yeah, I wasn't angled towards the windshield at -- when I went over to here. It was the whole left side of their vehicle, I was looking at that.

MR. SARAYA: You could see that a whole lot better, then?

14 THE WITNESS: Yeah.

MR. SARAYA: Okay.

16 BY MR. GARDNER:

 - A. Well, the official broadcast by Officer Nan, I believe he did say there was two occupants, black male driving. The passenger, I -- I couldn't answer that.
 - Q. Have you -- do you know the names of the suspects since this?
- Do any of those names sound familiar to you?
- Have you ever had any prior run-ins with them?
 - A. No, I haven't personally, no.

- Q. I'm showing you two photographs. Do they look familiar to you?
 - A. Neither one.

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Q. How would you describe the lighting in the parking lot?

MR. SARAYA: How did it feel to you; parking lot light, cruiser lights, everything going on?

THE WITNESS: A lot of lights. Very lit up with -- then again, my eyes are just focused on the car. I wasn't looking even past it. So if those lights were on, I didn't even see them.

MR. SARAYA: Okay.

THE WITNESS: I'm more focused on somebody shooting at me and my partner and the other officers that were next to me.

BY MR. GARDNER:

- Q. I asked you before if you heard anybody issue any verbal commands. Did you hear anybody say -- you know, yell out, "Cease fire" or anything of that nature?
 - A. No, I didn't.
- Q. Did you believe that you were getting shot at?

- A. Yes, I did. Very scary.
- Q. Were you able to see the movements of the suspects inside the vehicle?
 - A. At the very end?
 - Q. Uh-huh.
 - A. No.

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Q. I mean at any time.

MR. SARAYA: At any time.

- A. No, I never saw the vehicle, like I said, until it -- when it hit, like, 237 and when it -- if he got through these two cars, he would have came head-on to me. That's the first time I saw it.
- Q. Do you recall any of the positions of any of the officers, whether it be to the left or right of you, when you were shooting?
- A. Just three of them. Well, myself, like I said, I was by the passenger the open passenger door. My partner was to the right of me by the door also. And then I went around around him.

And Officer Cindy Moore was the only one I can recall seeing, and she was behind 217, the right rear.

MR. SARAYA: What was she doing, do you remember?

THE WITNESS: She did yell at me to grab the shotgun. And I said, "What are you, nuts," because I looked in there and, I mean, I saw the bullets were flying.

Why didn't she grab it? (laughter.)

She goes, "Can you grab my shotgun?"

I'm like, "Hell no."

You know, again, I'm looking in there and seeing the windshield all shot up. I'm not going to enter that area.

- Q. Do you believe that your rounds hit?
- A. Honestly, I don't know.
- Q. This is one of those questions that he was talking about. All right? It's got to be asked. All right?

Is there -- do you feel that there was any availability or any other option that could have been used?

When you come rolling up, all right, did you see any officers in between these two zone cars as the suspect vehicle is coming at them?

Did you see an officer hit the deck, go down?

THE WITNESS: No.

MR. SARAYA: No? Okay.

THE WITNESS: I was staring right at the car, maybe tunnel vision just looking right at it, because that's my main focus, if these people have a gun. I'm looking right at them now through a windshield. There's no protection.

MR. SARAYA: Right. Okay. Now, you said you got out. Did you go around to the back of the car, run around the front of the car? You ran around the front of the car?

THE WITNESS: I hit the ground and, like, crawled, yeah, because I had dirt on my knees.

MR. SARAYA: That's fine. That's what the uniform (inaudible) is for.

THE WITNESS: Yeah. One pair. I mean

the media leaves all the important things out. 1 You know? MR. GARDNER: Oh, yeah. That's why I 4 said -- they sensationalized it. 5 THE WITNESS: Oh, I haven't (inaudible). 6 MR. But, no, when I brought the car to right about here, I was looking right at that suspect vehicle trying -- to me it looked like he was trying to get through. Instead he hit this car.

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And it seems like right when he hit it, that's when the shots started.
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MR. D'ANGELO: So what was the approximate distance you think you traveled from when you heard "shots fired" to where you brought your car to a stop?

THE WITNESS: However long that type of hill is. Is that from Euclid to this spot? I don't know. First time I was ever on it.

MR. D'ANGELO: How long did it take you to get --

THE WITNESS: I couple seconds probably.

MR. D'ANGELO: A couple seconds?

THE WITNESS: Yeah.

MR. D'ANGELO: And how long did it take you to get out of your vehicle and crawl to the open passenger door on the 217?

THE WITNESS: I got out within seconds, because I was -- I thought I was getting shot at. Right when I got out, I went directly over to the 217. THE WITNESS: Forever. Like I said, I believed we were getting shot at and it just seemed like it lasted a lot longer than it did, I'm sure.

MR. D'ANGELO: During the -- there's been some reports in the media about the race.

From being there personally and from your observations, was there any racial

motivation for any of the police action in this case?

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THE WITNESS: None at all. The suspects brought the actions on themselves. If they were white, same result, you know.

MR. D'ANGELO: What was Officer Moore's demeanor when she asked you to get the shotgun?

THE WITNESS: Probably scared, nervous.

I mean, it was all taking place, the rounds were flying everywhere. I don't know why she asked me to get it. Probably because I was closest to the opening of the door. The door was open.

MR. SARAYA: And you --

THE WITNESS: I said, "Hell no." That's exactly what I said.

MR. SARAYA: Let me get that quote right. I had no exclamation points, so I'll just -- "Hell no."

THE WITNESS: It's something we can laugh about it now.

MR. SARAYA: Yeah, it is; and that's good. That's good.

Because at that point in time she had emptied a magazine and reloaded already.
