MR. GARDNER: My name's Scott Gardner.

I'm a detective/sergeant with the City of East

Cleveland attached to the Major Crimes Unit over
there.

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Again, this is sort of a canned speech we're giving everybody. All right? We're conducting a criminal investigation here. This is not internal. All right?

There's going to be some questions that we're going to ask you you may think they're inflammatory. They're not really meant to be inflammatory. We're just trying to elicit certain information from you. All right?

THE WITNESS: (Affirmative nodding of head.)

MR. GARDNER: It's okay to be offended if you so choose to.

MR. SARAYA: I'm John Saraya. I'm with BCI. We've been pretty much given the lead on this case. As Scott started saying, this is the criminal side. This is not internal. All right? As such you're entitled to all rights and privileges the same as everybody else. So you'll be given Miranda warnings. Not because we think

you did anything wrong, but because of rights and privileges. Okay? That's usually our standard procedure.

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I've been doing officer-involved shootings about 15 years here at BCI. All right?

If at any time you have any questions or concerns, feel free to ask. If you want to talk with your people, feel free to say something.

You can step out in the hallway here, all right, come back.

Like Scott said, don't be offended by some of the questions. We're going to elicit as much detail as possible. Okay?

There are a couple of questions we're going to ask -- we've got a canned list here.

We're asking everybody the same basic 50 questions. Yet there are a couple you kind of go, "You're really asking me this?" Yeah. We're asking everybody. All right?

Any problems with that?

THE WITNESS: No.

MR. GARDNER: The only thing I can caution you on -- obviously we've interviewed other people -- so if you don't know something,

4 1 just say, "I don't know." It's better that you say that than there to be inconsistencies. Obviously you're going to have a 4 different viewpoint than anybody else. But you 5 understand what I'm saying? 6 THE WITNESS: Yes. 7 MR. GARDNER: Try to be as honest as you 8 can. All right? 9 Miranda warning. You have the right to 10 remain silent. Anything you say can and will be used against you in a court. You have the right 11 12 to consult with an attorney and have an attorney 13 present during questioning. If you cannot afford an attorney, one can be provided to you before 14 15 questioning at no cost. 16 Do you understand the rights? 17 THE WITNESS: Yes, I understand. 18 MR. I forget who the early boss was. 6 BY MR. GARDNER: Q. What -- what are your days off? What 9 were your days off that -- that week? 10 A. It would have been Saturday, Sunday, 11 Monday, Tuesday. 12 Q. Within 48 hours of this happening were you working any off-duty, part-time --13 14 Α. No. 15 Q. -- extra -- no? That day how were you feeling? Rested? 16 17 Sick? Flu? Sneezy? 18 A. I was fine, normal. Q. Are you taking any medication, whether 19 20 it be over-the-counter or prescribed medication? 21 Α. No. 2.2 Q. Wear glasses or contacts? 2.3 Α. No. 24 Q. Tell me how you were dressed.

- A. Wearing the uniform. I had shoulder -- a flap jacket on, a vest, and the taser.

- A. Yes, exterior vest. Taser, baton, flashlight, two sets of handcuffs.
 - Q. Anything else? ASP? Pepper spray?
 - A. ASP and pepper spray, yes.
 - Q. Let's talk about, did you have any backup firearms?
 - A. No.

Who was in the car with you? 9 Q. I think his first name is Robert, last 10 Α. name Radosovic. R-A-D-O-S-O-V-I-C, I believe. 11 12 Was he driving or passenger? Q. 13 Α. He was driving. 14 Q. Did you have an in-car dash cam, any personal dash cams in the car? 15 16 Α. No. 17 Lights and sirens working? Q. 18 Α. Yes. 19 Q. What channel were you using? Α. Channel 2. 20 21 Channel 2. You were on it the whole Ο. 2.2 time? Did you change channels at any point? No. All channel 2. 2.3 Α. 24 Q. Did you have an MDT in the car?

10 A. Fleet 2 it wasn't -- I don't think. I 1 2 don't think we had one in there. Q. As far as you remember, everything on 4 your car was working okay? 5 Α. Yes. 6 Q. Do you know what car number it was? 7 Α. It was 2 B 38. 8 Q. Two -- I'm sorry. 2 B 38. 9 Α. That was your call sign? 10 Q. 11 A. Call -- yeah. Call sign and the car 12 sign. Car 238, sorry. Q. Do you have any specialized training, 13 SWAT training, instructor training? 14 Α. 15 No. 16 Prior military? Q. 17 Yes. Α. 18 Q. What service? 19 Α. Army. Your MLS? 20 Q. 21 Α. 92 Gulf Cook. 2.2 19 -- I'm sorry. Q.

92 Gulf, service specialist.

Q. Weapon qualifications, sir?

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- A. In the department?
- Q. Yeah.

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- A. Glock and shotgun.
- 4 Q. Anything else?
 - A. That's it.
 - Q. Did you take use of force training in that Glock?
- 8 A. Yeah, in the Academy, yes.
- 9 Q. I mean, when you did your recert, did
 10 you guys cert for like a use of force in-service
 11 training?
- 12 A. (Affirmative nodding of head.)
- Q. Your military time, when to when?
- 14 A. '02 to '06.
- 15 Q. Your OPOTA up-to-date?
- 16 A. Yes.
- Q. Ever had any prior shooting incidents?
- 18 A. No.
- 19 Q. Tell me, you get off -- you get on
- around -- or you got on at 9:30 that evening.
- 21 | What -- what are you doing when you get on?
- A. Basic patrol. Just answering radio.
- 23 | Q. What's the shift like?
- A. For the most part it's pretty much been

kind of quiet. A couple of assignments here and there.

- Q. Okay. Keep going. How did the rest of the night go?
- A. It basically just started. We got on the road, did a couple of traffic stops. And we heard the call coming over of the chase.
 - O. You heard it over the radio?
 - A. Yes.

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- Q. What did you hear?
- A. I believe it was Nan. Some connection with he was -- we didn't know where it was. He was chasing a vehicle of someone with shots fired and this is a suspect vehicle where they were shooting from.
- Q. And do you recall where you guys were at that point?
- A. I think we were around Broadview and Pearl area.
 - Q. So what -- what happens?
- A. Nan was chasing them. He lost them.

 And then we heard 2 M 31 Siefer and Hummel pick
 them up going across the Detroit Superior Bridge
 westbound in the Second District. So we then

started heading northbound on Pearl, or 25th.

Q. All right.

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A. They kept going, calling out with the chase. So my driver, he was fairly new, just got off probation, so I was trying to direct him where to drive.

So we were just trying to catch up with the chase if it came across us, because it kept going westbound on whatever it was, Detroit or Lorain, and it got to like West 73rd. So we were just trying to stay one -- stay ahead of them.

Not ahead of them, but cut them off if they came towards us.

And by the time the chase kept going, we were on I think 44th and Lorain, and the chase was coming eastbound on Clark from like 73rd or something. So they had the bad guy going southbound on 44th, so the chase would come right into us when it would cross Clark.

So we got to 44th and Clark and we saw the chase coming right at us. The suspect vehicle went down -- we got behind it initially. I told the driver -- told my driver, I was like, "Let the lead car go ahead of us again."

Siefer and Hummel went ahead and they started calling out the chase. I think we were like the second or third car from the actual suspect car.

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From there we just followed throughout the chase, and he was blowing through red lights. I was trying to keep my driver somewhat calm, watch out so we didn't get hit by other traffic or whatnot.

I remember before we actually get into the pursuit when Nan lost them and Siefer and Hummel originally picked them up. As soon as they said they picked them up and they were following the car, I think it was Nan that came over the radio and said, "Be careful. Armed and dangerous. And they will shoot." I remember hearing that.

And during the course of the chase, once they got on the freeway, we were like the third or fourth car still behind for a while, and came over the radio that the passenger's pointing a gun out the window. I believe a couple of times he said that. And then it came over he was pointing a gun leaning over inside the car

pointing it out the back window.

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And I was telling my guy, the driver, I said, "Be careful where you drive, because this dude's probably going to shoot at us." I was -- I was thinking he was going to shoot at us because the cars were stacked. So I kept telling him repeatedly to watch out where we drive so this guy doesn't shoot us.

Then we started to get off the freeway eventually. He was going off road a little bit. By the time he got to the point where -- while we were on the freeway, actually, I believe it was Sergeant Coleman -- that was later on.

Once we got off the freeway, we were still following him, there was a bunch of zone cars, so we're not in like the fourth position anymore. There was other zone cars there.

By the time -- I didn't know where we were. I just knew we were in East Cleveland.

They turned into what they thought it was a water plant. That's how it came over the radio.

And we went in the driveway -- the drive into a -- it was basically probably just enough for like two cars to fit in the drive. So once

we went in, there were a whole bunch of zone cars ahead of us.

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Somewhere during this it was Sergeant Coleman or someone said that the driver's loading a gun or unloading a gun, doing something with a gun. I heard that a couple times throughout the chase.

When we pulled in, we're behind -- I don't know how many cars were in front of us, but there was like a roundabout or the parking lot of the school; and I know the suspect car was there, all the zone cars are there, we lost them in the lights. I couldn't see the suspect car anymore.

Over the radio that's when we heard the shots fired. So I told my driver, I was like, "Pull over," because I immediately thought that the suspects were shooting at the police, maybe they were cornered, because I couldn't see the car.

So I was like -- my theory of telling the driver, they're going to shoot it out, I'm going to get some cover and not stay in my car, or maybe they're bailing to shoot us (inaudible) get some cover, get out of the car, get around

the opposite way.

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Like I said, I didn't see the car at all. I just saw the zone car lights. I was a passenger.

As soon as I opened up my passenger door -- excuse my language -- it was like the oh-shit factor. The car was right there in front of me probably within 15 to 20 feet coming -- I mean, it wasn't at an angle. It was right in front of me.

So the only thing I could do to react is I drew -- I drew my weapon. I was running backwards at the same time towards the back of my zone car. I pointed at the windshield where the driver was and fired.

It happened so fast I didn't really -- I couldn't aim. I was just pointing in the direction of the windshield.

Got to the back of my zone car.

Immediately just went down, ducked, because I heard the gunfire. I didn't know -- I thought it was the suspect shooting at us and the police returning the fire.

So I stayed down behind my zone car,

because I didn't want to get hit by -- by them firing at us or crossfire. I popped my head back up, and there was still gunfire. So I went to the driver's side of my car, ducked down, popped my head up again; and I heard a loud boom on the left side, like a pop, gunfire. So I went down again and just sat there until everyone stopped firing.

Q. Did you --

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- A. I thought.
- Q. I'm sorry.
- A. I thought the guy was going to run me over. I mean, he was right there. I mean, I -- I don't know if there would have been time to even swerve to avoid me.
 - Q. How many times did you fire initially?
- A. It ended up being 12 rounds. I thought it was just a couple.
 - Q. How do you know that it was 12 rounds?
- A. At the end our homicide team made us -- they checked our rounds. They had us empty the magazine and all that.
 - Q. Do you remember who it was?
 - A. I don't even think I know them.

- Q. A detective? A sergeant? A lieutenant?
- A. All I can tell you is they were from homicide.

- Q. You fall down after that, the car is coming at you, you're sort of hunkered, my words, by your -- your zone car?
 - A. I was behind the back of the zone car.
- Q. Did you make any other movement from that point or $\ensuremath{\mathsf{--}}$
- A. Well, I popped my head up to see what was going on and see who's firing; and I went to the driver's side of my car to get better cover.

 I thought it would be better cover. Like I said,
 I popped my head up to see what was going on, I heard a pop on the left side of me, so I dropped down again to avoid fire from anyone.
- Q. The 12 rounds that you did shoot, that was from the initial oncoming --
 - A. Yeah, that was it.
- MR. SARAYA: You didn't fire any more after that?
- THE WITNESS: No. It was just as I'm running, retreating so I don't get run over.
- 24 That was the last time I fired.

BY MR. GARDNER:

Q. We're going to sort of go back a little bit and come forward again.

During the initial pursuit did you -- you were a passenger, so did you call anything out on the radio?

- A. I called like twice. I believe it was Siefer. He wasn't familiar with the area. And I know when we got to I think it was like Wade Park area, I don't know if it was like East 115th, they were going south, and I just called out a couple of times the direction of travel -- I think just like two times -- "We're going southbound coming up on Detroit." And that was it. I didn't want to break in.
- Q. You said initially you were how many cars from the suspect?
- A. From 44th and Clark we were probably the third or fourth one out.
 - Q. Did you see the occupants inside?
- A. Not at that point. They were still -you could see just like an outline. Not really
 -- because we were going --

MR. SARAYA: Go ahead.

- A. They were too far up and we were like weaving in and out of traffic, you know. Because I was telling him not to stay directly behind him. You couldn't really see. You could tell there was possibly two people.
 - Q. What do you think your speeds were?
- A. On the roadway maybe -- I couldn't tell you the exact.
 - Q. Your interpretation.
- A. Forty. A little faster. Maybe fifty at some points.
 - Q. You're --

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- A. We were --
- Q. I'm sorry.
- 15 A. Forty to sixty maybe on the road, 16 streets, residential areas, yes.
- Q. Okay. Once you were on the highway how fast?
 - A. I know one time I looked over to see the speed and it was like at least 100 on the freeway.
 - Q. You already said that the suspect vehicle was crashing traffic lights. Do you remember anything else specific that the suspect

vehicle was doing as far as driving?

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- A. Once we got to East 79th and Addison, I think it was like Addison/Star Hill area, they called -- called out that he rammed a police car.
 - Q. Do you know what police car?
- A. I want to say it was maybe Sergeant

 Coleman, wherever she was that night. At least I

 believe I heard her voice. I don't know if it

 was her car or she was shouting out there that he

 did ram a police vehicle.
- Q. When you got on Euclid in East
 Cleveland, about how far were you from the car?
- A. That's when it started to get jumbled up. Because traffic, you know, the zone cars, we were back a little bit.
- Q. Did you see the suspect vehicle do anything during that time?
- A. I was just trying to keep my eyes -- I really -- I mean, he went into like the parking lot to cut through around traffic, because with all the zone cars and there was some traffic there.

My partner kept a better eye, to tell you the truth. We kind of -- I kind of lost

visual of the car once it hit Euclid a little bit.

MR. SARAYA: Okay. You're on the freeway. You said there's a bunch of zone cars. You're not in -- on the fourth position anymore.

About how many cars do you think were ahead of you at that point? How many others -
THE WITNESS: Well, most of the time until we got off, we were like the third, fourth;

and then it just kept changing position. I mean,

when we got off is like when we lost when we were third or fourth. There's a handful of cars in

13 front of us, I think.

MR. SARAYA: Okay.

15 BY MR. GARDNER:

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- Q. Did you know who was in the vehicle, whether it be by your own observation or radio traffic?
- A. When it first came out it said two black males.
 - Q. This is one of those questions I'm going to ask you curiously.

Have you heard the names of the two people up to this point?

A. No.

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MR. SARAYA: Have you heard anything news-wise about the passengers -- the suspects?

THE WITNESS: In the news?

MR. SARAYA: Yeah.

THE WITNESS: Yes.

MR. SARAYA: Okay. Were you surprised to find out that it was a male and a female?

THE WITNESS: Yes.

BY MR. GARDNER:

- Q. I'm just going to show you two pictures, and you can read the names and look at the pictures and tell me if you've ever had any prior dealings.
- A. Timothy Russell, not to my knowledge I dealt with any of them. And Malissa Williams --
 - Q. Don't look familiar to you?
- A. No.
- Q. Just your -- your opinion, what was the lighting in the parking lot?
 - A. A couple streetlights up.

MR. SARAYA: What do you think? Kind of bright? Kind of dark? You made a comment about (inaudible) with all of the overheads going out.

THE WITNESS: Well, the zone cars, the lights of the zone cars.

MR. SARAYA: Right.

THE WITNESS: It was lighted. The actual parking lot was lighted.

BY MR. GARDNER:

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- Q. Could you see inside the vehicle?
- A. No, not when it was coming at me.
- Q. Did you hear anybody issue any verbal commands? Did you hear, I mean, any officers yell out anything?
- A. No.
 - Q. Nothing like "Cease fire" or anything like that?
- A. No.
 - Q. I'm going to assume I know the answer to this question.

But did you see any of the movements from the suspects inside the vehicle?

- A. No.
- Q. I want to show you a map here, give you a little orientation here. This is the drive coming up into the school. This is the drive coming up. You can see the numbers. These are

going to be the car numbers, I believe, or the plate numbers on the cars.

You were in 238?

A. Yes.

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- Q. Which is right here. Just run through on the picture here, just tell me sort of where you went and what you did.
- A. As soon as we pulled the zone car over, I exited the zone car, the car was coming at me; and I thought he was going to hit me, so I retreated to the rear of the zone car. Got behind my zone car. Not on the bumper but a couple feet away.

Should I do -- use the pen?

- Q. Absolutely, please. Thanks.
- A. I mean, I just immediately exited the zone car, went to the back of the car, and then I moved again to the driver's side. That's as far as I went during the whole tadoo.
- Q. Did you see the suspect vehicle come into contact with the zone car?
 - A. No.
- Q. No?
- 24 | A. I was just -- I was just trying to get

to the rear of my zone car without getting hit.

- Q. Did you hear anything? I mean, like --
- A. There was a lot going on. I didn't hear.
- Q. You started backpedaling to the back of the car, did you fall down?
 - A. No. I just went down to avoid the fire.
 - Q. Okay.

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- A. I didn't -- I assumed they were shooting at us and I heard the gunshots behind me. So I didn't want to get caught and get shot. So I just immediately -- as soon as I got to the back of my zone car I went down so I wouldn't get shot.
 - Q. Do you believe that your rounds hit?
- A. I couldn't tell you. I didn't have -it happened so fast, he was right there. I
 didn't have a chance to even aim. I just -- it
 was right-handed. I pointed it at the windshield
 towards the direction of the driver and shot.
- Q. Do you feel that there was any other availability or practicality of any other options that could have been used?
 - A. Not that I -- no.

- Q. Did you see any of the other officers, what they were doing or $\ensuremath{\mathsf{--}}$
- A. I just know they were behind me. I ducked down when I got to the back of my car.

 And when I went to the driver's side, there was a couple officers to my left kind of behind the (inaudible) and ducked down again.
 - Q. Do you know who they were?
- A. I want to say the driver's side I think there was a vice.
 - O. Male? Female?
- A. I want to say it might have been -- his name is Demchak. And the female, his partner, I believe it was.... --
 - Q. Did you call for medical attention?
- 16 A. No.

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- Q. Did you hear anyone call for medical attention?
- 19 A. I believe I heard someone call EMS.
- Q. Do you remember who it was?
 - A. I couldn't tell you.
 - Q. How -- did you hear it on the radio?
- A. I think I heard something on the radio about EMS.

- Q. So after everything calms down, shots dissipate, what do you do at this point? Did you reload?
- A. No. I felt the threat was over. Didn't see a movement in the car. I felt the threat was over. I just holstered and that was it.
- Q. Did you go up to the vehicle at any point, move anything?
 - A. No.
 - Q. Did you check yourself for injuries?
- A. No. I just -- I felt I wasn't shot. I
 was just still in like awe.
- Q. You weren't injured?
- 14 A. No.

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- MR. SARAYA: Did you check your vest afterwards to see if you took any hits?
- THE WITNESS: I checked it. I didn't feel anything.
- 19 BY MR. GARDNER:
- Q. Do you remember anybody making any type of statements afterwards, officers saying anything?
- 23 A. No.
- MR. SARAYA: What was the tone, the

atmosphere?

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THE WITNESS: It was like -- for me it was like shock, like this really just happened. It's kind of like I didn't believe the whole ordeal just went down the way it did.

I was just -- the only thing I was thinking is if I -- if I was a second late it's either I would have been run over exiting my vehicle I would have been crushed exiting between my car and the suspect car.

So I was just -- I was reflecting on that. I had just had a close-call and I didn't know who was shooting, so I was like, you know, -- besides almost getting run over, if I would have been late would have been crushed or shot.

So I was just kind of like in shock for a little bit, just grateful.

Q. This is one of those questions people get sort of defensive about. It's nothing. If you did, it's not bad. We just need to know.

Who have you spoken to regarding this incident besides your union officials and your attorney?

A. I just had to explain to my wife, my mom

and my dad, two close friends. Alls I told them was I was involved in a shooting.

- Q. Have you spoken to anyone from the department?
 - A. No, other than these guys.

MR. SARAYA: No other officers involved in the shooting? Have you talked to anybody else who's been there?

THE WITNESS: No.

MR. SARAYA: You haven't had any contact with any of the officers at the district or something calling to see what you're doing, how you're doing, anything like that?

THE WITNESS: I've had a lot of people text me to see if I'm all right. I said I'm all right, and that was basically the generic.

BY MR. GARDNER:

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- Q. Do you believe your actions were consistent with your training?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Do you believe that others acted consistent with their training?
- A. Yes.
 - Q. Did you use your cell phone while you

were on scene?

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- A. I texted my wife to let her know I was in a shooting and that I was all right and everything was good.
 - Q. About how long ago -- or how long after?
- A. Probably within probably over a half hour.
- Q. This is an important question that I can't express the importance of asking.
 - A. All right.
- Q. Did you take any photographs while you were on scene with your camera or your phone?
 - A. No.
- MR. SARAYA: Did you see anybody else taking pictures with their phones?
- 16 THE WITNESS: No.
- 17 BY MR. GARDNER:
 - Q. Did anyone ask you to lie or otherwise influence your statement to us?
 - A. No, not at all.
 - Q. To pick up on one of the counselor's question that the media seems to have brought out -- forward in this incident. There -- did you ever -- did you hear any type of racial epithets

afterwards, any racial remarks from the officers?

A. No.

Q. Is there doubt in your mind that this

may have been a racially motivated issue?

A. Not at all.

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MR. SARAYA: During the pursuit did you see any other units from any other agencies in the pursuit?

THE WITNESS: No. I don't even think -- I think it was just CPD. I can't recall seeing anyone else besides CPD.

MR. SARAYA: Okay. Your partner, did you see where he went when he got out?

THE WITNESS: He was just on the driver's side next to the car, the driver's side.

MR. SARAYA: Just hunkered down?

THE WITNESS: I believe -- he -- he actually told me after the fact that I came -- once I got to the driver's side I pulled his ass down to get him down.

MR. SARAYA: Okay.

MR. GARDNER: You don't remember doing

23 that?

THE WITNESS: No.

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              MR. SARAYA: Okay. How long -- and,
     again, this is a subjective question. How long
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     did it feel like the shots were being exchanged?
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               THE WITNESS: I would say ten seconds.
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               MR. SARAYA: That's what it felt like or
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     that's what you think it was?
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               THE WITNESS: That's what it felt like.
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              MR. SARAYA: Lights and sirens were on
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     the whole time, right, during the pursuit?
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               THE WITNESS: Yes.
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              MR. GARDNER: Anything from you guys?
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              MR. KINAS: One question.
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              How many zone cars still had their
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     lights and sirens on during the shoot?
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               THE WITNESS: During the shoot? I know
     -- I know mine was on. Our lights and sirens
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     were on definitely. I -- every car on scene had
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     their lights on. I couldn't tell you about
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     sirens, no.
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              MR. KINAS: The sirens got turned off
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     afterwards, though?
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               THE WITNESS: I know ours did. I think
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     they were still going during the initial
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     shooting.
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MR. KINAS: Did you see how fast the car was coming at you, the suspect vehicle?

THE WITNESS: I -- I couldn't tell. I mean, I just had enough time to react. I mean, by the time I got out -- before I got out of the car, I didn't see the car, because there was no way I would have exited my vehicle if I knew the car was coming there.

As soon as I got out of the car, the car was right there within 20 feet coming at me; and I just had enough time to react and get to the back of my zone car.

MR. D'ANGELO: Did you perceive the driver of the suspect vehicle intentionally coming at you, or is that just -- just kind of happened by, one, accident or inadvertently?

THE WITNESS: Well, the thing was, in the chase he was not stopping at nothing; and I knew we were on that road and there was only one way out. I thought he was just going to come at me. But, I mean, he was so reckless during the pursuit and just trying to get away. I thought I was in the way or, you know, I thought just because I was there he wouldn't stop.

MR. D'ANGELO: So the path he was taking or attempted to take was to --

THE WITNESS: It was right in front of me. It was right through me.

MR. D'ANGELO: And that would be the way to get out of there for him.

THE WITNESS: Yes.

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MR. FOLLMER: When you're running back from the car, you said you got low. How low did you get? Did you get lower than the hood so you couldn't be fired at? Or how low --

THE WITNESS: Yes, I got below -- I believe I got below the hood. I didn't drop totally to the ground. I just got below so if there were shots it would go over.

MR. FOLLMER: Was it a crawl or was -THE WITNESS: I would say at least one
knee down.

MR. KINAS: You fired all 12 of your rounds between the side of your car and the back of your trunk as you were going backwards away from your car?

THE WITNESS: I know what I initially did, I pulled it out with my right hand,

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     retrieving, and I pulled it in. And I still
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     wasn't aiming. I was just pointing at the
     direction of the windshield of the driver's side.
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              MR. KINAS: And you didn't fire your
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     weapon after that point?
               THE WITNESS: No. Just while I was
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     retreating backwards.
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              MR. D'ANGELO: Can you get up and
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     demonstrate to them how you were retreating, like
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     going backwards?
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              MR. SARAYA: Was it a backpedal where
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     you were kind of turned sideways?
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               THE WITNESS: I just exited the car and
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     I unholstered and I was going backwards. I just
     went like this.
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              MR. SARAYA: Okay.
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               THE WITNESS: Just got down.
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              MR. SARAYA: Got as small as you could
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     for a guy that's, what, a little over six foot
     tall here?
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               THE WITNESS: Yes.
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              MR. SARAYA: Okay.
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              MR. KINAS: You didn't get out of your
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     vehicle and intentionally try to stop the car
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with your body?
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THE WITNESS: No, I didn't -- I didn't know it was there. Like I said, I thought it was cornered by the zone cars. And they were shooting it out with the police -- they were shooting at the police. So by me being on the passenger side facing them, I wanted to get out and get some cover, because the rounds are going to come through the door and window and get me.

So my whole ideology was to try to get to the driver's side and cover and get as low as I had to, try to get behind like the trunk or the engine block or the tires.

MR. SARAYA: Do you think the driver in the suspect vehicle saw you get out?

THE WITNESS: He had to.

MR. SARAYA: Subjective.

THE WITNESS: He had to. I mean, I was right there.

MR. GARDNER: So you stopped your car not to block the suspect car in.

THE WITNESS: No. I told him, "Pull it over and exit the vehicle. We can get some better cover." I had no intention on blocking

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him in. I didn't know where he was. I thought he was somewhere in the roundabout surrounded by the other zone cars. So we just pulled it over (inaudible).
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MR. KINAS: You heard these rounds down here or you heard them over the radio?

THE WITNESS: I just heard the radio broadcast, "Shots fired."

MR. GARDNER: Did you see this other zone car beside you?

THE WITNESS: I didn't know it was behind me. I didn't know it pulled up. I don't recall.

When I got out I was just going backwards, because I couldn't see behind me. I was just -- I saw the headlights on the car coming at me. I didn't look to my right. I was just going backwards looking forward.

MR. GARDNER: I can't remember if he already asked it or not.

Is there any question that we have not asked you that you feel is very important or important?

THE WITNESS: Not that I can think of at

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     this moment.
               MR. D'ANGELO: Anything you want to say?
               THE WITNESS: When I exited the car, I
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      just want to reiterate, I didn't know he was
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     there. I just reacted because I thought I was
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     going to die. I thought it was -- the only way I
     could react was shooting, you know.
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               Hindsight is like -- you know, it's kind
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     of iffy to shoot behind because I know there's
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     police officers if I miss my mark. But it's the
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     only thing I had to do. It's the only resource I
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     had -- I was limited to.
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               MR. SARAYA: Anything else?
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               (No audible response.)
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               MR. SARAYA: Thank you.
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               MR. GARDNER: Do me a favor, initial and
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     your badge number.
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               THE WITNESS: (Complies with request.)
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               MR. GARDNER: All right.
