## Guidance for Cannabis Evidence Submissions

BCI Laboratory recently completed a quantitative method validation for Tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) content. However, the current method is limited to use on vegetation and oils at this time. Allow this guidance document to assist your department in submissions of Cannabis Evidence to BCI Labs.

	Vegetation	Oils	Food Products	Other
Examples	Marihuana, hemp	Vape cartridges/ devices, concentrates <sup>1</sup>	Gummies, Brownies, or any edible with suspected THC	Lotions or any non-edible product with suspected THC
Acceptance Considerations	Weighs more than 100 grams for <b>misdemeanor</b> cases <sup>2</sup>	<b>Only 1 accepted</b> ; Batteries must be removed from device	Not accepted currently	Not accepted currently
Testing Considerations		Only 1 Vape cartridge will be tested <sup>3</sup>	Not tested at this time	Not tested at this time

1-BCI Laboratory is no longer reporting “Hashish”, due to legislative requirement that concentrate is derived from Marihuana. A concentrate may have increased THC that exceeds 0.3%, regardless of whether it was derived from Hemp or Marihuana.

2- BCI Laboratory will accept vegetation evidence related to **felony trafficking charges** with less than 100 grams of substance.

3- CBD is routinely found in vape cartridges, thus as a matter of clarity, if detected in our testing it will be named in the report as opposed to stating “No Controlled Substance Found”.
