Definition & CDC Data


- Autism spectrum disorder (ASD) is a <u>developmental disability</u> that can cause significant social, communication, and behavioral challenges
- The learning, thinking, and problemsolving abilities of people with ASD varies
- Some people with ASD need a lot of help in their daily lives; others need less

MISSING DURATION

11% were recovered the same day.

52% were recovered within one day.

81% were recovered within one week.

In 2020, 291 children on the Autism Spectrum were reported missing to NCMEC

Which Child Has Autism?



Neurodiversity is not something that presents physically.

"When you have met an individual with autism, you have met ONE individual with autism."

Characteristics of Children on the Autism Spectrum

A child on the autism spectrum may:

- Wander away or bolt
- Have a diminished sense of fear or engage in high-risk behavior, such as seeking water or active roadways
- Elude or hide from search teams
- Seek small or tightly enclosed spaces concealing themselves from search teams
- Be unable to respond to law enforcement because of their communication style
- Have fears that may hinder search efforts





Communication

- Verbal, non-verbal, minimally verbal
- Both verbal and non-verbal

- May use alternative modes of communication –
 iPad, gestures, picture board, sign language



- May only cite scripts or use echolalia
- May only understand direct language







Sensory Processing

- Sensory overload
- Hypo- or hyper-sensitivity to sound, light, touch
- Easily over-stimulated or understimulated
- May not respond to pain in a typical way
- Can lead to fight, flight, or freeze response





Social Interaction

May not make eye contact



- May not pick up on social cues or body language
- May not understand personal space
- May not respond "appropriately" may laugh or giggle at inappropriate times



- May remove their clothing
- May not recognize seriousness of the situation





Behavioral Effects

- May have obsessive tendencies or interests, or rigidity
- May act impulsively
- May show repetitive behaviors that provide sensory stimulation - "Stimming"
- Anxiety can increase stimming
- Challenging behavior could be caused by inability to communicate, pain, anxiety, defense mechanism





Call-Intake Questions

- Is the child attracted to water? Can he or she swim?
- What other attractions or fascinations has the child displayed?
- Does the child have a favorite place to visit?
- Who or What will the child respond to ?
- Has the child wandered away before?
- Does the child have any specific dislikes, fears or behavior triggers?



Search & Rescue Measures

- Activate SAR and CART along with LE First Responders
- Access the search area, segment into searchable segments
- Preserve the PLS or Crime Scene
- Provide a briefing to SAR personnel including child's behaviors, (likes, dislikes, fears, attractions, reactions to strangers, noise, K9's etc.)



Recovery and Reunification Measures

- Approach the child at their level, be calm and supportive
- Determine health of the child
- Reunite child with Parent or Caregiver ASAP
- Do not assume the child understands you
- Utilize communication tools if needed
- Contact National Autism Association










Help neighbors better understand how to keep your child with autism safe with this sample letter.




Community
