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### FOREWORD

Following the custom of my predecessors, there is submitted herewith, as part of the annual report of the Attorney General, this compilation of opinions rendered during the year 1929.

Under Ohio's scheme of government the Attorney General is the direct legal adviser to all officers of state government, all state commissions and boards, and, through county prosecutors of the state and the State Bureau of Inspection and Supervision of Public Offices, the Attorney General passes upon many of the legal questions confronting county, township, school district, city and village officials. It will thus be seen that these opinions over a course of years are fairly comprehensive of the administrative and governmental law of the state. It has been the custom of the Attorneys General of Ohio, which I am following, to formulate opinions that give not only a direct answer to the question asked, but which contain, after the manner of legal decisions, the reasoning upon which the conclusions are based and a limited citation of court decisions. By so doing it is hoped that the administrative officer or body requesting the opinion may be helped in the decision of related questions.

Great credit should be given to the able staff of lawyers in my office whose names appear on the fly-leaf of this volume. These opinions have resulted from our combined efforts. It should be remembered that during the course of a year the Attorney General of Ohio now renders about fifteen hundred opinions—that this work is but a part of the entire work of the office—and that in the preparation of opinions my colleagues and I do not have, as do courts of law, the advantage of briefs of opposing counsel.

These volumes are submitted in the hope that they may be helpful to the officers of all branches of government in the State and to the members of the Ohio Bar.
