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FOREWORD

There is submitted herewith, as part of the annual report of the Attorney General, the compilation of opinions rendered during 1933.

Under Ohio's scheme of government the Attorney General is the legal adviser to all officers of the state government, all state commissions and boards, and, through county prosecutors of the state and Bureau of Inspection and Supervision of Public Offices, the Attorney General passes upon many of the legal questions confronting county, township, school district, city and village officials. These opinions over a course of years are therefore fairly comprehensive of the administrative and governmental law of the state. It has been the custom of the Attorneys General of Ohio, which I am following, to formulate opinions that give not only a direct answer to the question asked, but which contain, after the manner of legal decisions, the reasoning upon which the conclusions are based and a limited citation of court decisions. By so doing it is hoped that the administrative officer or body requesting the opinion may be helped in the decision of related questions.

Great credit should be given to the able staff of lawyers in my office whose names appear in this volume. These opinions have resulted from our combined efforts. Owing to the creation of new boards and commissions, and the enactment of many emergency relief laws and taxation measures, by the 90th General Assembly, the number of requests for opinions has greatly exceeded that of previous years, so that during the course of the year there have been over 2,000 opinions rendered, which is double the number of last year. This work is but a part of the entire work of the office, there having been 1464 cases litigated and disposed of in the various courts of the state and the United States.

These volumes are submitted in the hope that they may be helpful to the officers of all branches of government in the state and to the members of the Ohio Bar.
