- Officer name- Confidential Law Enforcement Investigatory Records (CLEIRS), pursuant to R.C. 149.43(A)(2)(a)-(d) Records pertain to a law enforcement matter and disclosure would create a high probability of revealing: The identity of an uncharged suspect, R.C. 149.43(A)(2)(a). “Records, documents, and information the release of which is prohibited under [the Victim Privacy Law]” are not “public records.” R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(rr). Thus, while the Public Records Act generally provides for the disclosure of public records, the act specifically exempts from disclosure crime victim information that is prohibited from release under the Victim Privacy Law. In other words, because police officers are persons against whom crimes can be committed, they can be victims under Article I, Section 10a of the Ohio Constitution. the Victim Privacy Law requires that case documents “shall be redacted prior to public release pursuant to [the Public Records Act] to remove the name, address, or other identifying information of the victim.” *State ex rel. - Telephone number of witnesses- Telephone numbers of victims or witnesses to a crime that are listed on a law enforcement record or report, pursuant to R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(mm)
- Personal Email Address- Not a “record” of the office. R.C. 149.011(G) and R.C. 149.43(A)(1); *see also State ex rel. Dispatch Printing Co. v. Johnson*, 106 Ohio St.3d 160, 2005-Ohio-4384, ¶ 25-29
- LE firearm Serial Number- Law enforcement firearm serial number and other security records redacted pursuant to R.C. 149.433
- Infrastructure records- 149.433 (A)(2)- Any record that discloses the configuration of a public office's "critical systems" such as its communications, computer, electrical, mechanical, ventilation, water, plumbing, or security systems.
- SSN-R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(dd) 149.45(A)(1)(a)- *State ex rel. Office of Montgomery County Pub. Defender v. Siroki*, 108 Ohio St.3d 207, 842 N.E.2d 508, 2006-Ohio-662, ¶ 18; R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(dd); and R.C. 149.45(A)(1)(a).

- Driver's license number-R.C. 149.45(A)(1)(C)18 U.S.C. § 2741, Driver's license numbers are considered personal information, exempt from disclosure, pursuant to R.C. 149.45(A)(1)(c), and are further protected from disclosure by the Driver's Privacy Protection Act of 1994. 18 U.S.C. § 2741.
- Medical Records- 149.43(A)(1)(a). Information obtained from medical records redacted. R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(a).
- Information on Victim(s) - Records creating a high probability of revealing the identity of a victim. Victim's Rights O.R.C. 149.43 (A)(1)(rr) records, documents, and information the release of which is prohibited under R.C. 2930.04 and 2930.07. Crime victims are provided certain rights detailed in the Ohio Constitution Article I, Section 10(a) and the Ohio Revised Code, often called "Marsy's Law" or the Ohio Crime Victims' Bill of Rights. The name of the victim was redacted to protect the privacy interests of the victim. Due to their highly sensitive nature, photos of the victim at the scene of the death have been withheld. See also *State ex rel. GateHouse Media Ohio Holdings II, Inc. v. Columbus Police Dept*, 2025-Ohio-5243.
- Nudity-Ohio R.C.149.43 (A)(1)(ii) Any depiction by photograph, film, videotape, or printed or digital image under either of the following circumstances: (i) The depiction is that of a victim of an offense the release of which would be, to a reasonable person of ordinary sensibilities, an offensive and objectionable intrusion into the victim's expectation of bodily privacy and integrity, (ii) The depiction captures or depicts the victim of a sexually oriented offense, as defined in section [2950.01](#) of the Revised Code, at the actual occurrence of that offense. A person's nude body, unless, subject to division (H)(1) of this section, the person's consent has been obtained RC 149.43 (h). See also R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(ii)(i) and See also *State ex rel. GateHouse Media Ohio Holdings II, Inc. v. Columbus Police Dept*, 2025-Ohio-5243.
- Account numbers- R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(dd) &149.45(A)(1)(d), Financial Account Numbers (including bank and credit card account numbers) Pursuant to R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(dd) and R.C. 149.45(A)(1)(d)
- Autopsy photos & reports- Autopsy photographs and reports, pursuant to R.C. 313.10(D). Information obtained from medical records withheld - R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(a).
- Phone number- Residential and familial information of designated public service workers pursuant to R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(p) and R.C. 149.43(A)(7)-(8)
- Address-Residential and familial information of designated public service workers pursuant to R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(p) and R.C. 149.43(A)(7)-(8)
- Employee ID numbers- 149.433 (2) and (3). Employee ID numbers are not public record, pursuant to R.C. 149.433 (2) and (3).

- All officers work shifts- R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(uu), Records of the past, current, and future work schedule of a designated public service worker. As used in division (A)(1)(tt) of this section, ‘work schedule’ does not include the docket of cases of a court, judge, or magistrate.
- Work shift/Days Off-Confidential Law Enforcement Investigatory Records (CLEIRS), pursuant to R.C. 149.43(A)(2)(a)-(d) Records pertain to a law enforcement matter and disclosure would create a high probability of revealing: The identity of an uncharged suspect, R.C. 149.43(A)(2)(a) and R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(uu), “Records of the past, current, and future work schedule of a designated public service worker. As used in division (A)(1)(tt) of this section, ‘work schedule’ does not include the docket of cases of a court, judge, or magistrate.
- OHLEG photos documents and audits- Information, data, and statistics obtained from the Ohio Law Enforcement Gateway (OHLEG) database, pursuant to 109.57(D)(1)(b)
- CCH- Information from the Computerized Criminal History (CCH) National Crime Information Center (NCIC) systems, pursuant to R.C. 109.57 and O.A.C. 4501:2-10-06(C)
- LEADS-Information from the Law Enforcement Agencies Database Systems (LEADS), pursuant to O.A.C. 45-1:2-10-06(c)
- EMS Run Sheet- When a run sheet created and maintained by a county emergency medical services (EMS) organization documents treatment of a living patient, the EMS organization may redact information that pertains to the patient’s medical history, diagnosis, prognosis, or medical condition R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(a), and physician-patient privilege R.C.149.43(A)(1)(v), R.C. 2317.02(B), *State ex rel. Nix v. Cleveland*, 83 Ohio St.3d 379 (1998).
- PII (confidential personal information)- Personal information as defined by Ohio Revised Code Chapter 1347 is not a public record pursuant to R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(v).
- FMLA- Records relating to certifications, recertifications or medical histories of employees/family members, created for FMLA purposes. Note: these records and documents “shall be maintained as confidential medical records in separate files/records from the usual personnel files” 29 C.F.R. 825.500
