Narrative:

On Tuesday, March 3, 2026, at about 1758 hours, Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI) Special Agent (SA) Doug Burke and Special Agent Supervisor (SAS) Chuck Moran met with family members of Ricardo Davis (Ricardo) and interviewed them about any contextual and historical information they knew about Ricardo. The interview was audio recorded. The times referenced in this report are the elapsed time of the audio recording.

The family members present for the interview were:

- Roosevelt Davis (Roosevelt) – father of Ricardo
- Yukiko Davis (Yukiko) – mother of Ricardo
- Sean Davis (Sean) – brother of Ricardo
- Sonia Davis (Sonia) – sister of Ricardo
- Jordan Davis (Jordan) – brother of Ricardo
- Amber Davis (Amber) – wife of Jordan
- The interview occurred at a residence belonging to Roosevelt's sister

SA Burke explained BCI's role in the investigation of the officer involved critical incident that occurred in Parma, OH on Tuesday, February 24, 2026.

Date of Incident

SA Burke asked the family members if they had any contact or interaction with Ricardo on the day of the incident.

Roosevelt and Yukiko mentioned a text message they received from Ricardo. Roosevelt said Ricardo texted "everybody" that he cared about them and "goodbye." Roosevelt spoke about a specific text message thread involving Roosevelt, Sean, Sharice (sister who lives in California), and Ricardo where Ricardo texted "goodbye."

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Sean asked agents who made the wellness check phone call. SA Burke said that Henry Siekaniec made the call to the Parma Police Department. Sean asked about "notes" that were found. SA Burke explained that there were some notes on the outside of Ricardo's door and in his apartment (observed during a protective sweep). SA Burke said there was a note found in Ricardo's vehicle too. Sean asked about a "timetable" and SA Burke explained some of the process and the approximate time frame of these investigations.

Yukiko asked if Ricardo had a firearm and if it was real. SAS Moran confirmed that Ricardo had a firearm and it needed further testing. Yukiko asked if Ricardo fired shot(s) during the incident. SAS Moran explained that it was unknown if Ricardo fired because the investigation was in its early stages.

Yukiko asked agents if they would be able to tell if Ricardo was "emotional" during the incident. SAS Moran explained that it was generally difficult to prove that Ricardo was emotional, but examining all of the facts and evidence, especially after the officers were interviewed and videos were reviewed, could lead a reasonable person to be informed and draw a conclusion. Yukiko asked if officers ever lie during these cases. SAS Moran informed Yukiko, based upon his experience with these investigations, that it was very rare for officers to purposely lie. SAS Moran explained that there are generally multiple independent sources of evidence available making it very difficult for an officer to be untruthful.

Short-Term History Prior to the Incident

Roosevelt said Ricardo was part of a group text message thread with Roosevelt, Sean, and Sharice where they discussed planning a trip for a graduation in June 2026. Roosevelt said he had not heard from Ricardo in the 10 days (approximately) prior to the incident. Roosevelt said Ricardo had "*grown real quiet*" [11:15] and had not participated much since December 2025 (around Christmas). Roosevelt saw Ricardo in January 2026 (shortly after New Year's).

SA Burke asked if there was anything recent that bothered Ricardo or could have "set him off." Yukiko replied, "*He just couldn't stand the pain anymore*" [16:18].

Roosevelt did not believe that it was "*one thing that set him (Ricardo) off*" [17:08]. Roosevelt mentioned that Ricardo's job with KeyBank was a "very high stress job" even though he received training for six months. Sean explained, "*And one thing with Ricardo, he was very, um, very aware of like the political atmosphere that's going on now. That kind of weighed heavy on him too with all the stuff going on now*" [18:51].

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SAS Moran asked the family members if Ricardo had any special interest in firearms. Roosevelt explained that Ricardo had some past financial difficulties and had an interest in obtaining a security/private investigator job. Roosevelt said he was previously a firearms instructor at the Parma Armory and told Ricardo that he would teach him about firearms, but he did not want Ricardo to ever own one. Roosevelt stated, *"And he (Ricardo) said, 'I won't.' He said, 'I won't, I won't own a firearm'"* [33:19]. Roosevelt believed that Ricardo had a pellet gun but never owned a firearm. Roosevelt heard from a "friend" that Ricardo recently purchased a firearm before the incident

Mental Health History

Roosevelt said Ricardo was taking *"medication and seeking therapy"* [12:05]. Roosevelt said that family members noticed when Ricardo was not taking his medication or attending therapy, because Ricardo's demeanor and character were different. At different times, Roosevelt went to Ricardo's apartment to check on him and try to ensure that he was taking his medication. Roosevelt said Ricardo *"didn't like the way it (medication) made him feel sometimes"* [12:37].

Roosevelt explained a time when he was with Ricardo when he attended a telephone session with a female therapist. Roosevelt classified it as a "good interchange" and Ricardo seemed to *"unburden himself with that and, and that, I think at times when he didn't do that, it would build up inside of him. I, you know, at point when I could tell"* [12:57].

SA Burke asked about any past events and when those events occurred. Roosevelt indicated that he noticed Ricardo's behavior change in December 2025/January.

Sonia mentioned a past event where Ricardo was *"involuntarily, um, uh, put in the hospital for, um, mental issues"* [14:02]. Roosevelt believed that incident occurred about five years ago when they lived in Lakewood. The Lakewood Police Department was involved and took Ricardo to the hospital.

Yukiko explained that Ricardo was hospitalized three times since he was a child and each time he came home, he regretted it and it was more "stressful" for him and he *"couldn't stand it anymore"* [16:50].

Sean said Ricardo was a very "sensitive guy" and *"wore his heart in his sleeve"* [19:17].

SAS Moran asked the family members if Ricardo ever had a negative interaction with law enforcement in the past. Multiple family members replied, "Never." Sean said, *"He (Ricardo) wouldn't hurt a soul"* [20:11].

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Roosevelt explained that Ricardo was a "law abiding person" and they never had disciplinary issues with Ricardo in adulthood and childhood.

SAS Moran asked the family members if Ricardo had an official mental health diagnosis from a medical professional. Roosevelt answered, "*The only one that I know about was just, just acute depression is the only one that I know about*" [21:20]. Roosevelt said Ricardo regularly attended sessions with therapists while in middle school and high school.

Roosevelt said that he was with Ricardo on Memorial Day in 2025 when Ricardo spoke with a therapist by phone and Ricardo allowed him to listen. Roosevelt stated:

And I, and we spoke about it afterwards. I said, that seemed to really do you some good to unburden yourself like that with your therapist. And, uh, he kind of, um, didn't respond one way or another if he felt it helped or not, but I could see his interaction that it helped. I could tell in his demeanor that it helped.

Roosevelt believed that Ricardo attended therapy sessions weekly via telephone. He believed that some of the therapy sessions were in-person too. Roosevelt did not know the names of any of the therapists that Ricardo recently spoke with.

Employment Information

Roosevelt explained that Ricardo was working for KeyBank and started there about one year ago. Recently, Sean learned that Ricardo might have resigned from his position there after he contacted KeyBank about any potential benefits for Ricardo.

Ricardo worked from home performing customer service for small businesses over the phone and online.

Other Relationships and Information

Ricardo was not married and did not currently have a significant other. Ricardo was close friends with Henry "Hank" Siekaniec (the person who reported the welfare check to the Parma Police Department on the day of the incident). Ricardo also spent time with two of his younger cousins and they attended concerts and cosplay conventions in Cleveland.

Sean asked about permission to obtain Ricardo's apartment keys and vehicle keys. Agents explained the location of those keys and the apartment was not being held for evidentiary purposes, but Ricardo's vehicle was still being held for evidentiary purposes.

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Sean asked about the family being able to view the body-worn camera videos. SAS Moran explained that it depended on which special prosecutor was assigned by the Cuyahoga County Prosecutor's Office.

Yukiko asked about obtaining a copy of the case file. Agents explained that the case file would be available once it was closed.

SAS Moran asked the family members what Ricardo was like (minus the details surrounding this incident). Sean said Ricardo was "just quiet, reserved." Sean added that Ricardo was "intelligent and insightful." Sean continued,

He, he just kept to himself. Like, he didn't bother anybody. Like, I swear, like he wouldn't, uh, um, I'm saying he wouldn't, that day he wasn't out there hurt anybody. You know, but, uh, Ricardo was just, I say quiet, shy, reserved, you know, individual. I said loving kind. Um, you know, that's pretty much, pretty much it. [37:50]

Roosevelt said Ricardo went to and graduated from the Cleveland Institute of Art. Ricardo was interested in movies, especially Marvel. Sean said Ricardo traveled with him to Las Vegas to watch the Cleveland Browns play the Las Vegas Raiders last year.

The family members requested to be informed and provided with more details when the investigation was nearing completion.

The interview was audio recorded and was uploaded to the Axon Justice case file. The audio recording was placed in the folder labeled, "Reference Item I."
