Narrative:

On Friday, December 06, 2024, at 1127 hours, Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI) Special Agent (SA) Matthew Armstrong (Armstrong) and SA Nick Valente (Valente) interviewed Massillon Police Department (MPD) who was accompanied by his attorney, Paul Siegferth Jr., from the Fraternal Order of Police. The interview took place at the FOP Ohio Labor Council office located at 2721 Manchester Road, Akron, Ohio 44319. The interview was audio and video recorded.

read, understood, and signed the BCI Criminal Investigation Notification form.

This report only summarizes the information deemed by the author to be of the most relevance to the investigation and does not purport to contain all questions and answers from the interview. Further, this report was placed in a chronology to aid the reader's overall understanding of the information elicited during the interview and may not be reflective of the actual sequencing of questions. It is suggested that the full recording be reviewed to clarify any content or contextual questions regarding the information from the interview.



reviewed his body-worn camera approximately two times. He believed what he observed on his body-worn camera was primarily what he recalled from the incident. On the morning of November 18, 2024, was performing his normal duties as with the MPD. Sometime during the mid-morning, while at the police department, he received a phone call from who was a dispatcher for MPD and Jackson Township Police Department (JTPD). asked if he was in Jackson Township on the Canton Regional SWAT (Canton SWAT) call out. was unaware of any Canton SWAT call out that was active.

informed that there was an active "full team activation" in Jackson Township at 6880 Sunset Strip Avenue NW in North Canton, Ohio. then said, "this guy is shooting at us, he shot a drone down, if you can get here, get here."

immediately went to his unmarked vehicle parked at the MPD and began responding to the incident location. also received a page on his phone for the "full team activation" for Canton SWAT. Minimal details about the incident were provided, and the page simply stated there was a barricaded subject with shots fired at the Rodeway Inn motel.
While was driving, he turned his radio on and changed the channel from the MPD main channel to the Canton SWAT SPEC OPS channel. He listened to the officers who were already on scene in an effort to gain more information about how the incident was unfolding. heard someone on the radio say there was an officer down (officer who was shot) and he also heard gunfire in the background over his radio.
arrived at the Rodeway Inn motel approximately midday (unknown time). When he arrived, he parked on the northwest side of the Cracker Barrel restaurant. He observed a large crowd of people standing on the north side of the restaurant, and police units in the area beginning to shut down roadways.
gathered his equipment and approached the Canton SWAT armored vehicle. The vehicle was parked in front of the involved subject's motel room, Room #220. He approached multiple team members from the Canton SWAT team who were positioned at the rear of the armored vehicle. asked where he was needed and eventually took a position at the rear of the vehicle on the driver's side next to another officer. To his left, he observed a black SUV that he believed was a U.S. Marshal vehicle and a small pool of blood where shot.
also learned some additional information about the involved subject including the subject's identifying information, the motel room number, that the subject had a gun, and that the original call for service was the U.S. Marshals attempting to arrest the subject on a warrant.
recalled hearing commands coming through the PA system of the armored vehicle he was standing behind. He could not recall the actual commands given.
While still positioned at the rear of the armored vehicle, heard gunfire coming from the motel room. He said he knew the gunfire was coming from Room #220 based upon the sound of the bullets impacting behind him and also statements made over the radio by the SWAT who stated he was being shot at by the subject.

was still standing next to another SWAT officer at the rear of the vehicle. The officer stated he was unable to see inside the room. offered to switch positions with him because he had a magnifying scope on his gun, and it would likely allow him to see more clearly.
switched positions with the officer, and as he began to move from cover to look into Room #220, he heard additional gunfire coming from the motel room. He also heard state he was being shot at again. The leaned around the side of the armored vehicle where he could observe muzzle flash(es), a bed, and a mound of pillows. Based on the knowledge given to him by other officers on scene, knew the subject was behind the bed in between the bed and wall. He also could narrow down the location of the subject based on the muzzle flashes.
asked other officers around him if they wanted him to shoot since he had a clear shot on the subject. He was given permission.
At that moment, fired multiple rounds from his firearm. He aimed at the area he believed the subject was based on all the factors previously mentioned. returned to cover. He then went on to describe the scenario, stating, "so the first time I had fired, um I popped back behind cover, started listening for more (gunfire) and at that point I could actually hear him reloading his firearm" [25:49]. then fired his gun a second time at the same general area where the subject was believed to be hiding.
fired his gun because he feared for the safety of who had clearly stated on the radio that he was being shot at. believed he fired his gun approximately 28 times due to the fact that his magazine became empty, and he was required to reload his gun with an additional magazine.
feared for his safety and the safety of the other officers on scene. He also was concerned about the safety of the general public. He explained behind the area where was positioned was a major highway and beyond that there were multiple businesses. He was concerned that the subject was firing in that direction.
As for less-lethal munitions used, observed an OSHP "operator" fire multiple breaching rounds from a less-lethal firearm into the subject's room. He could not recall how many rounds the OSHP operator fired.
The interview concluded at approximately 1159 hours.


