SUMMARY:

On Wednesday, January 21, 2026, Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI) Special Agent (SA) Lurna McClintock and Crime Scene Technician (CST) Michael Rostocil assisted the BCI Force Investigations Unit (FIU) and the North Olmsted Police Department with the processing of an outdoor/indoor crime scene regarding an officer-involved critical incident. The scene was photographed as it was found and evidence was collected. The scene was further documented using a Leica RTC360 3D scanner. BCI Special Agent Jesse Bynum was the lead investigator.

Narrative:

On Wednesday, January 21, 2026, at approximately 1430 hours, CST Rostocil was first contacted by Sergeant Jim Wise with the Elyria Police Department regarding an officer-involved critical incident that took place in the city of North Olmsted. CST Rostocil then contacted BCI Special Agent Larry Hootman and advised that he would respond to the scene and handle the crime scene processing. SA Hootman contacted SA McClintock to also respond.

CST Rostocil responded to 24496 Clareshire Drive Apt. F, North Olmsted, OH 44070 and arrived on scene at approximately 1705 hours. Upon arrival, CST Rostocil met with Sergeant Jim Wise with the Elyria Police Department and Lieutenant Chuck Furito with the North Olmsted Police Department. CST Rostocil learned the following: around 1500 hours, a subject, identified as John P. Johnson committed an armed robbery of a Brinks employee in the city of Elyria, Ohio. He then led police from multiple agencies on a vehicle pursuit which ended in the city of North Olmsted after his vehicle was disabled at the intersection of Brookpark Road and Columbia Road. The subject fled into a nearby apartment complex and forced a woman and her children into their apartment and closed the door. Upon arrival at the apartment, Elyria Police [REDACTED] exited his vehicle, forced entry through the door, and fired his duty weapon at the subject, hitting him several times. The subject was transported to a local hospital but was pronounced deceased.

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The location of the crime scene was on Brookpark Road, just west of Columbia Road where the subject's vehicle came to rest and 24496 Clareshire Drive Apt. F, which was located in an apartment complex south of Brookpark Road (Figure #1). The apartment was a 3 bedroom, 2-story unit with an attached garage and attached to all other units side-by-side. The apartment was accessible through the west door from a courtyard or the east door from the parking side. The entrance was a set of double doors with only the left (south) door open. The door jamb exhibited damage, with a portion broken. The metal strike plate was detached and located on the floor. Additionally, mud was observed on the exterior surface of the door near the handle.

Upon entering the east door, there was a dining area with a table and chairs. Directly to the south was the kitchen which contained a room for a pantry and laundry area and a door that led into the garage. Directly west of the dining room was the living room with a large sectional couch and tables. Off the living room was a bathroom and shower. Along the south wall in the living room was a staircase that led to the second floor which contained 3 bedrooms and a bathroom. CST Rostocil photographed the scene as it was found (Figures #2-3).

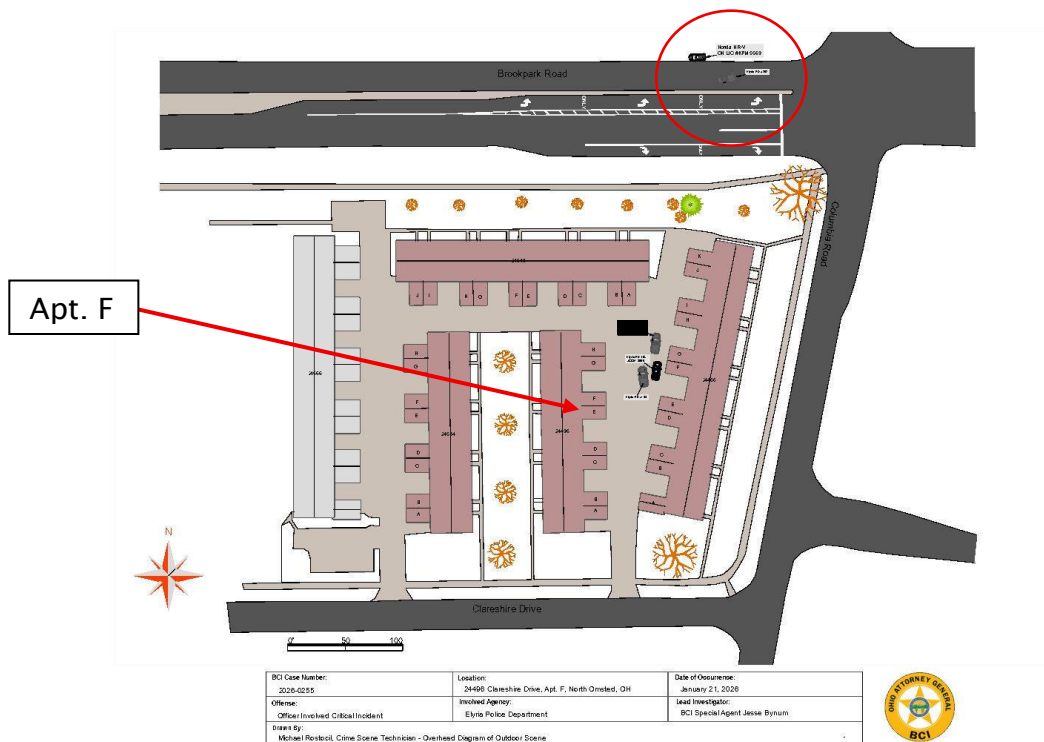


Figure #1 - Overhead diagram of overall scene location

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The subject's vehicle was a black 4-door Honda HR-V bearing Ohio License Plate #KPM 5569. The vehicle was at rest along the north shoulder of the westbound lanes of Brookpark Road, just west of Columbia Road. The vehicle had damage to the passenger side front tire and fender. The interior of the vehicle was photographed and found to contain a suspected green rifle on the rear passenger floorboard and wrapped bundles of money on the front passenger seat and floorboard. The vehicle was not searched and was towed to Elyria Police Department's vehicle storage unit to be processed at a later date.

Elyria Police Department patrol vehicle #292 was at rest in the westbound lanes of Brookpark Road just east of the Honda with damage to the passenger side front tire and fender.

BCI SA Bynum advised CST Rostocil that the neighbor at 24534 Clareshire Drive, Apt. F had ballistic impacts through her doors and bathroom wall and located a fired projectile. The projectile was given to the North Olmsted Police Department and then given to SA Bynum. SA Bynum gave the projectile to CST Rostocil to photograph and package as evidence (**Item #5**). SA Bynum also obtained Elyria Police [REDACTED] pistol and the pistol recovered from the subject. Both were transferred to CST Rostocil to photograph and package as evidence.

The firearm recovered from the subject at the scene was a black Glock 36 .45 Auto semi-automatic pistol (S/N: RUP233). With it was a magazine and 7 FEDERAL 45 AUTO unfired cartridges. This firearm was photographed, packaged, and collected as **Item #33**.

[REDACTED] firearm was a black Glock 45 9x19 semi-automatic pistol (S/N: [REDACTED]) and contained an Oolight undermount as well as a rear sight. With it was one HORNADY 9mm Luger+P unfired cartridge, reported by SA Bynum to have been removed from the chamber. SA Bynum also reported that the magazine in the firearm was a full magazine, reloaded by the officer and was not collected with the firearm. This firearm was photographed, packaged, and collected as **Item #34**.

Apartment F was searched for items of evidence. Evidence was marked with number placards and photographs were taken. A total of 13 9mm fired cartridge cases were located at the scene. Two HORNADY 9mm Luger+P fired cartridge cases were located on the ground just outside the east door of the apartment. These were photographed and collected as **Item #1** and **Item #2**. Just inside the apartment on the floor was another HORNADY 9mm Luger+P fired cartridge case on the rug. It was photographed and collected as **Item #3**. Just inside the door to the right on top of a black shoe mat were two HORNADY 9mm Luger+P fired cartridge cases. These were photographed and collected as **Item #4** and **Item #6**. Another HORNADY 9mm Luger+P fired cartridge case

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was located on top of a table along the north wall just inside the entrance. It was photographed and collected as **Item #7**. Four more HORNADY 9mm Luger +P fired cartridge cases were located on the floor between the dining table and north wall. These were photographed and collected as **Items #8-11**.

On the rug just inside the entrance was a metal fragment, copper in color. It was labeled, photographed, and collected as **Item #12**. Next to the fragment were a pair of handcuffs, suspected to be toy handcuffs. It was unclear if these belonged to any children in the residence or if they were foreign to the scene. They were photographed and collected as **Item #13**. Along the south wall of the dining room were bags of groceries. Next to the groceries was a cut, blue ADIDAS shirt. The shirt was labeled, photographed, and collected as **Item #14**.

Along the south wall of the dining area, just west of the groceries, were two more HORNADY 9mm Luger+P fired cartridge cases. These were labeled, photographed, and collected as **Item #15** and **Item #16**. In the middle of the floor between the dining area and living room was a black sock. The sock was photographed and collected as **Item #17**. An additional matching black sock was located on the sofa and was included as **Item #17**.

On the floor further west was another HORNADAY 9mm Luger+P fired cartridge case, which was photographed and collected as **Item #18**. Just to the north of #18 was a HORNADAY 9mm Luger+P unfired cartridge on the floor. The cartridge was photographed and collected as **Item #19**.

On the sofa were a cut pair of blue jeans with a belt. The jeans also had suspected blood on them. The jeans were photographed and collected as **Item #20**. On top of the jeans was a black wallet containing numerous items, including a birth certificate and social security card for John P. Johnson. The wallet and contents were photographed and collected as **Item #21**. Also on the sofa was a tan-colored Glock 9mm 17-round magazine with 2 cartridges loaded inside of it. At the bottom back side of the magazine the number [REDACTED] was written in black marker. The magazine was photographed and collected as **Item #22**.

On the floor of the living room was a black and gray fleece jacket, cut in 3 pieces. The 3 pieces of jacket were photographed and collected as **Item #23**. Underneath one of the pieces of jacket was another piece of a blue shirt, which matched the blue shirt in **Item #14**. This piece was also packaged as **Item #14**.

A pair of blue and black NIKE shoes were located on the floor of the apartment, one on the floor between the dining table and sofa, in front of a white round chair, and one on

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the floor at the base of the sofa in the living room. Both were photographed and collected as **Item #24**. A pair of blue HANES underwear with suspected blood was located on the floor between the dining table and sofa, just under/in front of a white round chair. The underwear was photographed and collected as **Item #25**. On the floor of the living room at the base of the sofa was a gray and blue jacket, in cut condition. It was photographed and collected as **Item #26**. On the floor between the sofa and dining table was a set of keys with a Honda key fob, Mario keychain, and pink hotel room keychain. The set of keys were photographed and collected as **Item #27**.

The scene was examined for suspected ballistic impacts and numerous ballistic impacts were located and documented. The ballistic impacts were labeled as BI for documentation and trajectory purposes.

BI 1.0 was located through the bottom portion of the blinds and glass of the south window on the west wall (Figure #4). BI 1.0 was circular in shape and most consistent with being an entrance, traveling from east to west, perforating the glass and traveling out of the apartment. A corresponding exit impact was located perforating the screen on the exterior of the window and labeled BI 1.1. The threads of the screen were protruding outward away from the window. The projectile appeared to continue across the courtyard and into Apartment F at 24534 Clareshire Drive. A circular entrance ballistic impact was located perforating the screen door. The screen contained an impact that was nearly circular in shape which was labeled as BI 1.2. The glass inside the door, behind the screen, was shattered, with pieces remaining in the frame and on the ground. The projectile continued into the main door, perforating it. An irregularly shaped entrance on the exterior side was labeled BI 1.3 and a corresponding irregularly shaped exit impact on the interior side was labeled as BI 1.4. Inside Apartment F there was a ballistic impact to the exterior bathroom wall directly to the west of the front door. This ballistic impact was a keyhole shaped entrance impact which perforated the wall. It was labeled as BI 1.5. On the interior side of the bathroom there was perforating damage to the wallpaper covering the wall, with star-shaped tears around a central impact. This was labeled as BI 1.6. The resident of Apartment F located the projectile on the floor and collected it, giving it to the North Olmsted Police Department. This was the same projectile given to CST Rostocil from SA Bynum (**Item #5**).

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BI 2.0 was a suspected ballistic impact(s) located on the back side of a dining room chair on the south side of the dining table (Figure #5). The impact(s) were irregular and elongated in shape, with a general direction of east to west. Due to the damage, it is unclear if this was created by one or multiple projectiles. On the west side of the chair, slightly below BI 2.0 was a suspected exit impact with inner padding material protruding out from it. This impact was labeled as BI 2.1.

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BI 3.0 and BI 4.0 were suspected ballistic impacts located to the front edge of the chaise portion of the sofa in the living room (Figure #6). Both were elongated and elliptical in shape, perforating the cushion, traveling from east to west. BI 3.0 appeared to have a leading edge along the fabric of the sofa on the east side of it. Corresponding exit impacts were located at the corner of the cushion of the sofa just west. These impacts were labeled BI 3.1 and BI 4.1 collectively since they could not be definitively separated. Both impacts had cushion stuffing protruding from the impact sites.

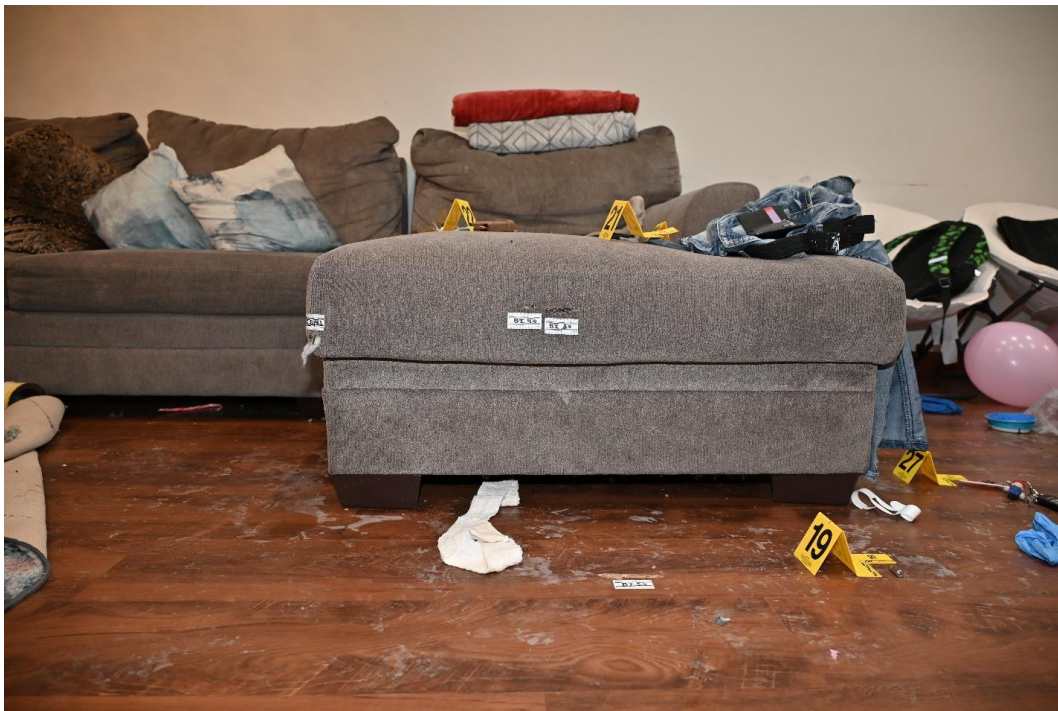


Figure #6 - Overall location of BI 3.0/3.1 & BI 4.0/4.1

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Further west, under the white coffee table was a storage cube. The east face of it had two suspected ballistic impacts, both keyhole in shape (Figure #7). These were labeled BI 3.2 and BI 4.2 collectively. The storage cube was further examined and found to contain two projectiles inside, along with numerous items appearing to be damaged by the projectiles. The projectiles were photographed and collected as **Item #28** and **Item #29**.

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BI 5.0 was located on the floor in front of the chaise portion of the sofa, below BI 3.0 & BI 4.0 (Figure #8). BI 5.0 was an elongated, ricochet impact to the floor with a leading edge on the east side, indicating its path of travel was from east to west.

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BI 6.0 was located in the area rug in the living room (Figure #9). The suspected ballistic impact was irregular and elongated in shape, with frayed carpeting. Pieces of wood composite were surrounding it. Upon lifting the area rug, there was an impact on the floor, which was labeled as BI 6.1 (Figure #10). BI 6.1 was an elongated, ricochet impact with a leading edge on the east side, indicating the projectile traveled from east to west.

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BI 7.0 was a perforating impact located in the lower portion of the east face of the coffee table in the living room (Figure #11). The impact was circular in shape. After reviewing body camera footage, it should be noted that the coffee table was not originally in the position as it was found during crime scene processing. Due to similar looking wood particles surrounding BI 6.0 in the area rug, it is possible that BI 7.0 is in the same trajectory as BI 6.0/6.1, and was the first impact in the sequence.

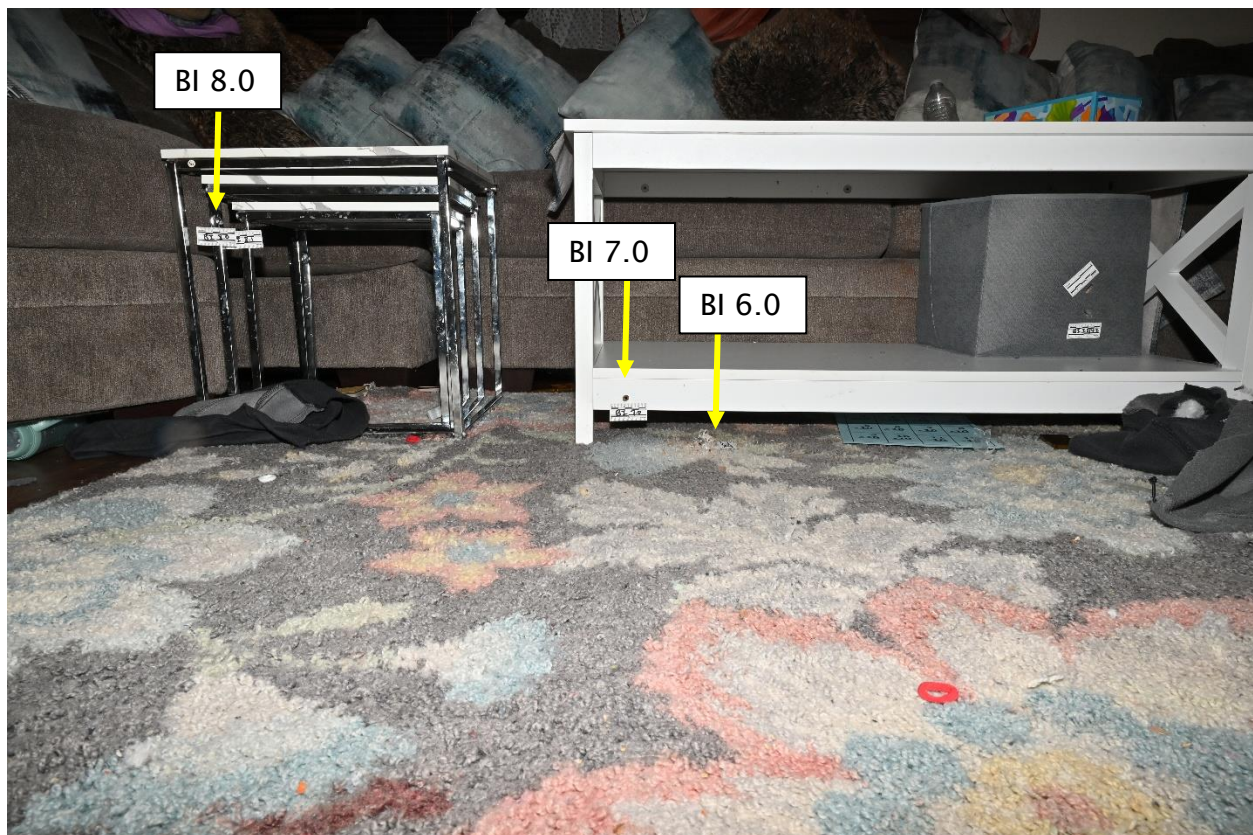


Figure #11 – Overall location of BI 6.0-8.0

BI 8.0 was an impact to the metal leg of nesting table in the living room (Figure #11). The impact was irregular in shape with bent metal. It was not fully perforating, and a corresponding impact was located in a different metal leg of the small table slightly behind, labeled as BI 8.1. It was irregular in shape with bent metal. It is consistent with the projectile striking the first leg, deflecting slightly and impacting the second leg. These tables were also not in the same position as they were during the shooting event.

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BI 9.0 was a perforating impact to the lower front edge of the sofa along the west wall in front of the windows (Figure #12). BI 9.0 was nearly circular in shape with frayed edges of the fabric around the central impact. BI 9.0 was located just west of BI 6.1 on the floor and it is possible that it is part of the trajectory of BI 6.0. Upon removing the bottom cushion, a perforating exit impact was located through the bottom of the sofa, indicative of stuffing protruding from the site (Figure #13). It appeared the projectile then perforated the back of the sofa, exiting the back side of it, labeled as BI 13.0¹ (Figure #14). BI 13.0 was irregular in shape with fabric protruding out and away from the sofa. An entrance impact in the west wall behind the sofa was located and labeled as BI 13.1 (Figure #15). This impact was keyhole in shape with clean margins. A curtain hanging in front of it had irregular damage to it, indicating the projectile most likely traveled through the curtain prior to the wall. No attempt to retrieve the projectile from the wall was made at the time.

BI 10.0 was a penetrating impact to the lower front edge of the sofa along the west wall in front of the windows, next to BI 9.0. Inside of it was a metal fragment that fell onto the floor and was photographed and collected as **Item #30**.

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BI 11.0 was a perforating impact to a throw pillow located at the south end of the sofa along the west wall (Figure #16). The impact was oval in shape and had apparent bullet wipe² around the edge. A corresponding exit impact was located on the back side of the pillow and labeled as BI 11.1. BI 11.1 was circular in shape with stuffing material protruding from it. A corresponding re-entry impact was located in the sofa back cushion behind the pillow and labeled as BI 11.2. BI 11.2 was nearly circular in shape with frayed edges of fabric around the site. Upon examination of the back of the sofa, a corresponding exit impact was located perforating the back side and labeled BI 11.3. BI 11.3 was a larger defect with stuffing material protruding from it. A corresponding re-entry was located in the west wall of the living room behind the sofa and labeled as BI 11.4. BI 11.4 was irregular in shape and had stuffing material carried into the impact site, which was protruding from it. No attempt to retrieve the projectile from the wall was made at the time. Upon moving the sofa away from the wall, a fired projectile was located underneath the sofa on the floor. The projectile was photographed and collected as **Item #31**.

² Bullet wipe is the discolored area caused by a physical transfer from the surface of a projectile to a target on the immediate periphery of a projectile entrance – *OSAC 2025-N-003 Standard Terminology for Shooting Reconstruction*

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BI 12.0 was a ricochet impact to the floor in front of the sofa along the west wall (Figure #17). BI 12.0 was an elongated impact with a leading edge at the east end. A corresponding entrance impact was located in the foot of the sofa just west of BI 12.0. This would be labeled BI 12.1 (Figure #17). The impact was nearly circular in shape and it perforated the foot of the sofa. Upon examination of the back side of the sofa, a corresponding exit was located and labeled BI 12.2. BI 12.2 was irregular in shape with stuffing material protruding out from it and apparent drywall material on the fabric around it. Upon examination of the west wall of the living room behind the sofa, a corresponding re-entry impact was located and labeled BI 12.3. BI 12.3 was a partially penetrating impact where the projectile was visibly lodged in the site (Figure #18). The projectile was removed and collected as **Item #32**.

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The scene and evidence were further documented using a Leica RTC360 3D scanner. The 3D scan data was prepared for viewing using the Leica Regsiter360 software. Four overhead diagrams of the scene were created using the Leica Map360 software and uploaded into the Matrix case file. Figure #19 is one of the overhead diagrams depicting the overall location of evidence located within Apt. F. All 3D scan data was uploaded to Evidence.com.

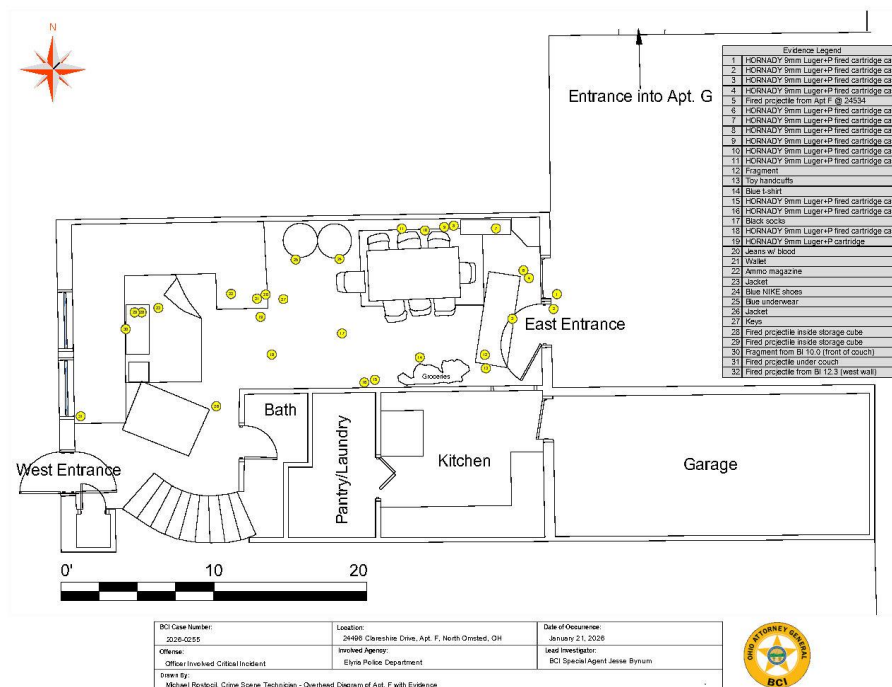


Figure #19 – Overhead diagram of Apt. F with evidence

All items of evidence were turned over to SA Bynum to be transported to the BCI Richfield Office. An Inventory / Receipt Attachment form was filled out and signed by CST Rostocil and SA Bynum. The photographs were uploaded to Evidence.com.

All BCI personnel were clear from the scene at approximately 2240 hours.

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
