#### Narrative:

On Wednesday, May 18, 2022, at 1313 hours, Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI) Special Agent (SA) John Butterworth (SA Butterworth) and SA Matt Collins (SA Collins) interviewed Franklin County Sheriff's Office (FCSO) Detective (Det.) (West, who was accompanied by her attorney, Lathan Lipperman, from the Fraternal Order of Police. The interview took place at the law offices of Harshman and Wannemacher. The interview was audio recorded.

Det. read, understood, and signed the BCI Criminal Investigation Notification form.

This report only summarizes the information deemed by the author to be of the most relevance to the investigation and does not purport to contain all questions and answers from the interview. Further, this report was placed in a chronology to aid the reader's overall understanding of the information elicited during the interview and may not be reflective of the actual sequencing of questions. It is suggested that the full recording be reviewed to clarify any content or contextual questions regarding the information from the interview.

#### Narrative:

On Wednesday, May 18 <sup>th</sup> , 2022, SA Butterworth and SA Collins met with FCSO Det. and Fraternal Order of Police (FOP) Attorney Lathan Lipperman at the law offices of Hershman and Wannemacher to speak with Det. regarding the Officer-Involved Critical Incident that took place on March 7, 2022. Attorney Lipperman provided a copy of Det. s statement about the incident on May 17 <sup>th</sup> for SA Butterworth and SA Collins to review. Before any questions were presented to Det. by agents, SA Butterworth requested Det. read her written statement aloud.
At approximately 1313 hours, Det. was advised of the Bureau of Criminal Identification's (BCI) criminal investigation notification form. SA Butterworth read the Criminal Investigation Notification Form to Det. and asked if she understood the form or if she had any questions. Det. understood the form and did not have any questions. Det. agreed to continue to speak with SA Butterworth and SA Collins. Det. signed the Criminal Investigation Notification Form as did SA Butterworth. According to Det. around 0930 hours she and Clinton Township Police Officer (Officer was inside the Franklin County Sheriff's Office located at 410 South High Street, as this is where she regularly reports for duty. When walking to meet Officer in the parking garage, the elevator opens up to the 8th floor of the garage, and people have to walk down the ramp to get to the east side of the garage that houses the 7th floor. Officer was walking across the 8th floor to get to the 7th floor and meet with Officer when she heard yelling, but could not make out what was being said. Det. stated she observed Officer walking "briskly" north and down the 7th floor parking garage ramp. At that time Det. was said she observed a female black who was yelling "I was just robbed" repeatedly. Det. who also observed two male blacks who appeared to be preparing to fight. Det. states she heard Officer preparedly yelling "law enforcement" and she tried to guide the woman away from the scene.
Det. heard a scuffle and looked to the north to observe Officer head recoiling backwards from what she believed was a strike from the male wearing the gray jacket. Det.

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
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
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Officer and Sgt. were blocking her view. Det. did not recall hearing the suspect say anything during the incident.
In follow up questions with Det. SA Butterworth asked if Det. Recalled anything in Meeks' hands. Det. Side did not have any other information regarding Meeks' hands other than before they went to the ground, his hands were up in a fighting stance. SA Butterworth asked Det. Side if, while Meeks was on the ground, she saw Meeks' hands and she reported she did not. SA Butterworth asked Det. Said she had any part of her shoes missing, as a sole of a shoe was found at the scene. Det. Said she was wearing the same shoes at the time of this interview and not missing the soles. SA Butterworth questioned Det. Side if she heard Meeks say anything. Det. Stold agents that there was a lot of yelling, but she didn't know who was yelling what. She did recall Sgt. Saking for the taser. SA Butterworth inquired if Det. Shad her sheriff's office identification on her and she stated she had her sheriff's office lanyard, but as she ended up putting the lanyard and id card in her pocket. SA Butterworth asked if there was any follow up conversation between those that were involved. Det. Said they all talked after the incident to make sure everyone was ok, but there wasn't anything said while on the parking garage floor that she could recall other than when Officer said he reholstered his gun.
SA Collins clarified with Det. any conversations between the involved officers right after the gunshot and when she smelled gunpowder. Det. again stated she did not recall any conversation between them. Det. clarified that she did not see any gun, but that Officer said it was his gun and he reholstered his gun. SA Collins also asked Det. to clarify her statement regarding Meeks having possession of the gun. Det. said she heard the gunshot and she wondered where the gun came from. She recalled Officer saying it was his gun and that she never saw Meeks with the gun or the gun being involved in the incident.
Det. reported that she later found out the suspect's name to be Rayshawn Meeks and that she has not met nor have had any prior encounters with Meeks.
The interview concluded at approximately 1330 hours.

The interview was audio recorded. The audio recording was attached to this report. The signed BCI Criminal Investigation Notification form is also attached to this report. Please see the attachments for further details.





## **Criminal Investigation Notification**

- 1. This investigation is being conducted in order to determine whether any criminal laws have been violated on the part of those involved in this incident. Specifically, to collect facts and information to be provided to the prosecutor and/or grand jury in order for them to determine whether the conduct involved is authorized or prohibited by criminal statutes.
- 2. Your participation in this interview is voluntary and you may decline to answer or cease the interview at any time. You are entitled to have an attorney present if you wish.
- 3. The criminal investigation is separate from any internal, administrative investigation which your employer may or may not be independently conducting. You are not being compelled to give any statement or answer any questions. This is **not** a "Garrity" interview (where you could be required to answer).

This statement is regarding my involvement in an incident that occurred on Monday, March 7, 2022, at about 9:40 a.m. I am voluntarily providing this statement as part of the investigation being conducted by the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI).

I was hired by the Franklin County Sheriff's Office (FCSO) on May 31, 2016. I do not have any prior law enforcement experience, but I was enlisted in the Army for about 19 years.

My regular assignment is the Special Investigations Unit (SIU). My regular duty hours are from 8:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m., with Saturday and Sunday off.

At the time of this incident, I was wearing plainclothes as part of my undercover assignment: a gray Cleveland Browns hoodie, jeans, and white tennis shoes. I was not wearing any tactical vest carrier. Since this event occurred during a break, I was not carrying my FCSO-issued weapon, a Springfield 9mm handgun. Though I did not have that weapon on me, I was current in my range qualifications. I was not carrying any other firearm or weapon (mace, taser, etc.).

I was not working with a partner. But FCSO Deputy Declan Feery and FCSO Sgt.

were present during this incident, as well as Clinton Township Officer

(who was assigned to the FCSO as part of a special taskforce). Officer and Sgt.

were in plainclothes, and Deputy Feery was wearing the patrol uniform.

I do not suffer from any disabilities. I also have good hearing and eyesight and do not need hearing aids or glasses/contacts. I did not consume any alcohol in the 48 hours before this incident, nor did I consume any medication that could impair the performance of my duties. I did not work any special duty or overtime in the 24 hours before this incident. I arrived at my 8:00 a.m. shift well-rested.

As part of my undercover assignment, I regularly report to the FCSO building at 410 South High Street. I arrived at that location around 8:00 a.m. and parked in the garage attached to that building, specifically on the seventh floor. For the first hour and a half, I worked on impounding seized drugs. Just after 9:30 a.m., Officer texted me and asked if I wanted to meet in the parking garage for a smoke break. I replied and said I would meet him after I ran to the bathroom.

A few minutes later, Officer texted that he was at his vehicle parked on the seventh floor, near the far east wall. I got to the parking garage but did not see Officer which I relayed to him by text. He replied and told me to come east to the other side of the garage. Since the elevator exits on the eighth floor, I started walking east towards the split in the middle of the garage that leads to the seventh floor. As I did so, I saw Sgt. talking to a few other deputies on the far east wall of the eighth floor.

I heard yelling as I neared the seventh floor, but I could not make out what was being said. Moments later, I saw Officer briskly walking north down the seventh-floor garage ramp and saw a female black yelling "I was just robbed!" repeatedly. That woman was bleeding profusely from her head/face. She saw me and ran towards me just as I got to the seventh floor. At that time, I saw two male blacks down (north of) the garage preparing to fight. I recall one of those men wearing dark pants and a gray hoodie/jacket. I also heard Officer repeatedly yelling "law enforcement!" I tried to guide the woman away from the scene, but I heard a scuffle, looked north, and saw Officer head recoiling backwards from what I believed was a strike from the male wearing the gray jacket. That same male then postured aggressively such that he was going to continue his attack on Officer

I lost sight of the injured woman and the other male and ran north to help Officer

I believe at that time Deputy Feery appeared and ran north with me as well. By the time I approached, Officer was on the ground trying to subdue the suspect. The suspect was on his (I believe) left side, facing Officer He was thrashing about, actively resisting. I quickly knelt behind the suspect, near his legs. Sgt. appeared and knelt near the suspect's torso. We three tried to put the suspect onto his stomach so that he could be handcuffed, but he was violently resisting. He repeatedly tried to kick me. In response, I struck his hip about three times with my right hand, but the suspect kept resisting.

Sgt. welled "tase him!" several times. I assumed that statement was directed at Deputy Feery since he was in the patrol uniform and likely had a taser, but I did not know for sure. Moments later, I heard what I believed was a taser deploying followed instantly by the sound of a loud pop. At first, I did not know from where or what made that sound. But an instant later, Officer yelled "he shot himself in the head!" and I smelled gun powder. I immediately checked the suspect's pockets and asked where the gun was. Officer replied that, "He's got my gun, but I just reholstered it!"

The suspect's body went limp after the gunshot. At that time, I believed the suspect had died from his gunshot wound to the head. I did not see the wound, but I saw some blood pooling near the suspect's head. I stood up and called FCSO SIU Sgt. Nate Smith. I told him we needed assistance on the seventh floor of the parking garage and that a suspect had taken Officer weapon and shot himself. I also told him that a female had been attacked. After I hung up, someone realized that the suspect was still alive. Officer quickly ran to his vehicle and grabbed a medical kit. He returned, and he and I quickly put on gloves and assessed the suspect's injuries: We quickly turned the suspect onto his side and saw the entry and exit wounds

near the front and back his head. I held his head while Officer and I wrapped the injuries with gauze to stem the bleeding.

About that time, other deputies arrived on scene. One of those deputies gloved up and relieved me. Another deputy announced that anyone involved needed to leave the scene. I was then taken with Officer back to the 410 building. I waited there until investigators with BCI arrived to collect evidence. This ended my involvement in this incident.

approaching the males to when the suspect fired the weapon. Before I approached the suspect, I knew that a female had been assaulted and was bleeding profusely from her head/face. I also heard Officer repeatedly announce himself as law enforcement as he approached the two males scuffling. Instead of surrendering, one of those males attacked Officer then continued violently resisting, which required Officer to take him to the ground. Again instead of giving up, the suspect tried kicking me several times once on the ground. At no time did the suspect indicate that he was going to surrender.

I do not know how the suspect gained access to Officer weapon. I was not aware the suspect had the weapon until after he fired. Before the suspect fired, I was focused on the lower half of his body and controlling his legs. Even from my peripheral vision, I could not see the suspect's arms or hands since Officer and Sgt. were largely blocking my view. I do not recall the suspect saying anything during this incident.

After this incident, I learned the suspect's name is Rayshawn Meeks. I have never met Mr. Meeks, nor have I had any previous encounters with him. I also had the chance to review the footage of the event captured from a garage surveillance camera. From my review of that footage, it appears that I ran (north) down the garage ramp towards the injured female a moment

before the suspect struck Officer I had previously recalled the injured woman running towards me. The suspect's assault on Officer I drew my attention away from the female, and I quickly moved north to help Officer Moments later, the suspect appeared to lunge at Officer who in turn took the suspect to the ground with the help of Sgt. I then quickly got onto the ground behind the suspect to help subdue him as I recalled.
