Narrative:

On April 5, 2025, Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI) Special Agent (SA) Doug Eveslage received a Facebook video labeled "Bystander 1" from Lieutenant Carl Fair. This video was posted on social media by a citizen that lives in an apartment behind 4411 Montgomery Road, Cincinnati, Ohio. The video shows Norwood Police having a conversation with the Norwood Fire Department about the officer involved critical incident that is occurring with Akeem Holtz, Karita Thomas, and the Norwood Police Department on the second floor of 4411 Montgomery Road. The "bystander" has been identified as Kimberly Brock (Brock), and Brock makes several statements while recording this video that discuss observations she witnessed of Akeem Holtz prior to law enforcement contact.

SA Eveslage and Lt. Fair conducted an interview with Brock at the Norwood Police Department on May 22, 2025. During the interview Brock said that she has heard the male, now identified as Akeem Holtz (Holtz), "hooting and hollering" the words "this is my fucking neighborhood" as he was in the parking lot of 4411 Montgomery Road, Cincinnati, Ohio. She has noticed Holtz driving the red van for the past several days also. Brock described Holtz driving the van in circles fast enough to make the tires constantly squeal as he was holding the driver's door open and hitting a bat or stick against the driver's door. Brock described Holtz yelling at her "this is my fucking neighborhood" the few times she has seen him.
