Narrative:

On June 7, 2022, BCI Special Agent Perry Roeser received and reviewed the external hard drive (reference #1) from Union County Chief Deputy Tom Morgan regarding the Officer-Involved Critical Incident under investigation from May 30, 2022. The 1TB hard drive contained the following:

- Body-worn and cruiser camera footage
- 911 calls
- Training files, firearm requalification, discipline records, and use of force reports from the involved officer
- Radio traffic from the Marysville Police, Fire Department, and Union County Sheriff's Office







Deputy Matejko has a performance document on file from a similar incident on 2/1/2020, where he was warned about his pursuit response speeds while traveling in low speed zones in the City of Marysville.

Recommended Discipline: Verbal Reprimand with counseling.

<u>Statement of Deputy Jacob Matejko, Union County Sheriff's Office,</u> <u>Regarding Incident of May 30, 2022</u>

Background

I began full-time employment with the Union County Sheriff's Office as a Deputy Sheriff in February 2017. I completed basic peace officer training at the Delaware Area Career Center in April 2014. Prior to joining the Union County Sheriff's Office, I served as a Patrol Officer with the Sharon Township Police Department in Franklin County from August 2014 until February 2017.

I have prior military experience, having served in the United States Air Force from 2009 through 2010. I was honorably discharged.

I am a graduate of Marysville High School, Marysville, Ohio graduating in 2009. Thereafter, I attended some classes at Columbus State Community College.

My current supervisor at the Union County Sheriff's Office is Sgt. Chad Lee. My regularly assigned work hours are from 6:00PM until 1:00AM. I am off Wednesday and Thursday nights; I work Friday through Tuesday. In addition to my patrol duties with the Sheriff's Office, I also serve as a K9 Handler.

I wear contacts; I do not take prescription medication that would affect my ability to operate as a law enforcement officer. I was not under the influence of alcohol or any drug, prescription or otherwise, on the date of the Meadowlark Lane incident.

I have received no discipline during my employment as a Deputy Sheriff.

As to use of lethal force, I used lethal force on April 30, 2022. This incident resulted in a BCI investigation which is currently ongoing. I was interviewed by BCI regarding the incident on May 10, 2022.

My use of less-than-lethal force during my career is limited to one (1) Taser deployment and one (1) o/c spray deployment.

I am familiar with the Union County Sheriff's Office use of force policy, as I am trained on the policy on a yearly-basis. I was trained on these policies in the summer of 2021 by my supervisor, Sgt. Chad Lee. I also reviewed these policies in preparation for my BCI interview on May 10, 2022.

I carry a Glock 17 as my primary duty weapon. The pistol is issued to me by the Sheriff's Office. I last qualified for the weapon in May of 2022. I carry three (3) magazines, two (2) on my belt and one (1) magazine loaded in the pistol. There are twenty-two (22) rounds of ammunition in the magazine in the pistol, and seventeen (17) rounds of ammunition in the two (2) magazines on my belt. I load one (1) additional round in the chamber of the pistol.

On the date of the Meadowlark Lane incident, I was carrying the following items: Glock 17, two (2) magazines, K9 remote, Taser, radio, flashlight and two

(2) pairs of handcuffs. I had access to a SIG M400 rifle which was issued to me by the Sheriff's Office.

On the Saturday and Sunday, May 28 and 29 respectively, I worked from 6PM until 2AM. Which is my normal shift plus one-hour of overtime. I was wellrested at the time of the incident on Monday, May 30, 2022, as I had slept approximately six (6) hours and napped for an hour earlier in the day, prior to reporting to work.

I was dressed in the regular County Sheriff's BSSA approved uniform.

I was wearing a body camera in accordance with Sheriff's Office policy. I drove to the incident scene in a marked patrol Ford Explorer (#67) which was equipped with an in-car video recording system that was working (audio and video) during the incident. I was not carrying any personal recording device.

Incident Narrative

On May 30, 2022, I reported to work at 6pm which was the midpoint of the afternoon shift. I first went to the Dispatch Center with the intent to finish a report from my previous shift. I overheard a 911 call received by two (2) dispatchers that reported there was a person with a gun pointing it at others in the 1500 block of Meadowlark Lane. I left immediately to respond to the call. As I left the Dispatch Center, I was aware that other units from the Union County Sheriff's Office, as

well as Marysville Police Department were also responding. As I responded to the area, I was notified that the suspect, later identified as Matthew Toddhunter, was in a white pickup truck on the street.

I arrived northbound on Meadowlark Lane, a residential street, at approximately 6:35PM. It was still daylight; lighting was good, and the weather was very warm. I was the first to arrive and immediately saw Matthew Toddhunter in a white pickup truck parked northbound on the street blocking a driveway. I parked my cruiser in the middle of the road behind the pickup truck. There was no traffic. There were other cars parked on the street, but it did not impede my line-ofsight. The back window of Mr. Toddhunter's pickup truck was tinted but I could clearly see his driver side window was down.

Two middle-aged females pulled up southbound in a white Audi at approximately the same time I did. They parked their car on the southbound side of the road in front of me. I recognized the one female as Brittney Harding due to prior law enforcement contact with her. I exited my cruiser and stood behind my cruiser door in case I needed to use it for cover. I had my firearm drawn because the call was for a man with a gun.

I then ordered Mr. Toddhunter to put his hands out of the window multiple times. As I was trying to give Mr. Toddhunter commands the two females were out of their car yelling at me.

After telling Mr. Toddhunter multiple times to put his hands out of the driver side window he eventually complied. When Mr. Toddhunter put his hands out of the window, he had nothing in them. Around this point Ms. Harding yelled that Mr. Toddhunter did not have a gun. I then ordered Mr. Toddhunter to exit the vehicle slowly. Mr. Toddhunter then proceeded to put his hands back into the vehicle and when he did so I was unable to see what he was doing.

Mr. Toddhunter then exited his vehicle extremely quickly with a black handgun ("gun") in his right hand down by his side. The gun had no external markings or indicators that would have put me on notice that it was not a gun. Despite what Ms. Harding had said, I saw that Mr. Toddhunter had a gun.

As I was ordering Mr. Toddhunter to drop the weapon he pointed the gun directly at me in a shooting stance. I fired approximately four (4)-five (5) rounds. When I fired my rounds, the backdrop was the front of his pickup truck. I aimed at Mr. Toddhunter's center mass to stop the threat he posed to me. When I fired, I faced an immediate threat to my life. After I fired, I notified dispatch twice that shots had been fired.

Ms. Harding then immediately jumped on Mr. Toddhunter's body and began yelling. I tried to tell Ms. Harding to move so that we could get him help. As I approached Mr. Toddhunter, the gun was lying next to his body, and I kicked it away. When I kicked the gun away, the back of the handle came off and I was able

to see a CO₂ cannister on the back of the gun. It was only at that point that I began to think that the gun was not real. Once the gun was away from Mr. Toddhunter's body Sergeant Ron Nicol, from the Marysville Police Department, picked it up. Ms. Harding at some point yelled that it was a BB gun. She had to be dragged away from Mr. Toddhunter so that he could receive medical assistance.

After me, the first units to arrive on the scene were Marysville Police Department Officers, Curtis Wycoff and Derek Palumbo. Other Union County Sheriff's Office Officers had arrived on the scene as well.

I next remember Union County Sheriff's Office Sergeant Kent arriving and removing me from the scene and Deputy Rich Crabtree taking me back to the Sheriff's Office. I met with BCI SA Perry Roeser. Later another BCI agent took photos of me.

I used lethal force in this incident by discharging my firearm because I do not believe that there was any less lethal force that I could have used that would have been as effective in stopping the immediate threat which Mr. Toddhunter, by pointing his gun directly at me, posed to me. My action in firing my firearm, as described above, was consistent with my training and experience as a law enforcement officer.

I did not have any prior law enforcement contact with Mr. Toddhunter before this incident. I knew of him only through contact other Deputies had with him, but I did not recognize him by name when I first arrived at the scene. I also had no prior social contact with Mr. Toddhunter.

My statement is made from the best of my recollection as to the incident on May 30, 2022. On June 2, 2022, I viewed my body cam video as well as my cruiser video. My viewing of these videos has not changed my recollection of the events, as expressed in this statement.

I wish to cooperate with this investigation and am prepared to answer any questions which you might have.

On May 30, 2022, at approximately 1839 hours, I heard Deputy Matejko mark enroute to a call. I was riding in the passenger seat and Deputy Trout was in the driver's seat of the cruiser (8007). We checked the CAD System and saw he was enroute to an individual with a gun call. Many UCSO units marked enroute to the scene. While enroute to the scene, I heard Deputy Matejko mark "one at gun point" and then "shots fired". We escalated our response to the scene. We arrived on scene after Deputy Mitchell, Deputy Jarman, and Deputy LeVan. There were some conflicting statements as to what had occurred, a note in the CAD Call stated there was a self-inflicted gunshot wound but Deputy Matejko had marked shots fired. Once on scene at approximately 1847 hours, I observed multiple deputies performing first aid on an individual laying on the ground. The male on the ground was covered in blood.

I observed Deputy Matejko kneeling on the ground in front of the male laying on the ground. Deputy Matejko stood up, and I escorted him away from the individual and had him sit inside of a sheriff's cruiser, I tasked Deputy Austin with staying with Deputy Matejko at this time. I asked Deputy Matejko if he discharged his firearm, to which he replied "yeah". I notified all UCSO Command Staff and activated the CISM Team per Sheriff Patton's approval. Deputy Brown and Deputy Crabtree were notified.

I spoke with Sergeant Ronald Nicol with the Marysville Police Department. We were attempting to determine whose scene it was. Sgt Nicol believed it was their scene since it was their original call, I agreed. At this point, Marysville Police Department was taking photographs and began canvasing the area for witnesses, with the help of Deputy Mitchell and Deputy Jarman.

I then removed Deputy Matejko's firearm from his holster and replaced it with mine. While wearing latex gloves, I unloaded Deputy Matejko's Glock 17 and bagged the firearm, magazine, and chambered round separately. Deputy Crabtree arrived on scene shortly after. Deputy Crabtree escorted Deputy Matejko to his cruiser and took him back to our office. I remained on scene to assist the Marysville Police Department. As UCSO Command Staff members arrived on scene, I briefed them on the information I had at the time.

Gradually as more UCSO Command Staff members and Marysville Police Department Command Staff members arrived on scene, I became less involved. BCI arrived on scene shortly after and began processing the scene. Once the BCI investigators indicated they were ready to take possession of Deputy Matejko's firearm, I transferred it to the custody of the BCI investigators.

Marysville Police Department remained on scene for scene security with BCI. Deputy Trout and I cleared the scene at approximately 2223 hours.

On May 30, 2022, Sergeant Kent and I responded to 1551 Meadowlark Ln Marysville, OH, for a Deputy Involved Shooting.

Upon arrival I ran up past a few cruisers that were already on scene. I noticed Deputy Mitchell, Deputy Jarmin and a three Marysville Police Officers rendering aid to a male individual, in the middle of the road near a white Dodge truck. The male individual appeared to have a gunshot wound to his right abdomen, his left upper chest area, and his right arm. I put on a pair of rubber gloves and took over applying pressure to the gunshot wound in the male's upper left chest. While I continued to hold pressure we turned the male onto his side, to check for exit wounds. I did not observe any exit wounds.

When medics arrived on scene, I continued to apply pressure while medics were sliding the soft stretcher under the male. I helped lift the male until I had to move out of the way, to get the male onto the hard stretcher. When I moved out of the way someone else took over applying pressure to the gunshot wound.

After the male was transported to the hospital I remained on scene with Sergeant Kent and maintained a perimeter around the scene.

On Monday May 30th, 2022, at 1840 hours, Deputy Jarman and I were dispatched to 1551 Meadowlark Lane, Marysville, Ohio 43040, regarding a person with a gun call. The caller. Lindsay Todhunter, advised dispatchers, "someone was there with a gun". Lindsay continued stating, "Matthew Todhunter has been pointing a gun at people". Lindsay advised she was inside the residence with the children and "Matthew is outside". Dispatchers later learned, "Matthew told one of the children 'This is the day that daddy is going to die'". Deputy Matejko, Deputy Levan, Deputy Phelan, Deputy Austin, Deputy Payton, Deputy Trout, and Sergeant Kent were also enroute.

Dispatchers received a second call from Savannah Vorhies who stated, "after a parent drop off, the father (Matthew) pulled a gun". Savannah continued stating, the "male is sitting outside in a white truck". Savannah advised "the gun is in the truck with the male" and all the windows were rolled up. Savannah could not see inside the truck due to the truck's tinted windows. It should be known, Savannah is Lindsay's sister-in-law.

While Savannah was still on the phone with dispatchers, dispatchers learned, "the male's (Matthew) girlfriend just pulled up". Dispatchers told the caller "multiple times to keep everyone inside until officers come to the door". Savannah advised dispatchers, "the male shot himself, girlfriend ran over to the vehicle".

Deputy Matejko marked on scene over the radio. Deputy Matejko stated, "one at gun point" over the radio. At 1844 hours, Deputy Matejko marked on the radio stating, "shots fired-shots fired". Deputy Jarman and I arrived on scene at 1845 hours. I exited the front passenger seat of cruiser #8010 and approached the scene. As I was approaching the scene, I observed Deputy Matejko walking back toward's my direction. I asked Deputy Matejko if he was ok.

As I continued toward the scene, I observed a white male laying on the ground covered in blood. I observed two Marysville City Police Officers rendering first aid to the male, later identified as, Matthew Todhunter. I observed a white female wearing a red shirt and blonde hair, later identified as, Brittany Harding (Matthew's girlfriend) run toward's Matthew's white Dodge pickup truck. Brittany attempted to enter the pickup truck through the driver's side door. Officer Palumbo (Marysville City Police Department) grabbed a hold of Brittany and told her to exit the crime scene. I softly grabbed a hold of Brittany's right arm and helped guide her out of the crime scene. This was because Matthew's black handgun was still laying in the street, near his truck, and the truck was part of the crime scene. At the time, deputies/officers also did not know what was inside the truck (other weapons, etc.).

I ran back to Matthew to assist in rendering first aid (Marysville Police Officers were still actively rendering first aid). I grabbed gloves and applied medical gauze to a bullet wound on the right side of Matthew's abdomen. I observed Marysville City Police Officers had applied a tourniquet to Matthew's upper left arm. Officers were holding pressure on Matthew's upper left chest. Deputy Jarman checked Matthew's carotid several times checking for a pulse. Deputy Jarman relayed to other deputies/officers that Matthew had a strong pulse. Deputies/Officers gently turned Matthew onto his right side attempting to assist in opening his airway. At this time, medics with the Marysville Fire Department arrived on scene. I kept the medical gauze applied to the right side of Matthew's abdomen while medics assessed him. Medics along with deputies/officers lifted Matthew onto a stretcher where he was transported to the hospital for further evaluation.

Deputy Payton and I learned Brittany had a heart condition so medics were called to evaluate Brittany. Deputy Payton stood by with Brittany until medics arrived. Brittany was upset stating Matthew had a BB gun and "being pulled off of Matthew" (prior to my arrival).

Deputy Jarman and I began speaking with neighbors in the area. Deputy Jarman and I obtained written statements from neighbors who stated they heard Matthew's truck driving up and down the street and heard "yelling". The neighbors I spoke with stated they heard yelling but could not make out what was being said. The neighbors stated they were in the back yard of there residence when they heard approximately four gun shots.

Sergeant Kent advised Deputy Jarman and I we could clear from the scene. This concludes my involvement in this case.

On May 30, 2022, Union County 911 center received a call on Meadowlark Lane about a male pointing a gun at people. At this time, multiple deputies marked en route along with Marysville P.D. At approximately 1844 hours, Deputy Matejko aired "shots fired". I arrived shortly after at approximately 1848 hours.

When I arrived, I met with Sgt. Kent who was escorting Deputy Matejko back to a cruiser. Sgt. Kent asked me to stay with Deputy Matejko as a peer supporter. I stayed with Deputy Matejko until Deputy Crabtree arrived on scene. At this time, Deputy Crabtree drove Deputy Matejko back to the station. I cleared the scene shortly after, at Sgt. Kent's request. This concludes my involvement in the incident.

On May 30, 2022, I responded to a person with a gun/shots fired call at 1551 Meadowlark Lane, Marysville, Ohio, 430040. The following paragraphs, in substance and among other things, will describe the events which took place regarding my interaction at the incident.

- 1. The Union County Sheriff's Office received a report of a male with a gun who was threatening to shoot individuals. Deputy Matejko arrived on scene and after a short period of time aired "Shots fired". I responded to the scene due to the potential of an officer being shot or involved in the shooting.
- 2. Upon arriving on scene and making sure none of the officers were physically injured, I began to assist Deputy Mitchell and Deputy Jarman. Deputy Jarman and Mitchell were speaking with Brittany Harding and Cheryl Watts who were visibly upset/emotional. Brittany seemed to be upset with Deputy Jarman, so I took over talking with Brittany and Cheryl.
- 3. I got Brittany (Matthew's fiancé) and Cheryl (Brittany's mother) moved over behind the crime scene tape and began speaking with her. Brittany advised she works in a hospital and was upset due to "being pulled off of Matthew while trying to do CPR". I explained to Brittany that we need to secure the scene before administering aid.
- 4. Brittany was breathing heavily and was in emotional distress. Cheryl told me Brittany has POTS (cardiac issue) and I requested another medic due to Brittany's emotional state. Due to her heavy breathing and her heart condition, I attempted to get Brittany to sit down and control her breathing. Brittany eventually sat down with me, and we started on controlling her breathing until the medics arrived to evaluate her.
- 5. Marysville medics arrived on scene and began to evaluate Brittany. Eventually, Brittany denied medical treatment and I walked Cheryl and Brittany to the Marysville Police officers on scene so they could complete witness statements. Sgt. Kent advised I was no longer on scene, and I cleared the scene without incident.

Phase 1: Receiving the Call

On May 30th, 2022, at approximately 1840 hours, I Deputy Jarman, (Badge #820) notified dispatch that I would be responding to the call dispatch aired over the radio referencing the caller advised someone was at 1551 Meadowlark Lane, Marysville, Ohio with a gun. Deputy Matejko (Badge #858) was the first Deputy to respond on the radio, which was aired at approximately 1839 hours. Deputy Matejko was at the Union County Sheriff Office along with Deputy Mitchell (Badge #830) and I when the call first aired.

Deputy Mitchell and I were currently working on a report and Deputy Matejko entered the room with a sense of urgency and asked Deputy Mitchell and I if we were going to be responding to the call as he quickly moved out the door of the patrol room. Deputy Mitchell quickly asked Deputy Matejko what the call was about and to which Deputy Matejko responded that it was a call referencing that someone had a gun. Immediately Deputy Mitchell and I grabbed our equipment and rushed out the patrol room towards our vehicles with a sense of urgency. This was when I notified dispatch that I would be responding to the call which was at approximately 1840 hours.

Phase 2: Navigating to Call

I rushed up the stairs along with Deputy Mitchell and exited the building to the UCSO parking lot where my patrol cruiser (Marked #8010) was parked. Upon getting outside the building, I observed Deputy Matejko's cruiser lights and sirens activated as he drove out the parking lot turning onto 5th street. At this point Deputy Mitchell and I were seated in our patrol car with the above listed marking and activated our lights and sirens as well heading to turn right out the parking lot onto 5th street.

I asked Deputy Mitchell while navigating to the call where it was at and how to get there quickest. Like myself Deputy Mitchell was not familiar with the address listed. Deputy Mitchell decided to use his phone for GPS navigation by which point we were close to the East and West bound ramps for U.S. 33. Deputy Mitchell advised me to turn left onto U.S. 33 West.

As I safely began making my turn onto U.S. 33 West Deputy Matejko aired on the radio "one at gun

point". Throughout the drive to the call, I had used my lights and sirens to navigate to the call quickly while maintaining safety. I called out intersections as I cleared them and assured myself as much of a gap as possible between myself and other vehicles. While driving down U.S. 33 West towards State Route 31, Deputy Matejko aired out "shots fired" multiple times over the radio.

I was already at a high rate of speed and pushed the speed at this point as hard as I possibly could while vigilantly scanning the road ahead of me assessing any vehicle movement to ensure I would not harm any innocent bystanders driving. While doing this Deputy Mitchell ensured I knew where I would be going next in advance due to the high rate of speed. Deputy Mitchell also used other patrol cruiser buttons to activate different noises outside of my sirens such as blow horns to ensure vehicles in front of my cruiser knew and identified that my patrol car was coming up behind them.

I drove onto the State Route 31 ramp north bound towards Kenton and took that ramp straight to the light. I ensured once again to clear the intersection before turning. Upon turning onto Meadowlark Lane, I saw multiple people outside their homes. Ensuring I did not hit anyone I pulled up behind the patrol cruiser already parked at the scene and put my cruiser into park while Deputy Mitchell announced that we both were on scene.

Phase 3: Making First Contact

When Deputy Mitchell and I exited the patrol cruiser, Deputy Mitchell began running up the center of the street towards the other cruisers and the subject's vehicle (Matthew Ryan Todhunter). Deputy Mitchell had his County issued firearm at the low while running up the center of the street however, I did not due to the fact I my left and right limits were filled with houses and civilians. I entrusted in Deputy Mitchell to secure our front sector of fire while I vigorously observed the surroundings. Deputy Mitchell and I found Deputy Matejko walking towards us visibly emotional. Behind him were Marysville officers attempting to render aid to the subject listed above.

As I approached the subject and officers around him, I saw a tourniquet placed on the upper left arm of the subject and what appeared to be a bullet hole in the subjects mid to low abdominal area. As I looked at what medical supplies the officers had there, I believed that we might need better options to stop the bleeding and help buy the subject as much time as possible until EMS arrived. I ran to my cruiser to grab my personal medical kit and ran back to the subject and officers.

I handed Deputy Mitchell my Med Kit and rushed over to two unknown females that were getting close to the subject's body. Both females were very emotional and knew the subject. They were stating to help him and that the firearm (which was currently laying several feet from the subject's body at this point) was not real. Looking at the firearm however, it had a black finish and appeared to be a real pistol at first glance. Without physically inspecting it I believed it to be a real firearm and did not want anyone that was not

law enforcement related around the subject or firearm. The firearm was secured by a Marysville Officer a few moments later.

Phase 4: Rendering Aid

During the time that Deputy Mitchell and I helped render aid to the subject I noticed the subject make a noise from the mouth that gargled and attempted to suck in. I believed that it could be possible that the subject had a sucking chest wound. I wanted to gently turn the subject on his side to visually inspect for any exit holes and to attempt drain some blood out of the mouth. While other officers assisted me in doing this as gentle as possible, I visually saw what appeared to be a purple in color knot in the middle of his back.

I believed this could be possibly bullet fragments that did not exit the subject body and considering Union County Sheriff Office issues hollow point rounds for our pistols this seemed to make sense that the round did not exit the subject's body. I did have medical gloves on and checked for wounds behind the subject's head as well however I did not feel or see any wounds. I only saw a lot of blood covered in his hair. I did check twice for a pulse on the subject's neck before EMS arrived and the subject still had a fairly strong pulse. Officers and Deputies used gauze and other medical equipment I had in my med kit until EMS arrived.

Phase 5: EMS Arrives

EMS arrived at the location at 1850 hours. When they approached the subject's body and officers with the subject, I advised the EMS team of what I did and what I observed. I told EMS that I felt for a pulse and found one on the subject and that I believed he could have a sucking chest wound. When I notified them of this however, I did not state sucking chest wound as I was drawing a blank due to the high adrenalin rush and stated to them that I believed he would need a puncture to his airway due to the subject not breathing and having large amounts of blood coming from the mouth.

EMS pulled out a stretcher to put the subject on and attempted to provide air to the subject through the mouth with an air pump device that covers the mouth. At this point EMS had taken control of the subject regarding medical treatment.

After stepping away from EMS and the subject I walked over to Deputy Matejko's cruiser where I found him and several other Deputies that were tasked to stay with Deputy Matejko. I took off my medical gloves that were covered in blood and laid them on the road next to Deputy Matejko's vehicle wanting to also check on him. Deputy Matejko was emotional and speechless. I did not have many words to say to him after looking at him and the pain he appeared to be feeling. I just stated that he still had a pulse and began thinking of anything else I could possibly do to help. I begun walking around the neighborhood to houses that had people standing outside them and asked if they had heard or seen anything. The first house on the right-hand side of Meadowlark Lane had several people outside stating they observed the subject drive down their road several times speeding and had never seen him before.

I asked the individuals if they would be willing to write voluntary witness statements and several of them stated that they would. I grabbed as many statement forms and pens as I had and passed them out to the individuals. I told them to please take their time and if they had any questions to ask, I would answer them if I could. Upon completion of the statements, I collected them all and was instructed by Deputy Mitchell to not write questions on the statements for the individuals to answer as I normally would any other time. I did not question this and collected the statements handing them to Deputy Mitchell. Deputy Mitchell and I then cleared the scene and returned to the Union County Sheriff Office to meet with BCI as instructed.

On May 30, 2022, at 1839 hours, Deputy Matejko marked enroute to a call. Dispatch then aired a man was pointing a gun at people at 1551 Meadowlark Lane. Deputies and units from Marysville PD began to respond to the scene.

I responded from Fels Blvd and Watkins Rd. I activated my overhead lights and sirens and responded to the scene. While responding to the scene, Deputy Matejko marked on scene and "One at Gunpoint" shortly after. As I was making the turn onto Northwoods Dr from SR 31, Deputy Matejko aired "shots fired." Upon arriving at the intersection of Northwoods Dr and Mill Rd, I took a left turn at the round about after misinterpreting the map. I realized my mistake moments later, performed a U turn and continued on Northwoods Dr, where I turned right onto Meadowlark Lane.

I arrived on scene and parked behind a Marysville PD cruiser. I removed my office issued rifle and grabbed my IFAk bag. I approached the scene where I observed the suspect, later identified as Matthew Ryan Todhunter laid spread eagle on his back on the ground near a white Dodge truck with multiple gunshot wounds. Matthew was covered in blood and was continually coughing blood out of his mouth. I observed a black pistol on the ground separated from the suspect. Marysville PD officers began to render first aid to Matthew.

After realizing the scene was safe, I began to return my rifle to my cruiser to free up my hands to help with rendering aid. While walking away from the scene, Brittany Harding, the fiancé of Matthew attempted to access his truck. Brittany attempted to enter the truck through the driver door. Officer Palumbo with Marysville PD and Deputy Mitchel gained control of Brittany and escorted her out of the immediate crime scene. I returned to my cruiser and unloaded my rifle, returning it to condition 3. Sergeant Kent and Deputy Trout arrived on scene at this time.

While walking back to the immediate scene, I observed Sgt. Kent escorting Deputy Matejko back to sit in my cruiser. I followed to offer peer support to Deputy Matejko. Deputy Austin arrived on scene to stay with Deputy Matejko. Officer Palumbo and I began to tape off the crime scene. Deputy Payton arrived on scene at this time. Prior to enclosing the scene, Medic 271 exited the crime scene. Deputy Payton requested a second medic for Brittany Harding, as she has a heart condition and was experiencing complications. I assisted a Marysville PD officer with finding and marking shell casings on the scene. Once the second medic arrived, I helped deputy Payton escort Brittany Harding and her mother, Cheryl to the second medic.

I remained on scene as my cruiser was inside the tape but was not directly involved with anymore proceedings. Once I was relieved from the scene by Sgt. Kent, I returned to the office.



MUTUAL AID COMPACT

This Mutual Aid Compact ("Compact") is dated 1-24-, 2019, and is between the Sheriff of Union County, Ohio, 221 W. Fifth Street, 2nd Floor, Marysville, Ohio, 43040 (Sheriff), and the City of Marysville, Division of Police, 209 S. Main Street, Marysville, Ohio, 43040 (City)(collectively, "Parties").

WHEREAS Revised Code sections 737.04 and 311.29 authorize municipal corporations and county sheriffs to make contracts to obtain police protection or additional police protection, and to provide for services of police departments, the use of police equipment or the interchange of services of police departments or police equipment within the territories of their respective subdivisions; and

WHEREAS, the Sheriff and the City make this Compact to enhance the capabilities of law enforcement in Union County and City and to provide their respective citizens more efficient law enforcement in emergency situations and during those actual or potential conditions that pose an immediate threat to life or property and exceed the capability of a single agency to counteract successfully; and,

WHEREAS, the Sheriff and the City desire to provide for mutual assistance by the interchange and use of their law enforcement agency personnel and equipment within their respective service areas without limitation, but generally in accord with the following guidelines; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties, in consideration of the mutual promises and obligations here by the other;

SECTION 1:

Each of the Parties agrees to furnish upon request of the highest ranking officer of the other Party on duty at the time of the emergency, such law enforcement personnel and equipment as is requested in so far as such personnel and equipment is available in the opinion of the highest ranking officer on duty of the Party receiving the request for aid.

SECTION 2:

Any law enforcement personnel and equipment furnished upon request may be recalled at the sole discretion of the highest ranking officer on duty of the Party furnishing such law enforcement personnel and equipment.

SECTION 3:

Any law enforcement officer of either party, who becomes aware of a law enforcement officer of the party in distress, has the authority to go into the territory of the other party to offer assistance to the law enforcement officer in distress. The responding officer shall use reasonable law enforcement discretion and judgment in doing so.

SECTION 4:

The parties agree that there shall be no reimbursement for loss or damage to equipment used in activity under this Compact. The Parties agree that there shall not be any reimbursement for any indemnity award or premium contribution assessed against the employing law enforcement agency for workers' compensation benefits arising by reason of injury or death to a member of a Party while engaged in rendering services under this Compact.

SECTION 5:

The Parties agree that their respective law enforcement agency members acting outside the political subdivision in which they are employed may participate in any pension or indemnity fund established by their employer to the same extent as while acting within the employing subdivision and they are entitled to all the rights and benefits of sections 4123.01 to 4123.94, inclusive, of the Ohio Revised Code, to the same extent as while performing law enforcement services within the subdivision in which they are employed.

SECTION 6:

The Parties agree that the consideration herein is derived from the mutual benefit to each of the parties hereto in increased law enforcement protection, and that no charge shall be made to any political subdivision entering into this compact for services rendered by any other political subdivision under the provisions of this Compact.

SECTION 7:

At any occasion to which assistance is called pursuant to the terms of this compact, the officer in charge of the requesting agency on duty at the time that the mutual aid request is made, upon consultation (if practical) with the highest ranking officer on duty of the requesting party, shall have full charge and authority over any assisting equipment and personnel responding to such call.

SECTION 8:

The Parties agree that this Compact shall begin on the effective date set forth in the opening paragraph and shall be in effect for a period of three (3) years. The Compact shall be

automatically renewed for successive periods of three (3) years. Either Party may terminate this Compact by giving written notice, hand-delivered or sent by certified U.S. mail, to the other Party and to the Union County Prosecuting Attorney.

SECTION 9:

The Parties agree that all personnel of the responding agency when responding to a call for assistance shall be acting within the scope of their employment while enroute to, enroute from, and while acting within the territory of the requesting law enforcement agency, provided that the responding personnel are following their own department's policies and procedures.

SECTION 10:

The Parties agree that there shall be no liability, responsibility, nor cause of action for breach of contract between the parties to this compact if a request for assistance is denied, delayed, or inadequate, or, if furnished assistance is not needed upon arrival.

SECTION 11:

When mutual aid is utilized, radio communication should be established, if possible, through the use of MARCS radio or any other form of radio communications that may be mutually available to the cooperating agencies.

SECTION 12:

In the event of a mass arrest (multiple persons arising from a single incident) the Party providing mutual aid under this Compact shall assist in the preliminary processing of arrestees, said assistance consisting of:

- a. Identification of arrestee,
- b. Control of property obtained from arrestees,
- c. Completion of arrest forms.

The Party providing mutual aid in cases of mass arrest may also assist in transporting prisoners and shall assist the other Party in detailing and securing prisoners if a temporary detention facility is utilized.

SECTION 13:

Each Party will be responsible for its own acts and omissions and the actions of its own personnel who respond to the other Party's request for assistance. Subject to any available defenses and immunities, each Party will be responsible for any and all damages, costs, and expenses that arise out of the negligence, tortious acts, or other conduct of itself or its respective agents, officers, or employees. In no event shall either Party be liable to the other Party for indirect, consequential, incidental, special, or punitive damages, or lost profits.

SECTION 14:

This Compact may be executed in two or more counterparts including signing a facsimile or scanned, electronic version, which together shall constitute a single instrument. This Compact and any document relating to it may be executed and transmitted to any other party by facsimile or other electronic imaging method, which shall be deemed to be, and utilized in all respects as, an original, wet-inked, manually executed document. This Compact shall become effective only when counterparts have been signed by each of the Parties and delivered to the other Parties; it being understood and agreed that all Parties need not sign the same counterparts.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Union County Sherriff's Office and the City of Marysville Division of Police have accepted this Compact hereunto duly authorized by Ohio Revised Code Sections 505.43, 311.29, and 737.04.

Patrol Function

400.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The purpose of this policy is to define the functions of the patrol unit of the Office to ensure intraorganizational cooperation and information sharing.

400.1.1 FUNCTION

Deputies will generally patrol in clearly marked vehicles. They will patrol assigned jurisdictional areas of Union County Sheriff's Office, respond to calls for assistance, act as a deterrent to crime, enforce state, local and federal laws when authorized or empowered by agreement or statute, and respond to emergencies 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Patrol will generally provide the following services within the limits of available resources:

- (a) Patrol that is directed at the prevention of criminal acts, traffic violations and collisions, the maintenance of public order and the discovery of hazardous situations or conditions.
- (b) Crime prevention activities, such as residential inspections, business inspections and community presentations.
- (c) Calls for service, both routine and emergency.
- (d) Investigation of both criminal and non-criminal acts.
- (e) The apprehension of criminal offenders.
- (f) Community Oriented Policing and problem-solving activities, such as citizen assists and individual citizen contacts of a positive nature.
- (g) The sharing of information between the patrol and other divisions within the Office, as well as other government agencies.
- (h) The application of resources to specific problems or situations within the community that may be improved or resolved by Community Oriented Policing and problemsolving strategies.
- (i) Traffic direction and control.
- (j) Disasters, civic unrest, and natural emergencies.
- (k) Assist in the service of civil papers.

400.1.2 ESCORT SERVICES

- (a) Escort services may be provided in the following instances:
 - 1. Funerals (on a routine basis and as work load allows).
 - 2. Money escorts: upon request, escort will be approved for persons depositing large sums of cash. The escorting deputy will follow the depositor to the designated deposit facility and remain until the deposit is safely accomplished.

- 3. Public officials and dignitaries will be provided police escort within the boundaries of Union County, upon approval of supervision.
- 4. Other unexpected situations which might arise require approval from supervision.
- (b) Civilian vehicles
 - 1. Deputies will not escort civilian vehicles under emergency circumstances.
 - 2. Emergency escorts will not be provided for non-government functions.
 - 3. If a medical emergency exists, the deputy will either summon appropriate aid and render assistance until EMS personnel arrive or shall direct the party to the nearest medical facility.

400.1.3 TERRORISM

It is the goal of the Union County Sheriff's Office to make every reasonable effort to accurately and appropriately gather and report any information that may relate to either foreign or domestic terrorism. Deputies should advise a supervisor as soon as practicable of any activity believed to be terrorism related and should document such incidents with a written report or Field Interview (FI).

Supervisors should ensure that all terrorism-related reports and field interviews are forwarded to the Chief Deputy or the Patrol Division Commander in a timely fashion.

400.1.4 LOCKOUT

The Union County Sheriff's Office will make every attempt to handle all vehicle lockout situations by dispatching a deputy upon request. This type of call is not a priority, unless circumstances would warrant otherwise; i.e., a small child locked inside a residence or vehicle without the presence of an adult would be cause for the call priority to be upgraded.

It is the responsibility of the on-scene officer to make the determination whether or not to attempt to unlock the door in question. The following are some of the points to consider prior to making an attempt to unlock.

- Does danger exist to life or property? If so, gain entry immediately using the quickest, safest and least expensive method available.
- If no danger exists, the deputy will need to consider if he/she has received the proper training to unlock without damaging the locking mechanism. If not, inform the owner/ driver that a lock smith or towing service should be contacted. If the complainant so desires, the Communications Center can contact a locksmith or tow operator and relay the information to the complainant.
- Except in emergency situations, have the owner/driver sign a liability release form (See attachment).

It is the policy of the UCSO that deputies will not unlock vehicles with side impact air bags due to the inherent dangers associated with this type of action and cost. Deputies may attempt entry by other means if there is an immediate threat to human life. If for some reason damage is caused to the locking mechanism or door, a report should be completed which lists the type of damage and method of entry attempted.

400.1.5 FORCED ENTRIES

Forced entry situations may arise out of 9-1-1 unknowns; a request to check the well being of a person, senior watches, and other calls for service.

Deputies will consider and comply with all of the following before forcing entry:

- (a) A shift supervisor or OIC should be made aware of the situation and respond to the scene, if available.
- (b) If not already involved in the incident, the appropriate Fire and EMS Agency should be dispatched to the scene in a non-emergency status.
- (c) Deputies should attempt to discover all pertinent information on any medical or psychological conditions of the residents through CAD, neighbors, friends, complainants, or relatives.
- (d) If applicable, deputies should attempt to find out who the employer is and contact them for information about relatives and other information about employees.
- (e) All contacts should be exhausted in an effort to locate someone who may be able to open the residence or who is related to the resident owners or potential victim(s). This includes contacting all neighbors that live near the location of the call, contacting landlords, having dispatchers check phone books, county directories, CAD, and other in-house records for any potential family members.
- (f) If entry is necessary:
 - 1. Ask a relative or the complainant to do the entry.
 - 2. Attempt various forms of contact with the person (i.e. loud knocking at various entrances to the house or facility, telephone, if it is a multi-storydwelling, try knocking on 2nd floor windows, if accessible by the use of the fire department equipment and personnel.
 - 3. If an entry is deemed appropriate, keep officer safety of prime concern.
 - 4. Attempt to find the least destructive or damaging method and location to gain entry into the dwelling.
 - 5. Once inside, a thorough search of the house or facility will be done.
 - 6. If needed, the shift supervisor or OIC will contact the Commander of Investigations to determine if an "on-call" investigator should respond to the scene.
 - 7. The shift supervisor or OIC will contact the Commander of the Patrol Division.
 - 8. An incident report will be taken noting the damage, if any, created upon entry.
 - 9. Photographs will be taken of the damage and the point of entry.
 - 10. If no one is found in the home, the property owner <u>must be</u> notified of the forced entry and the damage created, if any.

- 11. If no one is found in the home, the residence must be re-secured before units leave the scene.
- 12. A "**Notice of Emergency Entry**" form must be left at the building in a noticeable location and a copy included in the incident report.

400.1.6 RESPONSE TO EMERGENCIES AT ADVANCE GAUGING TECHNOLOGIES For procedures related to emergencies at Advance Gauging Technologies, refer to:

400.2 PATROL INFORMATION SHARING PROCEDURES

The following guidelines are intended to develop and maintain intraorganizational cooperation and information flow between the various divisions of the Union County Sheriff's Office.

400.2.1 CRIME REPORTS

A crime report may be completed by any patrol deputy who receives criminal information. The report will be processed and forwarded to the appropriate division for retention or follow-up investigation.

400.2.2 PATROL BRIEFINGS

Patrol supervisors are encouraged to share information as much as reasonably possible. All supervisors and/or deputies will be provided an opportunity to share information through daily patrol briefings, as time permits.

400.2.3 BULLETIN BOARDS

A bulletin board will be kept in the patrol briefing room and the Investigations Division for display of suspect information, investigative reports, and photographs. New General Orders will be made available for patrol supervisors and will be discussed at briefings and shift meetings.

400.3 CROWDS, EVENTS AND GATHERINGS

Deputies may encounter gatherings of people, including but not limited to, civil demonstrations, civic, social and business events, public displays, parades and sporting events. Deputies should monitor such events as time permits in an effort to keep the peace and protect the safety and rights of those present. A patrol supervisor should be notified when it becomes reasonably foreseeable that such an event may require increased monitoring, contact or intervention.

Deputies responding to an event or gathering that warrants law enforcement involvement should carefully balance the speech and association rights of those present with applicable public safety

concerns before taking enforcement action. Deputies are encouraged to contact organizers or responsible persons to seek voluntary compliance that may address relevant public safety/order concerns.

Deputies should consider enforcement of applicable state and local laws when the activity blocks the entrance or egress of a facility or location and when voluntary compliance with the law is not achieved.

Use of Force

300.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

This policy provides guidelines on the reasonable use of force. While there is no way to specify the exact amount or type of reasonable force to be applied in any situation, every member of this office is expected to use these guidelines to make such decisions in a professional, impartial, and reasonable manner.

In addition to those methods, techniques, and tools set forth below, the guidelines for the reasonable application of force contained in this policy shall apply to all policies addressing the potential use of force, including but not limited to the Control Devices and Techniques and Conducted Energy Device policies.

300.1.1 DEFINITIONS Definitions related to this policy include:

Deadly force - Force reasonably anticipated and intended to create a substantial likelihood of causing death or very serious injury.

Feasible - Reasonably capable of being done or carried out under the circumstances to successfully achieve the arrest or lawful objective without increasing risk to the deputy or another person.

Force - The application of physical techniques or tactics, chemical agents, or weapons to another person. It is not a use of force when a person allows him/herself to be searched, escorted, handcuffed, or restrained.

Imminent - Ready to take place; impending. Note that imminent does not mean immediate or instantaneous.

Totality of the circumstances - All facts and circumstances known to the deputy at the time, taken as a whole, including the conduct of the deputy and the subject leading up to the use of force.

300.2 POLICY

The use of force by law enforcement personnel is a matter of critical concern, both to the public and to the law enforcement community. Deputies are involved on a daily basis in numerous and varied interactions and, when warranted, may use reasonable force in carrying out their duties.

Deputies must have an understanding of, and true appreciation for, their authority and limitations. This is especially true with respect to overcoming resistance while engaged in the performance of law enforcement duties.

The Union County Sheriff's Office recognizes and respects the value of all human life and dignity without prejudice to anyone. Vesting deputies with the authority to use reasonable force and to protect the public welfare requires monitoring, evaluation, and a careful balancing of all interests.

300.2.1 DUTY TO INTERCEDE AND REPORT

Any deputy present and observing another law enforcement officer or a member using force that is clearly beyond that which is objectively reasonable under the circumstances shall, when in a position to do so, intercede to prevent the use of unreasonable force.

Any deputy who observes another law enforcement officer or a member use force that is potentially beyond that which is objectively reasonable under the circumstances shall report these observations to a supervisor.

300.2.2 PERSPECTIVE

When observing or reporting force used by a law enforcement officer, each deputy should take into account the totality of the circumstances and the possibility that other law enforcement officers may have additional information regarding the threat posed by the subject.

300.3 USE OF FORCE

Deputies shall use only that amount of force that reasonably appears necessary given the facts and circumstances perceived by the deputy at the time of the event to accomplish a legitimate law enforcement purpose.

The reasonableness of force will be judged from the perspective of a reasonable deputy on the scene at the time of the incident. Any evaluation of reasonableness must allow for the fact that deputies are often forced to make split-second decisions about the amount of force that reasonably appears necessary in a particular situation, with limited information and in circumstances that are tense, uncertain and rapidly evolving.

Given that no policy can realistically predict every possible situation a deputy might encounter, deputies are entrusted to use well-reasoned discretion in determining the appropriate use of force in each incident.

It is also recognized that circumstances may arise in which deputies reasonably believe that it would be impractical or ineffective to use any of the tools, weapons or methods provided by this office. Deputies may find it more effective or reasonable to improvise their response to rapidly unfolding conditions that they are confronting. In such circumstances, the use of any improvised device or method must nonetheless be reasonable and utilized only to the degree that reasonably appears necessary to accomplish a legitimate law enforcement purpose.

While the ultimate objective of every law enforcement encounter is to avoid or minimize injury, nothing in this policy requires a deputy to retreat or be exposed to possible physical injury before applying reasonable force.

300.3.1 ALTERNATIVE TACTICS - DE-ESCALATION

When circumstances reasonably permit, deputies should use non-violent strategies and techniques to decrease the intensity of a situation, improve decision-making, improve communication, reduce the need for force, and increase voluntary compliance (e.g., summoning additional resources, formulating a plan, attempting verbal persuasion).

300.3.2 USE OF FORCE TO EFFECT AN ARREST

Any deputy who has reasonable cause to believe that the person to be arrested has committed a crime or public offense may use reasonable force to effect the arrest, to prevent escape or to overcome resistance. A deputy who makes or attempts to make an arrest need not retreat or desist from his/her efforts by reason of resistance or threatened resistance on the part of the person being arrested, nor shall a deputy be deemed the aggressor or lose his/her right to self-defense by the use of reasonable force to effect the arrest, prevent escape or to overcome resistance.

300.3.3 FACTORS USED TO DETERMINE THE REASONABLENESS OF FORCE

When determining whether to apply force and evaluating whether a deputy has used reasonable force, a number of factors should be taken into consideration, as time and circumstances permit. These factors include but are not limited to:

- (a) Immediacy and severity of the threat to deputies or others.
- (b) The conduct of the individual being confronted, as reasonably perceived by the deputy at the time.
- (c) Deputy/subject factors (e.g., age, size, relative strength, skill level, injuries sustained, level of exhaustion or fatigue, the number of deputies available vs. subjects).
- (d) The effects of suspected drug or alcohol use.
- (e) The individual's mental state or capacity.
- (f) Proximity of weapons or dangerous improvised devices.
- (g) The degree to which the individual has been effectively restrained and his/her ability to resist despite being restrained.
- (h) The availability of other reasonable and feasible options and their possible effectiveness.
- (i) Seriousness of the suspected offense or reason for contact with the individual.
- (j) Training and experience of the deputy.
- (k) Potential for injury to deputies, suspects, and others.
- (I) Whether the individual appears to be resisting, attempting to evade arrest by flight, or is attacking the deputy.
- (m) The risk and reasonably foreseeable consequences of escape.
- (n) The apparent need for immediate control of the individual or a prompt resolution of the situation.
- (o) Whether the conduct of the individual being confronted no longer reasonably appears to pose an imminent threat to the deputy or others.
- (p) Prior contacts with the individual or awareness of any propensity for violence.
- (q) Any other exigent circumstances.

300.3.4 PAIN COMPLIANCE TECHNIQUES

Pain compliance techniques may be effective in controlling a physically or actively resisting individual. Deputies may only apply those pain compliance techniques for which they have successfully completed office-approved training. Deputies utilizing any pain compliance technique should consider:

- (a) The degree to which the application of the technique may be controlled given the level of resistance.
- (b) Whether the Individual can comply with the direction or orders of the deputy.
- (c) Whether the Individual has been given sufficient opportunity to comply.

The application of any pain compliance technique shall be discontinued once the deputy determines that compliance has been achieved.

300.3.5 CAROTID CONTROL HOLD

Absent those situations where the use of deadly force would otherwise be authorized, the use of the carotid control hold is not permitted.

300.3.6 USE OF FORCE TO SEIZE EVIDENCE

In general, deputies may use reasonable force to lawfully seize evidence and to prevent the destruction of evidence. However, deputies are discouraged from using force solely to prevent a person from swallowing evidence or contraband. In the instance when force is used, deputies should not intentionally use any technique that restricts blood flow to the head, restricts respiration or which creates a reasonable likelihood that blood flow to the head or respiration would be restricted. Deputies are encouraged to use techniques and methods taught by the Union County Sheriff's Office for this specific purpose.

300.3.7 RESPIRATORY RESTRAINTS

The use of a respiratory restraint, also known as a chokehold, is limited to circumstances where deadly force is authorized and if applied, is subject to the same guidelines and requirements as a carotid control hold.

300.4 DEADLY FORCE APPLICATIONS

When reasonable, the deputyshould make efforts to identify him/herself as a peace officer and to warn that deadly force may be used.

Use of deadly force is justified in the following circumstances involving imminent threat or imminent risk:

- (a) A deputy may use deadly force to protect him/herself or others from what he/she reasonably believes is an imminent threat of death or serious bodily injury.
- (b) A deputy may use deadly force to stop a fleeing subject when the deputy has probable cause to believe that the individual has committed, or intends to commit, a felony involving the infliction or threatened infliction of serious bodily injury or death, and the deputy reasonably believes that there is an imminent risk of serious bodily injury or

death to any other person if the individual is not immediately apprehended. Under such circumstances, a verbal warning should precede the use of deadly force, where feasible.

Imminent does not mean immediate or instantaneous. An imminent danger may exist even if the suspect is not at that very moment pointing a weapon at someone. For example, an imminent danger may exist if a deputy reasonably believes that the individual has a weapon or is attempting to access one and intends to use it against the deputy or another person. An imminent danger may also exist if the individual is capable of causing serious bodily injury or death without a weapon, and the deputy believes the individual intends to do so.

300.4.1 MOVING VEHICLES

Shots fired at or from a moving vehicle involve additional considerations and risks, and are rarely effective.

When feasible, deputies should take reasonable steps to move out of the path of an approaching vehicle instead of discharging their firearm at the vehicle or any of its occupants.

A deputy should only discharge a firearm at a moving vehicle or its occupants when the deputy reasonably believes there are no other reasonable means available to avert the imminent threat of the vehicle, or if deadly force other than the vehicle is directed at the deputy or others.

Deputies should not shoot at any part of a vehicle in an attempt to disable the vehicle.

300.5 REPORTING THE USE OF FORCE

Any use of force by a member of this office shall be documented promptly, completely, and accurately in an appropriate report, depending on the nature of the incident. The deputy should articulate the factors perceived and why he/she believed the use of force was reasonable under the circumstances.

To collect data for purposes of training, resource allocation, analysis, and related purposes, the Office may require the completion of additional report forms, as specified in office policy, procedure, or law. See the Report Preparation Policy for additional circumstances that may require documentation.

300.5.1 NOTIFICATIONS TO SUPERVISORS

Supervisory notification shall be made as soon as practicable following the application of force in any of the following circumstances:

- (a) The application caused a visible injury.
- (b) The application would lead a reasonable deputy to conclude that the individual may have experienced more than momentary discomfort.
- (c) The individual subjected to the force complained of injury or continuing pain.
- (d) The individual indicates intent to pursue litigation.
- (e) Any application of the Electronic Control Device or control device.

- (f) Any application of a restraint device other than handcuffs, shackles, or belly chains.
- (g) The individual subjected to the force was rendered unconscious.
- (h) An individual was struck or kicked.
- (i) An individual alleges unreasonable force was used or that any of the above has occurred.

300.6 MEDICAL CONSIDERATION

Once it is reasonably safe to do so, medical assistance shall be obtained for any person who exhibits signs of physical distress, has sustained visible injury, expresses a complaint of injury or continuing pain, or was rendered unconscious. Any individual exhibiting signs of physical distress after an encounter should be continuously monitored until he/she can be medically assessed. Once compliance has been obtained, individuals should not be kept on their stomachs, as this could impair their ability to breathe.

Based upon the deputy's initial assessment of the nature and extent of the individual's injuries, medical assistance may consist of examination by an emergency medical services provider or medical personnel, at a hospital or jail. If any such individual refuses medical attention, such a refusal shall be fully documented in related reports and, whenever practicable, should be witnessed by another deputy and/or medical personnel. If a recording is made of the contact or an interview with the individual, any refusal should be included in the recording, if possible.

The on-scene supervisor or, if the on-scene supervisor is not available, the primary handling deputy shall ensure that any person providing medical care or receiving custody of a person following any use of force is informed that the person was subjected to force. This notification shall include a description of the force used and any other circumstances the deputy reasonably believes would be potential safety or medical risks to the subject (e.g., prolonged struggle, extreme agitation, impaired respiration).

Individuals who exhibit extreme agitation, violent irrational behavior accompanied by profuse sweating, extraordinary strength beyond their physical characteristics, and imperviousness to pain (sometimes called "excited delirium"), or who require a protracted physical encounter with multiple deputies to be brought under control, may be at an increased risk of sudden death. Calls involving these persons should be considered medical emergencies. Deputies who reasonably suspect a medical emergency should request medical assistance as soon as practicable and have medical personnel stage away, until the scene is secure.

See the Medical Aid and Response Policy for additional guidelines.

300.7 SUPERVISOR RESPONSIBILITIES

A supervisor should respond to a reported application of force resulting in visible injury, if reasonably available. When a supervisor is able to respond to an incident in which there has been a reported application of force, the supervisor is expected to:

- (a) Obtain the basic facts from the involved deputies. Absent an allegation of misconduct or excessive force, this will be considered a routine contact in the normal course of duties.
- (b) Ensure that any injured parties are examined and treated.
- (c) When possible, separately obtain a recorded interview with the individual upon whom force was applied. If this interview is conducted without the individual having voluntarily waived his/her *Miranda* rights, the following shall apply:
 - 1. The content of the interview should not be summarized or included in any related criminal charges.
 - 2. The fact that a recorded interview was conducted should be documented in a property or other report.
 - 3. The recording of the interview should be distinctly marked for retention until all potential for civil litigation has expired.
- (d) Once any initial medical assessment has been completed or first aid has been rendered, ensure that photographs have been taken of any areas involving visible injury or complaint of pain, as well as overall photographs of uninjured areas.
 - 1. These photographs should be retained until all potential for civil litigation has expired.
- (e) Identify any witnesses not already included in related reports.
- (f) Review and approve all related reports.
- (g) Determine if there is any indication that the individual may pursue civil litigation.
 - 1. If there is an indication of potential civil litigation, the supervisor should complete and route a notification of a potential claim through the appropriate channels.
- (h) Evaluate the circumstances surrounding the incident and initiate an administrative investigation if there is a question of policy noncompliance or if for any reason further investigation may be appropriate.

In the event that a supervisor is unable to respond to the scene of an incident involving the reported application of force, the supervisor is still expected to complete as many of the above items as circumstances permit.

300.7.1 USE OF FORCE REVIEW

The initial use of force review and investigation will be conducted by a supervisor, unless the supervisor was involved in the use of force incident. The use of force review and investigation shall be completed utilizing the UCSO Use of Force Review Form .The Commander of the Patrol Division and the Chief Deputy shall review all use of force investigations.

300.8 TRAINING

Deputies will receive periodic training on this policy and demonstrate their knowledge and understanding, at least annually, including use of deadly force, use of force and use of deadly force reporting, and use of force and use of deadly force reviews/investigations.

Subject to available resources, deputies should receive periodic training on:

- (a) Guidelines regarding vulnerable populations, including but not limited to children, elderly, pregnant persons, and individuals with physical, mental, or intellectual disabilities.
- (b) De-escalation tactics, including alternatives to force.

300.9 USE OF FORCE ANALYSIS

At least annually, the Chief Deputy should prepare an analysis report on use of force incidents. The report should be submitted to the Sheriff. The report should not contain the names of deputies, suspects or case numbers, and should include:

- (a) The identification of any trends in the use of force by members.
- (b) Training needs recommendations.
- (c) Equipment needs recommendations.
- (d) Policy revision recommendations.
