Narrative:

From October 3, 2023 through October 10, 2023, Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation Special Agent Steven Seitzman received multiple records from Washington Court House Police Lieutenant Matthew Pfeifer. SA Seitzman reviewed the records and noted the following:

Officer Trevor Phillips Personnel File

- Officer Phillips was appointed to the position of patrol officer on December 25, 2020.
- Officer Phillips' swearing in occurred on December 28, 2020.
- Officer Phillips was issued a Taser X-26 and two cartridges on December 28, 2020 (serial number He had documented Taser training on December 29, 2020.
- Officer Phillips was involved in three on-duty traffic crashes on the following dates: February 15, 2021, August 18, 2021, and July 17, 2023. Two of the crashes were documented in Ohio traffic crash reports, and Officer Phillips was issued traffic citations for both. The last crash was documented in a written reprimand.
- Officer Phillips has two written reprimands, one for unsatisfactory performance (no further details), and the other for the aforementioned traffic crash on July 17, 2023.
- On December 16, 2022, Officer Phillips received a Letter of Recognition for exceptional performance for the year.
- There were no excessive use of force complaints or internal investigations noted in his personnel file.
- Officer Phillips met or exceeded standards for the following evaluation periods: September 2021 (monthly evaluation), the second half of 2021 (bi-yearly evaluation), the first half of 2022 (bi-yearly evaluation), the second half of 2022 (bi-yearly evaluation).

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Use of Force Reports

- Officer Phillips was involved in a use of force on April 24, 2022. The use of force occurred after an arrestee slipped out of handcuffs and took an aggressive posture with handcuffs in her hand. Officer Phillips delivered a drive stun, which did not have the desired effect. A second drive stun was delivered, which allowed Officer Phillips to rehandcuff the arrestee.
- Officer Phillips was involved in another use of force on May 7, 2022. During that incident, a subject with a warrant fled from officers. Two officers, including Officer Phillips, discharged their Tasers, which had the desired effect and allowed the officers to arrest the subject. Both officers were counseled on handcuffing wanted subjects immediately and simultaneous Taser deployments. Both officers advised Lt. Pfeifer that they did not know the other was discharging their Taser until after the fact.
- Both use of force incidents were found to be within Washington Court House Police Department policy.

EMS Run Dispatch Report

- Fayette County Sheriff's Office Communications was notified of an unresponsive person at 18:12:12 hours.
- Fayette County EMS was dispatched at 18:12:50 hours.
- Fayette County EMS went enroute at 18:14:55 hours.
- Fayette County EMS arrived at 18:16:36 hours.
- The Washington Court House Fire Department went enroute to Adena Fayette ER with the Fayette County EMS at 18:41:41 hours.

EMS Incident Report (and subpoena copy)

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• The report detailed life-saving measures attempted by Fayette County EMS. A monitor was attached, which indicated pulseless electrical activity. CPR was continued via a LUCAS machine. Epinephrine and lidocaine were administered and, at one point, a regular rhythm was noted. During another pulse check, a rhythm change to asystole was found. Life-saving measures were continued during the transport to the Adena Fayette Medical Center ER, with no change observed.

Prior Washington Court House Police Department & Fayette County Sheriff's Involvements with Timothy West

- October 15, 2022: West was arrested by Washington Court House PD for possession of drug paraphernalia and cited for driving without a license. He was also found to be in possession of suspected drugs.
- March 6, 2023: A felony warrant was issued for West's arrest for drug possession.
- March 9, 2023: West was arrested by Washington Court House PD during a traffic stop based on the above mentioned warrant.
- June 2, 2023: West was identified as a suspicious person by the Fayette County Sheriff's Office. On the same date, he was involved in a domestic dispute.
- June 12, 2023: West was listed as a suspect in an unauthorized use of a motor vehicle report by the Fayette County Sheriff's Office. On the same date, he was also arrested for possession of drug paraphernalia by Washington Court House PD. He was also in possession of suspected drugs.
- August 24, 2023: West was listed as a witness to disorderly conduct by the Fayette County Sheriff's Office.
- September 3, 2023: West was arrested for possession of drug paraphernalia by Washington Court House PD. He was also listed as an offender for tampering with evidence and possession of suspected drugs.
- On September 15, 2023: A warrant was issued for West's arrest for felony possession of drugs.

Email from Axon to Lt. Matt Pfeifer

• On October 10, 2023, Axon representative Steve Tuttle sent an email to Washington Court House Police Chief Jeffrey Funari indicating Axon was aware of the incident. The email contained three attachments. Lt. Pfeifer advised SA Seitzman that he forwarded the email to the Fayette County Coroner.

The records were added to the electronic case file. SA Seitzman summarized what he deemed to be the most relevant. The reader is encouraged to read the records in their entirety.

LETTER OF RECOGNITION

This letter is to formally thank you for your exceptional performance over the last 12 months. You have gone above and beyond the call for service and have set the bar high for this Department. Your fidelity to the Oath to support the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, State of Ohio and the ordinances of the City of Washington Court House has been the foundation of your exceptional performance. You have performed your duties as a Police Officer for the Police Department above all expectations and we would like to recognize your determination and work performance.

Over the last 12 months you have shown up to work on time and prepared for duty. You keep a positive attitude and are always willing to help any fellow Officer. When directed to perform a task, you don't ask questions, you perform the task at the highest level.

Since January you have made approximately 305 traffic stops enforcing traffic violations while performing your daily patrol. Traffic stops show a high level of drive in keeping our community safe. While enforcing traffic you have educated drivers, got intoxicated drivers off the street before they caused harm to themselves or others to arresting felons and drug traffickers. You have also made approximately 94 arrests for offenses from bench warrants, misdemeanors offenses and felony offenses.

The most impressive statistic you have accomplished was taking drugs off the streets. You have seized approximately 163 grams of meth, 113 grams of marijuana, 92 grams of fentanyl, 33 grams of heroin and numerous scheduled prescription drugs. That is over 14 ounces of dangerous drugs off the streets that didn't make it into the hands of a user which saved lives and put the dealers in prison.

Your Peers have recommended you for commendation due to the seizure from Jordan Adams where you seized 90 grams of meth. That was a great arrest showing your determination and drive to keep Washington Court House safe and prosperous.

Once again, we want to say thank you Patrolman Phillips for your amazing work performance and setting a high standard for the Washington Court House Police Department.

Use of Force Review WPD-2200452

I reviewed the use of force used by Ptl. Derrick Marcum and Ptl. Trevor Phillips on Paul Myers that occurred on May 7, 2022. Officers were at 810 Maple St. attempting to locate Paul on a felony warrant when Paul attempted to escape out of the back door. As he retreated back inside the residence, Officers pursued and detained Paul. Officers did not secure Paul in handcuffs due to the close proximity in the residence and when escorting Paul outside he fled on foot.

Ptl. Marcum and Ptl. Phillips deployed their tasers which had the desired effect. Paul suffered an abrasion to his right knee and twisted his right ankle. He was treated at the hospital and was cleared for incarceration. Officers were counseled in reference securing him in handcuffs immediately which would have prevented Paul from fleeing. Also, not using simultaneous taser deployments due to the possible excessive force. Both advised they didn't know the other deployed their taser until after the fact.

On May 6, 2022 officers received information that the defendant Paul Dean Myers II was seen at 8 10 Maple St. Mr. Myers had several active felony arrest warrants, which were confirmed. When officers made contact at the residence and began to knock on the front door, I observed the defendant open the back door, step onto the porch and attempt to flee on foot. I shouted to Mr. Myers "Paul come out here" he looked at me and I then stated "Paul you have warrants come here". At which point Mr. Myers turned around and ran back inside the residence. Due to the hot pursuit and Mr. Myers being a wanted felon and ignoring my verbal commands I gave chase to him inside the residence. Shortly after we got inside I ordered him to stop, which he did. Mr. Myers was escorted out of the residence by myself and Ptl. Copas due to officers safety with several people being in the residence and two officers couldn't get into the space I was in. Once officers got My Myers to the back porch, he broke free from officers and began to run south bound off the porch through the yard. At this time Ptl. II Marcum and myself deployed our X26 tasers simultaneously which had the desired affect on Mr. Myers. He fell to the ground was secured in handcuffs without any further issues.

The purpose of this guide is to assist the FTO and supervisory personnel to ensure that the new officers are acquainted with and competent in as many facts of the Department operations as possible. It provides insight into the needs of the new Officer by providing a comprehensive evaluation of the officers operations. It reflects his/her knowledge and understanding of the policies and procedures of the Department.

Since the FTO Guide reflects the actual performance of the new Officer, it may validate the termination of the new Officer who cannot meet the minimum standards of the Department. It also serves as an invaluable tool in the area of vicarious liability.

As the name implies, this can only be a guide. It is not possible to itemize every important detail or experience that the new Officer may encounter during the training period. Therefore, it is necessary that all those involved in the training process make use of the comment section to clarify those areas that may need further explanation. This will provide a better understanding of the pupil's progress.

The most important part of the FTO Program is the **FTO**. It is imperative that the Officer have a clear identification of and an above average sense of commitment to duty of the Department and its goals and objectives. In any circumstance where the new Officer's ability to perform is questioned, this doubt must be resolved in the favor of the Department.

Any area that is not acceptable or is at a minimal acceptable level will be clearly identified in the comment section of the evaluation. The FTO may add a specific area to the guide as if he/she deems as necessary.

The Department's goals and objectives are based in part by the Ohio Revised Code, City of Washington Court House Codified Ordinances, Washington Court House Police Department Rules and Regulations, Policies and Procedures, General Orders, and acceptable unwritten procedures.

INSTRUCTIONS

The training guide is divided into three parts.

Part I deals with the major goals of the Police Department and requires an evaluation for each. This evaluation will be completed at the completion of the FTO instruction. The evaluation will be a Satisfactory or Needs Additional Training. Upon completion of the FTO program the entire guide/course will be forwarded to the Police Chief for approval and recommendation. This will provide the new Officer the opportunity to converse with the Police Chief and offer any suggestions in those areas deemed necessary.

Part II is checklist of some important area's in which a new officer will need to know to perform satisfactorily on their own. This checklist is not everything a new officer will need to know to perform his/her job, this is only a checklist to show the new officer ability to perform on the job and under stressful situations.

Part III is a daily patrol log and evaluation sheet. This will be completed by the FTO on a daily basis to have a day to day record of the new officer's training.

Part I

The new officer has a fair understanding of traffic laws and is able to make reasonable traffic stops toward the reduction of traffic-related deaths. Is the violator left with a feeling that the stop was fair and reasonable enforcement? Is the new officer comfortable with his/her ability to make a traffic stop.

ON 10-01-23 I WAS FINISHING A TRAFFIC STOP ON COURT ST. WHEN I HEARD OFFICER T. PHILLIPS MARK A TRAFFIC STOP ON GREGG ST. AT GRACE ST. THE NEXT RADIO TRAFFIC I HEARD WAS OFFICER PHILLIPS ADVISING HE HAD A MALE RUNNING FROM HIM AND UPDATING DIRECTIONS THE MALE WAS RUNNING. OFFICER PHILLIPS ADVISED A TASER WAS DEPLOYED AND A MALE WAS DETAINED. I RADIOED INQUIRING REFERENCE THE MALE WAS THE DRIVER OR PASSENGER. I WAS INFORMED THE PASSENGER. I ARRIVED AT THE STOP LOCATION AND IDENTIFIED THE DRIVER OF THE VEHICLE AS JONATHAN PENN. HE STATED THE PASSENGER WAS A TIM AND THAT HE DID NOT KNOW HIS LAST NAME. Heinz directed me to 415 Gregg St. where Ptl. Phillips was with the suspect who was identified as Timothy West. I approached and Ptl. T. Phillips advised he had used his taser darts on Mr. West and he was now unconscious. Ptl. T. Phillips had Mr. West detained and was gathering his property that was around him from the foot pursuit. At this I had observed that Mr. West might not be breathing, I attempted to give him a sternum rub and tapped his chest a few times to see if he had a response to those actions. Once EMS arrived we assisted in removing Mr. West shirt and put a compression machine on him. Once EMS began their procedures I went back to where the traffic stop was initiated.

ON 10-01-23 AT APPROX, 1811 HRS, OFFICER T, PHILLIPS HAD RADIOED DISPATCH AND ADVISED HE WAS STOPPING A CAR ON GREGG ST. AT GRACE ST. OFFICER PHILLIPS THEN MARKED AND ADVISED THAT HE HAD A MALE RUNNING FROM HIM EASTBOUND ON GREGG ST. I RESPONDED LIGHTS AND SIREN TO ASSIST OFFICER PHILLIPS. WHILE ENROUTE OFFICER PHILLIPS MARKED THAT HE HAD A TASER DEPLOYMENT AND ADVISED HE HAD ONE DETAINED. I ASKED OFFICER PHILLIPS IF THE PERSON THAT RAN WAS THE DRIVER OR PASSENGER. I WAS ADVISED THAT HE WAS A PASSENGER. I WENT TO THE STOP LOCATION WHERE THE CRUISER AND THE STOPPED VEHICLE WAS AT. I HEARD OFFICER PHILLIPS REQUEST EMS TO HIS LOCATION.AT THIS TIME I DID NOT KNOW WHY OR FOR WHAT REASON. I SPOKE WITH THE DRIVER WHO I IDENTIFIED AS JONATHAN PENN. I ASKED HIM WHO HIS PASSENGER WAS. HE STATED HE ONLY KNEW HIS NAME WAS TIM AND DID NOT KNOW HIS LAST NAME. JONATHAN STATED THAT TIM ASKED HIM TO GIVE HIM A RIDE AND GAVE HIM SOME MONEY FOR THE RIDE. JONATHAN ADVISED THAT TIM WAS TELLING HIM TO RUN FROM THE STOP IN THE CAR. JONATHAN TOLD TIM THAT HE WAS NOT GOING TO GET A FELONY. TIM BEGAN REACHING AROUND AND GRABBING STUFF IN HIS HAND AND THEN BAILED FROM THE VEHICLE AND FLED FROM THE STOP ON FOOT. JONATHAN DIRECTED ME TO A MCDONALD'S BAG JUST A SHORT DISTANCE FROM THE CAR. HE STATED TIM THREW THAT WHEN HE WAS RUNNING. I RADIOED OFFICER PHILLIPS AND CONFIRMED THAT WAS THE ITEM THAT TIM THREW. I COLLECTED THE MCDONALD'S BAG AND RETURNED TO THE CAR. JONATHAN THEN STATED THAT WHEN TIM WAS DIGGING IN HIS BAG THAT A LOCK BOX FELL OUT ONTO THE ARM REST. I RELAYED INFORMATION TO OFFICER PHILLIPS THAT THE DRIVER WAS TELLING ME HIS NAME WAS TIM. OFFICER PHILLIPS ADVISED ME OVER THE RADIO THAT THE MALE WAS TIM WEST. I WAS FAMILIAR WITH THE MALE AND KNEW THAT HE HAD AN ACTIVE FELONY WARRANT FOR HIS ARREST.

I DIRECTED OFFICER MOORE TO THE LOCATION WHERE OFFICER PHILLIPS AND THE OFFENDER WAS. A SHORT TIME LATER OFFICER PHILLIPS MARKED DISPATCH AND REQUESTED THAT EMS TO STEP IT UP BECAUSE THE OFFENDER WAS NOT BREATHING AND CHEST COMPRESSIONS WERE BEING DONE. I THEN SECURED THE EVIDENCE I HAD COLLECTED IN MY CRUISER AND WENT TO OFFICER PHILLIPS AND MOORE'S LOCATION. I WAS APPROACHING AND OBSERVED CHEST COMPRESSIONS BEING DONE AND THEN IT WAS STOPPED SO THE OFFENDER COULD BE UN-CUFFED AND THEN CHEST COMPRESSIONS WAS RESUMED. I OBSERVED A MARK ON THE OFFENDERS FOREHEAD AND THAT HE WAS LIMP AND UNCONSCIOUS. WHILE COMPRESSIONS WERE BEING DONE I BEGAN TRYING TO ASSESS ANY INJURIES AND WHERE THE OFFENDER HAD BEEN HIT WITH THE TASER PRONGS. I BRIEFLY ASKED OFFICER PHILLIPS WHAT TRANSPIRED. I WAS ADVISED THAT THE OFFENDER WAS RUNNING AT HIM AND HE DEPLOYED THE TASER AND THINKS THE OFFENDER MIGHT OF DUCKED. I THEN CONTACTED DISPATCH AND REQUESTED THAT CHIEF FUNARI, LT. M. PFEIFER AND LT. D. PFEIFER BE NOTIFIED AND RESPOND TO THE SCENE. EMS ARRIVED ON SCENE AND TOOK OVER LIFE SAVING EFFORTS ON THE OFFENDER. I THEN BEGAN TO TRY AND EXAMINE THE SCENE AND WHERE THE OFFENDER FELL. I LOCATED AN INDENTATION IN THE GROUND AND FOUND THAT JUST BELOW THE SOIL WAS A ROCK. AT THIS TIME I NOTIFIED EMS THAT THE MALE HIT HIS HEAD ON A ROCK WHEN HE FELL. I COLLECTED PERSONAL EFFECTS BELONGING TO THE OFFENDER ALONG WITH THE TASER CARTRIDGE AND SECURED THEM IN MY PATROL CRUISER. I TOOK OFFICER PHILLIPS BACK TO HIS CRUISER WHILE EMS CONTINUED WITH THEIR EFFORTS.

I CONTACTED A UNION REPRESENTATIVE FOR OFFICER PHILLIPS AND TRIED TO STAY WITH HIM AS MUCH AS I COULD WITH THE HECTIC SCENE. I CONTACTED PATROL LIEUTENANT M. PFEIFER AND APPRISED HIM OF THE SITUATION. A SHORT TIME LATER THE CHIEF AND LIEUTENANTS ARRIVE ON SCENE. AFTER THE OFFENDER WAS TAKEN BY EMS I TOOK PHOTOS OF THE SCENE FROM THE CAR TO THE LOCATION OF THE TASER USAGE. I USED TAPE AND TAPED OFF THE AREA AFTER LEARNING THE OHIO BCI WAS ENROUTE TO PROCESS THE SCENE. CHIEF FUNARI AND OFFICER MOORE REMAINED AT THE SCENE AND I

DEPARTED.

I WENT TO THE E.R. TO CHECK ON THE CONDITION OF THE OFFENDER. I WAS ADVISED BY E.R. STAFF THAT THE DOCTOR CALLED THE TIME OF DEATH AT 1900 HRS. I THEN REMAINED WITH THE BODY UNTIL FAYETTE COUNTY CORNER DR. FITTON ARRIVED. I APPRISED HER OF THE FACTS OF THE INCIDENT AND WAS CLEARED TO LEAVE. I LATER RETURNED TO THE E.R. AND OBTAINED THE CLOTHES THAT THE DECEASED WAS WEARING FROM THE CORNER. THE CLOTHES AND A FIXED BLADE KNIFE WERE GIVEN TO BCI AS PART OF THEIR INVESTIGATION.

On October 1, 2023 while on patrol I observed the vehicle bearing Ohio registration KDB8832. The vehicle committed several violations within my presence such as exceeding the posted speed limit of 25 MPH on Evman Park Dr. The vehicle committed a turn signal violation by not using one while turning southbound at Eyman Park Dr. at N. North St. The vehicle also committed a stop bar violation by stopping past the white line posted at Eyman Park Dr. at N. North St. I initiated a traffic stop on the vehicle at N. North St. at Gregg St. The vehicle did not come to a complete stop until Greag St. at Grace St. When I exited the vehicle I observed the passenger later identified as Timothy D. West exit the vehicle and throw a brown bag in the air and fled on foot traveling eastbound through several front yards in the 400 block of Gregg St. I lost visual of Mr. West when he went to the other side of a row of privacy bushes. As I came around the corner of the bush line I observed Mr. West charging at me in an aggressive posture. I then aimed my Taser center mass and deployed the Taser. While that occurred Mr. West lowered his head and was struck with the Taser prongs. At that time I believed Taser had the desired affect due to Mr. West was incapacitated at which time I secured Mr. West into handcuffs. I then realized Mr. West was unconscious at which point I advised dispatch to start EMS to my location for Mr. West and attempted to place Mr. West into recovery position so that he would not aspirate while unconscious. Ptl. Moore arrived on scene and noticed that Mr. West was not breathing at which point I immediately advised dispatch to have a faster response and started chest compressions. After the first session of chest compressions being administered, I removed the handcuffs from Mr. West so that medical aid could be given more effectively. Ptl. Moore then did a round of chest compressions and then I did another round of chest compressions at which point EMS had arrived on scene and took over. I was then brought back to my cruiser by Sqt. Heinz and removed from the scene.

Procedure: 2.000 Title: USE OF FORCE

Date Issued: 01/03/2005

Revised: February 6, 2008

Revised: March 22, 2021

PURPOSE:

To establish Department guidelines on using both lethal and less than lethal force.

To provide for the proper documentation and investigation of incidents involving the use of force.

POLICY:

It is the policy of the Police Department to provide clear procedures to sworn members regarding the use of lethal force in the performance of their duties. The safety of innocent persons and officers is of paramount importance.

The use of less than lethal weapons is classified as a use of force and is governed by this policy. The officers of this agency are authorized to carry less than lethal weapons so that they may successfully defend themselves and others from combative, resisting and/or violent individuals. A less than lethal weapon is not necessarily a replacement or substitute for other authorized weapons, devices and/or techniques and therefore should be used when, in the officer's opinion, it is the best choice of weapon in a use of force situation. A less than lethal weapon is another tool that can be used at the discretion of the officer when the decision is made that the use of force is necessary and reasonable under the circumstances. As with any use of force, the officer is accountable to this agency for the use of a less than lethal weapon.

Only force reasonably necessary to defend a human life, affect an arrest or control a person shall be used by sworn officers of the Police Department. The force used by an officer shall only be that which is necessary to overcome the resistance being offered by an offender and to effect lawful objectives.

All sworn personnel must be issued copies of, and instructed in the Department's Use of Force procedure before carrying any firearm or other police weapon.

This directive is for internal use only and does not enlarge an officer's civil or criminal liability in any way. It should not be construed as the creation of a higher standard of safety or care in an evidentiary sense concerning third party claims. Violations of this directive, if proven, can only form the basis of a complaint by this Department and then only in a non-judicial administrative setting.

DEFINITIONS:

Reasonable Belief or Reasonably Believes: The person concerned, acting as a reasonable man, believes that the described facts exist.

(ORC 2901.01 (A) (2)

Deadly Force: Any force, which carries a substantial risk that it will proximately result in the death of any person.

(ORC 2901.01 (A) (5) Serious physical harm to persons:

Means any of the following:

Any mental illness or condition of such gravity as would normally require hospitalization or prolonged psychiatric treatment;

any physical harm, which carries a substantial risk of death;

any physical harm which involves some permanent incapacity, whether partial or total, or which involves some temporary, substantial incapacity;

any physical harm which involves some permanent disfigurement, or which involves some temporary, serious disfigurement;

any physical harm, which involves acute pain of such duration as to result in substantial suffering, or which involves any degree of prolonged or intractable pain.

Immediate Danger (Imminent Danger): In relation to homicide in self-defense, this term means immediate danger, such as must be instantly met, and such as cannot be guarded against by calling for the assistance of others or the protection of law. Or, as otherwise defined, such an appearance of threatened and impending injury as would put a reasonable and prudent man to his instant defense. (Black's Law Dictionary)

PROCEDURE:

LEVEL OF FORCE CONTINUUM:

- 1. 1. When the use of force is necessary and appropriate, members shall, to the extent possible, use an escalating level of force and will not employ a more forceful measure unless it is determined that a lower level of force would not be adequate, or such level of force is attempted and actually found to be inadequate.
- 2. Certain factors between the officer and the subject are important to consider in a use of force situation:

Officer – Subject Factors

Size, age, and weight, skill level, multiple subjects/officers, and relative Strength.

-

Special Circumstances

Closeness of a weapon, injury, or exhaustion, being on the ground, distance from the subject, special knowledge (i.e. subjects previous history of violence, resisting, etc.), and availability of other options.

<u>NOTE:</u> It is not the intent of this part of this procedure to direct officers to try each of the level options before escalating to the next. Each situation will dictate at which level a member will start. This continuum is simply a guideline.

An offender needs only to attempt an action to justify the appropriate response by officers.

DUTY TO INTERCEDE AND REPORT

Any officer present and observing another law enforcement officer or a member of this department using force that is clearly beyond that which is objectively reasonable under the circumstances shall, when in a position to do so, intercede to prevent the use of unreasonable force. Any officer who observes another law enforcement officer or a member of this department use force that is potentially beyond that which is objectively reasonable under the circumstances should report these observations to a supervisor.

PERSPECTIVE

When observing or reporting force used by a law enforcement officer, each officer should take into account the totality of the circumstances and the possibility that other law enforcement officers may have additional information regarding the threat posed by the subject.

DEADLY FORCE:

- 1. Members of the Police Department shall, when feasible, exhaust all reasonable alternatives before resorting to the use of deadly force.
- 2. The use of deadly force must be based upon reasonable belief by the officer that such force is necessary.
- 3. Deadly force must never be used against any person based on mere suspicion alone.
- 4. An officer may use deadly force only when the officer reasonably believes that the action is in defense of human life, including the officer's life, or in defense of any person in immediate danger of serious physical harm.
- 5. Deadly force may only be used against a "fleeing felon" when the officer reasonably believes that the action is in defense of human life, including the officer's life, or in defense of any person in immediate danger of serious physical harm.
- 6. Use of deadly force against a fleeing felony suspect is prohibited unless the officer has probable cause to believe that the use of deadly force is warranted based on the limitations as set forth in this procedure.

United States Supreme Court decision U.S. 105 S. Ct. 1694 (1985) (Tennessee vs. Garner) ruled that the use of deadly force to prevent the escape of a suspected felon violates the Fourth Amendment prohibition against unreasonable seizure if used against an apparently unarmed, non-violent suspect (the case involved a burglary suspect). The Supreme Court further stated that deadly force may be used against an offender who has attempted or committed an offense involving the infliction or threatened infliction of great bodily harm. **Deadly force may not be used against an unarmed, non-violent, property crime offender.**

The United States Supreme Court decision went on to state that when an officer is justified in the use of deadly force he will, **if feasible**, first give a verbal warning. (Example: "Police Officer, Halt").

PROHIBITIONS

- 1. No shots will be fired from moving vehicles or at moving vehicles unless the situation becomes one of self defense or defense of other lives.
 - 2. No warning shots will be fired.
- 3. 3. No shots will be fired into buildings or through doors, windows or other openings unless the situation becomes one of self defense or defense of other lives.

LESS LETHAL FORCE:

1. Officers are justified in the use of force they reasonably believe necessary to effect an arrest. They need not retreat or desist from efforts to make a lawful arrest because of resistance or threatened resistance to the arrest.

- 2. Officers are justified in the use of force against another when and insofar as the officer reasonably believes that such conduct is necessary to defend the officer or another person against the imminent use of unlawful force.
- 3. 3. Only the amount of force reasonably necessary to affect an arrest or control a person shall be used.
- 4. 4. Force shall not be used punitively and officers will always discontinue the use of force when the offender stops resisting.
- 5. A Department specified and approved, ASP, and Oleoresin Capsicum chemical agent (O/C), and X-26 Taser, Bean Bag, and Gel Pack are the only authorized less lethal weapons. Officers are prohibited from using or carrying blackjacks, saps, weighted gloves, etc.
- 6. The Department provides officers with a "D" cell rechargeable flashlight system. Officers using these flashlights in low light conditions are considered to possess a defensive tool. If a situation makes necessary the use of the flashlight as an impact weapon, (offensive), it will be used in a manner consistent with the use of similarly approved impact wapons.

7. Officers will provide for appropriate medical attention to any subject injured as a result of an officer's use of physical force or a lethal or less lethal weapon. Medical attention should be provided:

If there is any visible injury that the police officer reasonably believes may require treatment.

If the individual requests medical attention.

If the individual is incapable of communicating his/her well-being.

If the individual becomes unconscious at any time during the police contact.

8. The supervisor shall be immediately

notified when:

There is any injury to officers or civilians.

When bystanders complain of police actions or tactics.

When there is any damage to police property or significant damage to civilian property.

When any restraints are necessary to subdue an individual other than handcuffs.

When any Officer feels it is necessary.

9. Any visible injuries to officers or civilians should be photographed. Pictures before and after treatment should be taken whenever possible.

USE OF O/C

1. O/C is considered to be a less lethal weapon.

An officer need not attempt empty-hand control before using O/C. The officer need only justify that emptyhand skill would not be sufficient or practical to safely and effectively place an offender under control. Officers should avoid the use of O/C in situations where the use of O/C could reasonably cause panic (e.g., hospitals, dark crowded theaters, etc.).

2. Officers who employ the use of O/C should do so as a means of obtaining control of an individual and shall never be used for any other unlawful purpose, such as a means of dispensing punishment.

Only that amount of O/C reasonably needed to obtain control of an individual should be used. Once the desired results have been achieved, the officer will stop dispensing O/C.

Primary targets of O/C are the face, eyes, nose and mouth.

3. 3. Officers should consider the following, in addition to specific officer subject factors and special circumstances, when deciding whether or not to use O/C Spray in a use of force situation:

Distance from the individual to be sprayed (generally recommended to be between 3 and 12 feet);

Environmental conditions (e.g., wind, rain, snow, etc.);

Potential hazards to the individual after being sprayed with O/C that could cause injury (e.g., walking into traffic, falling off elevated surfaces or stairs, etc.);

The presence of infants (birth to two years of age). If infants are in the immediate area the use of O/C should be avoided if possible.

 After spraying an individual with O/C, and control of that person has been obtained, the officer will make reasonable efforts to allow the individual relief from the discomfort associated with the application of O/C. Reasonable decontamination or relief efforts may include (as is practical under the circumstances of a situation);

Calming the individual;

removing the person from the affected area to an area of fresh air or other form of ventilation;

instructing the individual to blow his nose;

allowing the individual to flush affected areas with saline solution or clear water;

allowing the individual to wash exposed skin with soap and water;

allowing the individual to remove contact lenses;

advising the individual not to rub affected areas or to apply any type of salve to affected areas;

summoning paramedics if the person complains of injury, or if the officer reasonably believes that the person needs medical attention.

USE OF IMPACT WEAPONS

(ASP BATON)

1. 1. Impact weapons are considered to be less lethal weapons.

An officer need not attempt empty-hand control or the use of O/C Spray before using an impact weapon. The officer need only justify that empty-hand control or the use of O/C Spray would not be sufficient or practical to safely and effectively place an individual under control.

2. 2. Officers who employ an impact weapon should do so with the intent to temporarily disable an individual and not to cause permanent injury or dispense punishment.

Primary targets of a strike from an impact weapon should be an individual's major muscle groups, motor points, abdomen, limbs and/or joints.

Striking an individual with an impact weapon in the groin, any part of the body above the shoulders, or the back is permitted **only** in situations where deadly force would be justified.

3. After striking an individual with an impact weapon, and control of the person has been obtained, the officer will afford the individual medical treatment should, in the officer's judgment, medical treatment be required or if requested by the person himself.

USE OF TASER

1. 1. Taser weapons are considered to be less lethal weapons.

An officer need not attempt empty-hand control, the use of O/C Spray , or an impact weapon before using the Taser. The officer need only justify that empty-hand control, the use of O/C Spray, or impact weapon would not be sufficient or practical to safely and effectively place an individual under control.

2. Officers who employ the use of the Taser should do so as a means of obtaining control of an individual and shall never be used for any other unlawful purpose, such as a means of dispensing punishment.

Only that amount of taser cycles reasonably needed to obtain control of an individual should be used. Once the desired results have been achieved, the officer will stop activating the Taser cycle.

3. 3. Officers should consider the following, in addition to specific officer subject factors and special circumstances, when deciding whether or not to use the Taser in a use of force situation:

Distance from the individual. (generally recommended to be no more than 15 feet)

Environmental conditions (e.g., wind, rain, snow, etc.);

Potential hazards to the individual after Taser is deployed that could cause injury (e.g., walking into traffic, falling off elevated surfaces or stairs, etc.);

4. Once the Taser has been deployed and the individual has been taken into custody and is secure, removal of the darts and proper cleaning of the area with the prescribed method as described by the manufacturer shall be adhered to.

In the event of a medical complication or upon the request of the individual, additional medical treatment may be sought at the scene or at a medical facility by trained medical personnel.

LATERAL VASCULAR NECK RESTRAINT (L.V.N.R.)

The lateral vascular neck restraint (L.V.N.R) or carotid control hold is a technique designed to control an individual by temporarily restricting blood flow through the application of pressure to the side of the neck and, unlike a choke-hold, does not restrict the airway. The proper application of the carotid control hold may be effective in restraining a violent or combative individual. However, due to the potential for injury, the use of the carotid control hold is limited to those circumstances where deadly force is authorized and is subject to the following:

- 1. At all times during the application of the carotid control hold, the response of the individual should be monitored. The carotid control hold should be discontinued when circumstances indicate that the application no longer reasonably appears necessary.
- 2. Any individual who has had the carotid control hold applied, regardless of whether he/ she was rendered unconscious, shall be promptly examined by paramedics or other qualified medical personnel and should be monitored until such examination occurs.
- 3. The officer shall inform any person receiving custody, or any person placed in a position of providing care, that the individual has been subjected to the carotid control hold and whether the individual lost consciousness as a result.
- 4. Any officer attempting or applying the carotid control hold shall promptly notify a supervisor of the use or attempted use of such hold.
- 5. The use or attempted use of the carotid control hold shall be thoroughly documented by the officer in any related reports.

RESPIRATORY RESTRAINTS

The use of a respiratory restraint, also known as a choke-hold, is limited to circumstances where deadly force is authorized and if applied, is subject to the same guidelines and requirements as a carotid control

BEAN BAG AND GEL PACK

1. The use of approved and provided "Bean Bag" or "Gel Pack" ammunition delivered via the department designated "less lethal 12 gauge shotgun(s) shall be authorized in the following manner.

Discharging "Bean Bag" or Gel Pack" ammunition shall only be authorized by personnel that have been properly trained in their use and application.

Utilization of "Bean Bag" or Gel Pack ammunition may be authorized but is not limited to the following situations, hostage, barricade, protection of the officer or the protection of another, or any time the utilization of this tool would be prudent and effective.

2. Placing this type of less lethal use of force into the standars use of force continuum is not practical in that there are many different factors that may play into it's utilization. Therefore, useage of "Bean Bag" or "Gel Pack"

3. The department's less lethal 12 gauge shotgun(s) have been equipped a bright orange stock and fore-piece, it shall be maintained in a non-loaded condition. Upon initiating it's useage, the following procedure shall apply:

The officer in charge of the scene shall issue the weapon and the required "Bean Bag" or "Gel Pack" ammunition to the officer placed in control of the weapon.

The officer that has been assigned the responsibility of discharging the "Bean Bag" or "Gel Pack" ammunition shall load the designated 12 gauge shotgun with the officer in charge of the scene as a witness to confirm the contents of the ammunition.

The officer assigned the 12 gauge less lethal shotgun shall maintain physical control of that weapon until it has been returned to the officer in charge of the scene, whether the weapon has been utilized or it's use was terminated.

USE OF POLICE K-9

An officer need not attempt empty-hand control, the use of O/C Spray , an impact weapon, or the Taser, before utilizing the Police K-9. The officer need only justify that empty-hand control, the use of O/C Spray, impact weapon, or Taser, would not be sufficient or practical to safely and effectively place an individual under control.

The Police K-9 may be used in any event that the offense is a Second Degree Misdemeanor or greater (i.e. obstructing, resisting, assault, etc.) the protection and preservation of the handler, other officers, or the public in general, and against any crime of violence.

Police K-9 utilization is greatly dependant on the handlers training and the situation at hand.

REPORTS AND INVESTIGATION:

1. A Use of Force Case File will be

submitted when an officer:

Takes any action that results in, or is alleged to have resulted in, injury or death of another person;

applies force through the use of lethal or less lethal weapons;

or applies force at or above a Level 2 on the Use of Force Continuum.

2. The Use of Force Case File shall

include but not limited to:

The Use of Force Report; Injured prisoner report; Medical reports; Offender information including C.C.H.; Officer supplements (when required); Photographs; Witness statements; Offense report; and Arrest report.

3. 3. The Use of Force Case File will be completed as soon as possible and submitted to the supervisor within a reasonable amount of time. In the event that the officer is unable to complete the case file due to injury or hospitalization, the officer's supervisor shall complete the case file to the best of his ability based on the known

- 4. The shift supervisor shall notify the Division Lieutenant of any use of force as soon as is practical. The supervisor will review the Use of Force Case File, complete an initial investigation into the use of force, and evaluate the use of force. The completed case file will be forwarded to the Division Lieutenant as soon as possible.
- 5. In the event that the supervisor was involved with the use of force or unable to complete an initial investigation, due to injury or hospitalization, the Division Lieutenant will review the report and complete the initial investigation. The Division Lieutenant will notify the Chief of Police of any use of force as soon as is practical.
- 6. If the weapon involved is not a firearm, the Division Lieutenant shall review the incident and determine if the use of force is in accordance with policy and training. The completed report will be submitted to the Chief of Police, for his review, within thirty days of the incident.
- 7. In instances where use of force results in death, or serious physical harm, the shift supervisor will have the Chief of Police, both Division Lieutenants, and the Criminal Investigations Unit contacted immediately. The sergeant will secure the officer's weapon and the incident scene.
 - 8. When shots are fired, where use of

force is intended, the procedure will be the same as if death or serious physical harm had occurred.

- 9. Upon arrival the Criminal Investigations Unit Sergeant will take control of the scene and do the investigation of the incident. In the event that the Criminal Investigations Unit Sergeant is unavailable, or involved in the use of force, his Division Lieutenant will take control of the scene and do the investigation.
- 10. In instances where use of force results in death or serious physical harm, an independent investigation may be conducted if deemed necessary by the Chief of Police.
- 11. Upon completion of a use of force investigation the completed Use of Force case file will be forwarded to the Chief of Police.
- 12. 12. An administrative review will be conducted by the Chief of Police and the Department Lieutenants on all use of force incidences to determine propriety of action and to determine corrective measures if needed.
- 13. Any officer whose use of force results in a death or serious physical injury will be immediately detailed to a staff assignment pending an administrative review of the incident. The purpose of this assignment is to protect the interest of the community and the officer.

14. Whenever a member of the Department is involved in the Use of Force, of any kind, on or off duty, in another jurisdiction, he shall, as soon as possible, notify the on-duty Patrol Sergeant and relay the details of the incident. The on-duty Patrol Sergeant shall notify the Chief of Police and both Division Lieutenants. A supervisor may be assigned to investigate the incident if deemed necessary.

SUMMARY

Nothing stated in the procedure grants immunity to the officer involved since each case must be met and dealt with according to individual circumstances. Safety of innocent persons and bystanders must be given primary consideration whenever the use of firearms is contemplated.

Title:

POST SHOOTING / TRAUMATIC INCIDENT

Date Issued: 01/03/2005

Revised:

PURPOSE:

It is the policy of the Police Department to provide guidelines that shall be uniformly applied following any officerinvolved shooting or use of force incident that has resulted in death or serious physical harm, in order to minimize the chances that involved personnel will develop or suffer from post-traumatic stress disorder.

POLICY:

Law enforcement duties can often expose officers and support personnel to mentally painful and highly stressful situations that cannot be resolved through normal stress coping mechanisms. Unless adequately treated, these situations can cause disabling emotional and physical problems. It has been found that officer-involved shootings resulting in death or serious bodily harm to a citizen or a fellow officer may precipitate such stress disorders. It is the responsibility of the Police Department to provide personnel with information on stress disorders and to guide and assist in their deterrence. Therefore, it shall be the policy of the Police Department to take immediate action after such incidents to safeguard the continued good mental health of all affected personnel.

DEFINITIONS:

- 1. 1. **Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder:** An anxiety disorder that can result from exposure to short-term severe stress, or the long-term buildup of repetitive and prolonged milder stress.
- 2. Officer Involved Shooting Incident: An incident where shooting causes death or serious physical harm to an officer or other person.
- 3. Officer Involved Traumatic Incident: An incident where the use of force, (other than firearm) causes death or serious physical harm to an officer or another person.
- 4. Officer Involved Traumatic Traffic Crash: An incident where through the use of police vehicle, death or physical harm to an officer or another person occurs.

PROCEDURES:

HANDLING OF THE OFFICERS AT THE SCENE

1. During any period where the involved officer(s) is required to remain on the scene, but has no

immediate duties to fulfill, the officer(s) should be taken to a quiet area away from the scene of the incident. A

peer counselor or other supportive friend or officer should remain with the officer(s), but should be advised not to discuss details of the incident.

- 2. The supervisor should arrange for the officer(s) directly involved in the incident to leave the scene as soon as possible, and be taken to a quiet, secure setting.
- 3. Where possible, the supervisor shall briefly meet with the involved officer(s).

No stimulants or depressants should be given to the officer(s) unless administered by medical personnel.

Only minimal, preliminary questions should be asked about the incident. The officer(s) should be advised that a more detailed debriefing would be conducted at a later time.

Any standard investigations that will occur concerning the incident should be discussed with the officer(s).

The officer(s) should be advised that they may seek legal counsel.

The officer(s) should be advised not to discuss the incident with anyone except a personal or Department attorney, union representative, or departmental investigator, until the conclusion of the preliminary investigation.

4. The supervisor shall require that the officer's duty weapon be taken for analysis. When the duty weapon is taken, the supervisor shall:

Take custody of the officer's weapon in a discrete manner; and

Replace it with another weapon, or advise the officer that it will be returned or replaced at a later time, as appropriate.

POST-INCIDENT PROCEDURES

1. 1. All officers directly involved in the shooting or traumatic incident shall be required to contact a Department designated specialist for counseling and evaluation as soon as practical after the incident. Other affected support personnel should also be encouraged to contact such specialists after a shooting or traumatic incident. After the counseling sessions, the specialist shall advise the Department:

Whether it would be in the officers' best interest to be placed on administrative leave or administrative assignment, and for how long;

issues regarding the officer's physical and mental fitness for duty; and

what will be the best-continued course of counseling.

- 2. The Department should brief other agency members concerning the incident so that rumors are kept to a minimum. Agency members are encouraged to show the involved officer(s) their concern.
- 3. All personnel involved in a shooting or traumatic incident should be advised that they are not permitted to speak with the media about the incident. Officers shall refer inquiries from the media to a designated agency spokesperson.
- 4. In order to protect against crank or abusive calls, officers should be advised to have phone calls answered by another person for several days should their names be released to the public.

DAILY STRESS RECOGNITION

- 1. As post-traumatic stress disorders may not arise immediately, or the officer(s) may attempt to hide the problem, each supervisor is responsible for monitoring the behavior of unit members for symptoms of the disorder.
- 2. The Chief of Police or his designee may order an officer to seek assistance or counseling from a mental health specialist upon a reasonable belief that stress may be disrupting the officer's job performance.

Procedure: 2.002 Title: *DISCRETION* Date Issued: 01/03/2005

LIMITS OF AUTHORITY AND POLICE DISCRETION POLICE

Revised:

PURPOSE:

To outline the limits of an officer's authority.

To consider appropriate alternatives to arrest and confinement.

POLICY:

Officers must be aware of the limits of their authority and shall not exceed them. Officers must ensure that an individual's constitutional guarantees are protected.

Discretionary power is the power of free decision, or latitude of choice within certain legal bounds. When this power is poorly exercised, discretionary power may be viewed by the public as favoritism, bias or corruption. It is imperative that officers consider the goals and objectives of the Department, and the ethical code of conduct, when exercising discretionary power.

Officers are encouraged to use discretion when their authority allows them to choose between possible alternatives of enforcement action.

PROCEDURE:

LIMITS OF AUTHORITY

- 1. The Ohio Revised Code section 715.05 states that all municipal corporations may organize and maintain police and fire departments, erect necessary buildings, and purchase and hold all implements and apparatus required therefore.
- 2. Article 7 of the Ohio Constitution allows any municipality to frame and adopt or amend a charter for its government and may exercise there under all powers of local self-government.
- 3. Article 3 of the Ohio Constitution states the municipalities shall have the authority to exercise all powers of local self-government and to adopt and enforce within their limits such local police, sanitary and other similar regulations, as are not in conflict with general laws.

PROTECTION OF CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS

1. All employees of the Washington Court House Police Department will insure that the Constitutional Rights of all persons are not violated.

2. When conducting interviews and interrogations, the officer will ensure that Miranda Rights are given to the suspect when the following two conditions are present:

The suspect is in custody;

The suspect is being questioned.

- 3. It is expressly recognized that there are circumstances where the use of a written Waiver of Rights form is either impractical or unrealistic.
- 4. At no time will a suspect's right to counsel be denied or impeded. If a suspect asks for legal counsel, the officer will stop the interview until such time as counsel is present.

The suspect needs to invoke their Miranda Rights. Legal counsel has no right to invoke this right. For example: An officer is interviewing a suspect without legal counsel. An attorney calls or comes to the police department and states we are to stop interviewing their client. The police are not required to follow the request of counsel unless the suspect has called their legal counsel and requested their presence.

If a juvenile requests that their parent be present for the interview, the officer will stop the interview and notify the parents of the juveniles wish to have them present.

ALTERNATIVES TO ARREST AND DISCRETION

- 1. Officers are expected to use discretion in their authority in compliance with law, public safety, in furtherance of Department goals and objectives, and in compliance with the Police Code of Ethics.
- 2. In making the determination to arrest, members shall recognize that other alternatives to arrest do exist and may be utilized, as the officer deems suitable. These alternatives include:

Citations – The officer may issue the offender a minor misdemeanor citation for those offenses described in the Ohio Revised Code or municipal ordinances as minor misdemeanors. The officer may issue the offender a traffic citation for those misdemeanor traffic offenses described in the Ohio Revised Code or municipal ordinances.

Summons – The Ohio Rules of Criminal Procedure Rule 4 provides for the issue of a summons in those misdemeanor cases where a warrant has been issued, unless the issuing authority includes a prohibition against it. Rule 4 also allows for the issuance of a summons in those misdemeanor cases where a law enforcement officer is empowered to arrest without a warrant. Reasonable calculation to assure the defendant's appearance is required.

Warnings – A warning may be issued by an officer when, in the officer's discretionary judgment, it is the most reasonable alternative for the offender and the violation.

Referrals – The officer shall offer referrals to other agencies and organizations when, in the officer's discretionary judgment, it is the most reasonable alternative for the offender and the violation.

Informal resolution – An officer, at the officer's discretion, may offer informal resolutions to situations and conflicts, when in the officer's judgment, they can be adequately resolved by use of a verbal warning, informing the proper agency or organization, advising parents of juvenile activity and warnings. Informal resolutions should be utilized for minor offenses or circumstances.

3. Officers should be familiar with the procedure for issuance of all forms of written complaints, when circumstances allow for alternatives to pre-arraignment confinement.

- 4. The severity of enforcement action or officer inaction shall not be influenced by malice, vengeance, or prejudice based upon race, sex, ethnic background, religious belief or political affiliation, nor shall preferential treatment be extended on any of the same conditions.
- 4. Police Discretion concerning enforcement of criminal law violations shall be construed to be narrow with enforcement action being taken in most cases.

Procedure: 2.003 Title: ARREST PROCEDURES

Date Issued: 01/03/2005

Revised:

PURPOSE:

To specify legal procedures to be followed for an arrest.

POLICY:

The power to arrest an individual is an important component of a police officer's responsibility. This task must be accomplished within the limits of authority as set forth by the Constitution, State Law and applicable court decisions.

DEFINITIONS:

Investigative Detention: To stop and briefly detain a person for questioning when an officer has knowledge of specific facts that leads the officer to suspect that the person is involved in criminal activity. See Department Procedure 2.004 Search and Seizure (Stop and Frisk).

<u>Arrest:</u> When an officer indicates by word or action the officer's intention to take a person to the police station, jail, or before a judicial officer, or otherwise take the person into custody.

<u>Probable Cause:</u> Sufficient knowledge of facts and circumstances that would lead a reasonable officer to believe that the suspect committed the crime.

PROCEDURE:

1. There are two types of arrest that an officer can make:

With warrant; and

Without warrant.

2. All arrests must be based on probable cause.

REQUIREMENTS WITH WARRANT:

- 1. (Ohio Criminal Rule 4) The existence of an arrest warrant issued by the court is enough, by itself, to justify the arrest of the person named in it.
- 2. Arrest warrants should be executed without unreasonable delay.

- 3. An officer my not force entry into a private premises to execute an arrest warrant until the officer has identified self, and stated purpose.
- 4. (See Payton V. New York 445 U.S. 573 [1980] and Jackson V. Hollman, 1993 U.S. App. LEXIS 31608 [6 th Cir. 1993) Entry may be forced if admittance is refused or there is no response to the announcement within a reasonable period of time and the officer has reasonable grounds to believe the person to be arrested is on the premises.
- 5. If the offender is in the residence of a 3rd party, a search warrant must be obtained, unless the 3rd party consents to the officer's entry, or the officer faces a true emergency.
- 6. An arrest warrant should be obtained whenever time permits.

REQUIREMENTS WITHOUT WARRANT:

- 1. Pursuant to Ohio Revised Code section 2935.03 (A) an officer may make a warrant-less arrest of persons found violating laws of the state or of the municipal corporation by police officers.
- 2. Pursuant to Ohio Revised Code section 2935.03 (B) an officer may make a warrant-less arrest of persons when there is reasonable ground to believe that an offense of violence, the offense of criminal child enticement as defined in section 2905.05 of the Revised Code, the offense of public indecency as defined in section 2907.09 of the Revised Code, the offense of domestic violence as defined in section 2919.25 of the Revised Code, the offense of violating a protection order as defined in section 2919.27 of the Revised Code, the offense of menacing by stalking as defined in section 2903.211 of the Revised Code, the offense of aggravated trespass as defined in section 2911.11 of the Revised Code, a theft offense as defined in section 2913.01 of the Revised Code, or a felony drug abuse offense as defined in section 2925.01 of the Revised Code, and probable cause to believe the person(s) committed the crime(s).
- 3. Unless it is a true emergency, or in hot pursuit, do not make a warrant-less entry into a person's residence.
- 4. Ohio Criminal Rule 4 requires that when a person is arrested without a warrant the arresting officer shall bring the arrested person without unnecessary delay before a court having jurisdiction of the offense, and shall file or cause to be filed a complaint describing the offense for which the person was arrested.
- 5. (County of Riverside V. Mclaughlin 500 U.S. 44 [1991])(Davis V. Cincinnati, 2001 U.S. App. LEXIS 13369 [6th Cir. 2001]) There must be a judicial determination of probable cause within 48 hours of a warrant-less arrest as a prerequisite to an extended pretrial detention, or it is presumed that the probable cause determination was delayed unreasonably. This 48-hour period includes weekends and holidays. If judicial determination of probable cause is not made within 48 hours of the arrest, the defendant may have the right to be released.

The officer shall determine when the expiration of 48 hours after the arrest will occur. If the 48 hours expires sometime during the week (Monday – Friday), then this procedure shall be completed during normal court hours. If the 48 hours expires sometime over the weekend, then the officer shall complete this procedure during daytime hours. Only in extremely unusual circumstances, should a court official be called at night in reference this procedure.

If the defendant does not bond out or is not otherwise released within the 48 hours, then the officer shall fill out an affidavit in support of warrant-less arrest before the expiration of the 48 hrs.

Attach a copy of the statement of facts to the affidavit and have the affidavit notarized prior to calling the Clerk, or any Deputy Clerk.

Call the Clerk, or any Deputy Clerk, explain you are requesting judicial determination of probable cause, read to them the statement of facts, and inform them who notarized the affidavit. The Judge may be called if it is not possible to locate a Clerk or any Deputy Clerk within the 48 hrs.

After the Clerk, or Deputy Clerk determines probable cause, print their name on the line provided at the bottom of the affidavit, enter the date and time, and place your initials in the proper place.

6. Ohio Criminal Rule 4 provides that in misdemeanor cases where a person has been arrested with, or without a warrant, a summons to appear may be issued unless prohibited by the issuing authority of the warrant. The officer issuing such summons shall note on the summons the time and place the person must appear and, if the person was arrested without a warrant, shall file or cause to be filed a complaint describing the offense.

UPON ARREST WITH OR WITHOUT A WARRANT:

- 1. Picking up a suspect for questioning is an "arrest" even if the officer does not tell the subject that he/she has to go with the officer or if the officer intends to let the suspect go after the interview. Miranda must be given to the suspect before questioning.
- 2. If an officer invites a suspect by phone to come and talk to the officer, and the officer does not bolster the invitation with any show of authority, it is not an arrest. In this case it is not required that Miranda be given. If in doubt, give the Miranda warning.
- 3. Assisting officers arriving at the scene later in time are not obligated to develop independent grounds for an arrest before assisting an officer undertaking an arrest.
- 4. Once an arrest has been made the arresting officer will keep the suspect under constant and close surveillance until the suspect has been safely transported to the police department or another holding facility. This includes following the suspect through the suspect's residence if the officer allows the suspect to get anything from his/her home.
- 5. Refer to Department Procedure 2.000 for "Use of Force" to make an arrest.
- 6. Prior to transporting or confining a person under arrest an officer shall conduct a thorough search of the prisoner and outer garments.

Officers shall take and maintain custody of purses or bags carried by prisoners, checking for weapons.

The interior of the police vehicle shall be searched prior to and after transporting a prisoner.

7. Refer to Department Procedure 5.100 Temporary Holding Facility for intake and release of arrestees.

8. Refer to Department Procedure 2.004 Search and Seizure for information on "Terry Stops" and "Search Incident to Arrest".

Procedure: 2.004 Title: SEARCH AND SEIZURE WITH OR WITHOUT A WARRANT

Date issued: 01/03/2005

Revised:

PURPOSE:

To provide general guidelines and procedures to follow in conducting any variety of searches that can be accomplished with or with out a search warrant.

POLICY:

Searches of persons, places and things will be accomplished in a manner that provides protection of constitutional rights, minimizes intrusion, preserves evidence or fruits of the crime and provides for the safety of all parties. Whenever possible, a search warrant should be obtained as it provides the detached scrutiny of a neutral judge.

PROCEDURE: SEARCH BY CONSENT

1. Search by consent is a search performed by a police officer after the subject of the search, or person having privacy rights (standing) to the location to be searched consents, provided that the consent is freely given, without coercion.

Consent may be given orally.

Ideally, the consent should be in writing and documented on the Consent to Search Form.

It is always preferable to have a witness to a consent search, if one is available.

The dispatcher will be notified of any consent to search so that the time of the search can be recorded on the radio log.

STOP AND FRISK SEARCH

- 1. Stop and frisk is referred to by several names, including a "pat down" search or a "Terry Stop" It stems from the case of Terry V. Ohio, 392 U.S. (1986) which, in summary, allows an officer to conduct a cursory pat down of outer clothing to discover weapons.
- 2. The authority to search for and seize weapons is for the limited purpose of allowing an officer to protect himself and others. The authority is clearly NOT for the purpose of searching for and seizing evidence, although during the course of a frisk, evidence may on occasion be discovered and become the basis for an arrest.
- 3. The Terry Court went on to hold that a police officer need only have a "reasonable suspicion" that an individual is armed in order to conduct a pat-down search for weapons. In order to determine if a police officer had "reasonable suspicion" to conduct a pat-down search, the Court must determine whether a reasonable prudent man under the circumstances would be warranted in the belief that his safety or the safety of others was in danger.
- 4. When an officer reasonably believes that a suspect may be armed and dangerous, the police officer may, among other things, handcuff the suspect, require the suspect to lie on the ground, and approach the subject with a drawn firearm.
- 5. No "Terry Stop" will be based upon an anonymous tip.
- 6. Once an officer is lawfully inside a business or private dwelling, either by way of warrant or consent to enter and search, a pat-down search of individuals inside the premises is governed by the Terry stop-and frisk standard. (United States V. McNeal, 995 F2.d 1067, 1082 [6th Cir. 1992]). However, a search, of persons, other than the pat-down is prohibited unless the person has been included in the search warrant.
- 7. The "plain feel" doctrine is described in Minnesota v. Dickerson. This doctrine allows an officer to seize evidence other than a weapon if, in conducting a frisk, the contraband nature of the evidence is "immediately apparent" to the officer based on his feel of the object through the person's clothing during the pat down.
- 8. Once an officer has made a legal stop of a traffic offender's vehicle, the officer has the right to order the offender from the vehicle. If the traffic offender's appearance or actions leads the officer to reasonably fear that the traffic offender may be armed or involved in criminal activity, the rules of stop-and-frisk apply.
- 9. If the officer reasonably suspects that a motorist whom has been stopped is dangerous and may be able to gain a weapon in his car, the officer may conduct a brief search of the vehicle, limited to areas where a weapon might be placed or hidden.
- 10. Officers can conduct a protective sweep in conjunction with an in-home arrest when the searching officer possesses a reasonable belief that the area to be swept harbors an individual posing a treat to those on the arrest scene.
- 11. Any officer who initiates a frisk must be able to articulate the reason(s) for suspecting that he or others in the immediate area are in danger. This information may be drawn from:

Training. Education. Information, facts or circumstances previously made available or known to the officer.

SEARCHES INCIDENT TO ARREST

- 1. Searches conducted pursuant to an arrest are one of the most widely used exceptions to the warrant requirement. Application of this section is typically applied to situations involving CUSTODIAL arrests, not the issuance of a routine traffic citation.
- 2. Officers may reasonably search the person arrested and the area within such person's immediate control for the purpose of:

Protecting the officer from attack.

Preventing the person from escaping.

Discovering the fruits of the crime.

Discovering any instruments, articles, or other things which may have been used in the commission of or which may constitute evidence of an offense.

3. Prior to transporting or confining a person under arrest an officer shall conduct a thorough search of the prisoner and outer garments.

Officers shall take and maintain custody of purses or bags carried by prisoners, checking for weapons.

The interior of the police vehicle shall be searched prior to and after transporting a prisoner.

MOVABLE VEHICLE EXCEPTIONS

1. There are two reasons given for allowing the search of a vehicle WITH probable cause, but no warrant.

Vehicles do not share the same expectations of privacy as a home or other personal items.

The obvious mobility of an automobile would make it impractical to require that the police first obtain a warrant. Officers do not have to actually prove that a vehicle might or would be gone if they obtained a warrant before making the search.

The existence of probable cause alone justifies the exception.

2. The vehicle exception allows an officer to search the entire vehicle as long as he has probable cause to believe evidence may be located where he is looking.

If probable cause is limited to a certain area, then the officer cannot go beyond the scope of that search.

This type of search should not be confused with a search incident to arrest where immediate control becomes an issue.

3. An officer need not have a reasonable suspicion that a vehicle contains contraband prior to summoning a canine unit. When the officer stops a vehicle for a traffic violation, the officer may detain the motorist for a period of time sufficient to issue a ticket, perform routine procedures such as a computer check on the motorist's driver's license, registration and vehicle plates. After the reasonable time for issuing a traffic citation, an officer must have a reasonable, articulable suspicion of illegal activity to continue the detention.

EXIGENT CIRCUMSTANCES

- The exigent circumstances exception to the warrant requirement allows an officer to search under situations where the officer recognizes that there is not enough time to obtain a warrant, and that if he does not conduct the search immediately, the evidence may be lost forever. Probably the two strongest justifications for conducting a search without a warrant are, probable cause to believe that someone is in need of immediate assistance because of injury, illness or other peril or probable cause to believe that an offense is in progress or being committed, particularly a crime of violence.
- 2. There are several factors to be considered in determining whether or not exigent circumstances exist:

the degree of urgency involved and the amount of time necessary to obtain the warrant;

the reasonable belief that contraband is about to be removed;

the possibility of danger to police officers guarding the site of contraband while the search warrant is sought;

information indicating that the possessors of the contraband are aware that the police are on their trail; and

ready destructibility of the contraband, that the evidence will be lost, destroyed or tampered with.

3. (United States V. Radka [1990, 6th Cir.]) In order to justify an entry before the arrival of a search warrant one of three exigent circumstances must exist:

hot pursuit of a fleeing suspect;

when the suspect represents an immediate threat to the officers or general public;

immediate action is required to prevent the loss or destruction of evidence or a suspect's escape.

4. (Thacker V. City of Columbus, 328 F.3d 24 [6 th Cir. April 30, 2003]) Exigent circumstances exception to the requirement of a warrant to search a home applied to police officers entering a home when they believed a person inside was in need of immediate medical assistance – and to protect the first aid responders.

Once the search has concluded and all officers leave the scene, the exigent circumstances may no longer exist. Re-entry into the scene would then require a search warrant.

INVENTORY

1. Inventory of property seized by police officers has been justified for three reasons:

An inventory protects the property of the owner.

It protects the law enforcement agency against claims that the property has been lost or stolen.

It allows the police to discover any potential danger that may exist because of the contents of the property itself.

- 2. An inventory search of the property of an arrestee shall be in accordance with Department Temporary Holding Facility Policy and Procedures.
- 3. An inventory search of a vehicle should be conducted under the following circumstances:

A stolen vehicle which has been recovered after the reporting agency has informed our Department of their intent not to process the vehicle.

The vehicle is towed pursuant to a custodial arrest in accordance with Department Procedure 4.608.

Officers should note that towing a vehicle to the police station or an otherwise secure area may negate the ability to search without a warrant. An inventory search should never be conducted when circumstances would dictate the requirement that a warrant be obtained.

4. Additional items of property subject to an inventory search include:

Found property.

Property turned over to the police for safekeeping or destruction.

Abandoned property.

PLAIN VIEW SEARCHES

1. Plain view searches have been upheld by the courts as long as the officer is legitimately on the premises and he has probable cause to believe the item is contraband or evidence. There are some limitations to the plain view doctrine which officers should be aware of:

There must be no pre-observation intrusion that violated constitutional rights.

The items must have been discovered inadvertently.

Artificial devices that aid in or enhance the ability of the officer's view are not generally considered "plain view". However, a flashlight is generally acceptable, provided again, the officer has a right to be where he is when using the light source.

Moving items or the rearrangement of items to note serial numbers, for example, is not supported by the plain view doctrine.

2. The "plain view" doctrine also applies to searches conducted pursuant to a warrant, even if the item(s) to be seized were not noted on the warrant. The test will be:

Does the officer have a right to be where he is.

Does the officer have probable cause to believe the item(s) in plain view are evidence or contraband.

OPEN FIELD SEARCHES

1. Open field searches typically involve cannabis cultivation. Areas surrounding buildings and homes should not be considered "open fields". Instead, the courts have tended to view these areas as "curtilage", the equivalent of a yard.

Areas generally outside the curtilage that are viewed as open fields include: woods, pastures and grassland.

If an owner has taken any steps to protect the area from trespass or observation, it may not be considered "open field."

NIGHT TIME SECURITY CHECK SEARCHES

1. Night time security checks are another form of a warrant-less search held by the court.

These searches are permissible only in a business and only if the officer's intent is to determine if any unauthorized people are inside.

The officer may also check for owner information so notification can be made.

2. When an officer responds to an alarm drop and finds an open door, window, etc., the officer is to notify the dispatcher of the opening. Further, the officer is to maintain security outside the business until a second unit arrives to assist with the search of the inside.

BODY CAVIY AND STRIP SEARCHES

1. Body cavity and strip searches shall be conducted in conformance with Ohio Revised Code section 2933.32.

Procedure: 2.005 Title: WARRANT ENTRY INTO LEADS / PRINT OUTS

Date Issued: October 12, 2016

Revised: December 8, 2020

PURPOSE

To clarify the procedure for, warrant entry.

To set a standard of entry depending on the degree of the offense and radius of assigned pick-up.

POLICY

It is the policy of the Police Department to utilize the follow basic concept on the entry of warrants in the LEADS system:

- 1. All felony warrants will be entered
- 2. All crimes of violence, felony or misdemeanor, will be entered.
- 3. Bench Warrants ONLY if it is a failure to appear and the original charge was a crime of violence.
- 4. A pick-up radius of 1 may only be authorized by the Chief of Police or a Lieutenant.

PROCEDURE

- 1. Misdemeanor warrants, Bench warrants, or a summons to appear <u>will not</u> be entered in the LEADS system without the specific prior approval from the Chief of Police.
- 2. Misdemeanor warrants that are entered into the LEADS system shall have a pick up radius of 4. The Chief of Police or his designee may increase the pick up radius beyond that of 4, for serious crimes.
- 3. Bench warrants may be entered with a pick up radius of 4 or 5 depending on the seriousness of the original violation.

- 4. Bench warrants for parking tickets, city income tax violations, and minor animal control violations will not be entered.
- 5. No misdemeanor warrants will be entered beyond a pick-up radius of 2.
- 6. No summons to appear will be entered.
- 7. Dispatchers will follow the established LEADS guidelines and have any warrant that is entered, double checked by another dispatcher to confirm accuracy.
- 8. Dispatchers will ensure that when a warrant has been served, it is properly and completely removed from the system and properly documented.

L.E.A.D.S. ENTRIES

Documentation associated with L.E.A.D.S. entries may be destroyed after 90 days and is not subject to public records release.

L.E.A.D.S. PRINT OUTS

Due to the implementation of Zeurchers reporting system the common practice of placing L.E.A.D.S. printouts for a variety of reasons, (i.e. BOLO, Stolen Vehicle, wanted person(s) etc.) on a clip board for easy reference is no longer practical. The utilization of the Zuerchers bulletin system is more secure and shall now be median used.

Procedure: 2.100Title:JURISDICTION & GEOGRAPHIC BOUNDARIES

Date Issued: 01/03/2005

Revised:

PURPOSE:

To provide guidelines for the geographical boundaries and jurisdictional responsibilities of the Police Department.

POLICY:

Within the corporate limits of the City, the Police Department has exclusive jurisdiction to enforce the ordinances of the City. In addition, the Department shall enforce the laws of the State, as provided by the State law and all other duties and responsibilities ascribed to it pursuant to the City Code of Ordinances.

PROCEDURE:

GEOGRAPHICAL BOUNDARIES

1. All members of the Department should familiarize themselves with the geographical boundaries of the City.

- 2. The Communications Center is provided with a permanent map of the City. At any time there is a question concerning geographical boundaries, the Communications Center, or the on duty supervisor should be consulted.
- 3. The Communications Center map will be updated, as needed.

JURISDICTION

1. Within the City limits, the Police Department will enforce the ordinances of the City and the laws of the State, and carry out all duties and responsibilities attributed to the Police Department by the Chief of Police.

CONCURRENT JURISDICTION

- 1. Effective law enforcement is not a solitary effort, but requires the cooperation and interaction of many agencies.
- 2. Various Federal, State and County law enforcement agencies have police powers within the corporate limits of the City.
 - 3. Employees of this Department will offer cooperation, within the limits of department policy and procedures, when situations arise where these agencies must exercise their authority in the City.
 - 4. In any situation where a question arises concerning jurisdiction with another agency, the
 - 5. responding officer will make every effort to resolve the matter. If this is not possible the matter will be turned over to the officer's supervisor.
- 5. In addition to other law enforcement agencies having jurisdiction, members of the Police Department have police powers in other jurisdictions as defined by State Statute. The following are some examples of concurrent jurisdiction:

Mutual Aid agreements (section 2.101 Policy and Procedure Manual);

Serving Arrest Warrants (Ohio Criminal Rule 4);

Fresh pursuits (ORC Section 2935.03 [D]);

An officer may arrest and detain any person found violating ORC 4503.11, 4503.21, 4549.01, 4549.08 to 4549.12, Chapter 4511, or Chapter 4513, on the portion of any street or highway that is located immediately adjacent to the boundaries of the municipal corporation.

Procedure: 2.101 Title: MUTUAL AID

Date Issued:01/03/2005

Revised:

PURPOSE:

To outline the procedures for requesting and providing mutual aid.

POLICY:

The City recognizes that on occasion circumstances can develop that will overwhelm the resources of the police department, or other law enforcement agencies of neighboring communities. Under these circumstances the Police Department may be asked to provide assistance to another agency, or may request assistance from other agencies. This Department will aid participating communities when requested, and when necessary will request aid from these communities.

PROCEDURE: MUTUAL AID AGREEMENTS

- 1. The Police Department and City have executed a Mutual Aid Agreements with the Fayette County Sheriff's Office and the 23 Pipeline Task Force. The purpose of these agreements is to provide assistance, in the form of manpower and equipment, to participating agencies, as determined by the Chief of Police.
- 2. See Fayette County S.O. Mutual Aid Agreement.
- 3. The Chief of Police shall determine under what conditions assistance will be requested from mutual aid agencies for all planned or scheduled incidents or events.
- 4. Mutual aid to the 23 Pipeline Task Force is governed by Policy and Procedures of the Task Force agreed upon by participating Department Administrators.

REQUESTING MUTUAL AID

1. Mutual aid is to be used in times of emergencies, when occurrences may result in situations which are beyond the ability of the individual community to deal effectively, in terms of manpower or equipment, with the incident at hand, such as, but not limited to:

Civil disobedience, whether planned protests or one that develops spontaneously.

Extensive concentrated search for a dangerous criminal or a lost person.

A disturbance call at a large function that requires additional officers.

Any other emergency related to police work where extra aid is required.

- 2. Contact should be made with the highest-ranking officer on duty with the assisting agency.
- 3. The on duty Sergeant should provide the following information to the Commanding Officer of the other agency when requesting assistance:

Nature of emergency.

Number of men needed.

Special resources, if any.

Where to report, staging location or at scene.

Supervisor in charge.

Estimated time officers will be needed.

- 5. The on-duty Sergeant shall assume full responsibility and command for operations at the scene. He will assign personnel and equipment, of the aiding agency, to positions when and where he deems necessary.
- 8. The order in which the manpower is returned to duty in the officer's own community is at the discretion of the onduty Sergeant.

PROVIDING MUTUAL AID

- 1. If the Department is contacted by another participating agency requesting mutual aid the on duty Sergeant/O.I.C. will be immediately notified.
- 2. The Sergeant/O.I.C. shall review the request and make a determination as to how many officers and what type of equipment can be spared, without leaving the City dangerously unprotected.
- 3. The Sergeant/O.I.C. shall document any request for mutual aid on an Aid and Incident Report.
 - 4. The safety and security of the City is the Department's first concern and only that manpower and equipment which can be spared will be sent.
- 5. Sworn police officers responding to a request for assistance from another municipality have all the powers of a sworn police officer employed by the requesting municipality.
- 6. No officer will respond to a mutual aid request unless directed by the on duty Sergeant/O.I.C.
- 9. Responding officers are subject to the direction of the Fayette County Sheriff, or his senior officer in charge.

REQUESTING EMERGENCY FEDERAL LAW ENFORCEMENT ASSISTANCE

1. In the event of an emergency, which requires immediate federal law enforcement assistance, the on duty Sergeant/O.I.C. will first attempt to contact Administrative Staff for authorization to make the request.

Procedure: 2.300 Title: VICTIM/WITNESS ASSISTANCE

PURPOSE:

To establish guidelines that will assure that victims and witnesses will be treated with fairness, compassion and dignity.

To establish guidelines concerning crime victims rights.

POLICY:

It is the policy of the Police Department to insure that crime victims and witnesses receive the highest level of professional service and assistance. The Police Department is committed to the development, implementation, and continuation of appropriate victim/witness assistance programs and activities.

DEFINITIONS:

<u>Victim</u>: A person who suffers physical, financial, or emotional harm as the direct result of a crime committed upon his or her person or property. Also regarded as victims are a spouse, child, parent or legal guardian of a minor victim and a spouse, child, sibling, parent or guardian of a homicide victim.

<u>Witness</u>: A person who has information relevant to an investigation of a crime. When the witness is a minor, this includes an appropriate family member.

PROCEDURE:

1. Officers will provide assistance to the victims of crime. These victims have the right and reasonable expectation to:

Be treated humanely and understandingly.

Have their self-respect and privacy protected whenever possible.

Be advised of available counseling and victim benefits.

Have explained to them the working of the criminal justice system and what is expected of them.

Victim assistance and related community services available.

OPERATIONS

1. The Communications Center will provide 24-hour access to victim/witness assistance information to include:

Services offered by other agencies for victim/witnesses in need of assistance.

2. After the initial contact with a victim of a crime, the officer assigned to the complaint shall promptly give to the victim, in writing, all of the following: (Pursuant to ORC 2930.04)

An explanation of the victim's rights.

Information about medical, counseling, housing, emergency, and any other services that are available to a victim.

Information about compensation for victims under the reparations program in sections 2743.51 to 2743.72 of the ORC and the name, street, address, and telephone number of the agency to contact to apply for an award of reparations under those sections.

Information about protection that is available to the victim, including protective orders issued by the court.

The officer's name and business phone number.

The office address and business phone number of the prosecutor in the case.

A statement that, if the victim is not notified of the arrest of the offender in the case within a reasonable period of time, the victim may contact the police department to learn the status of the case.

3. The "Picking Up the Pieces" pamphlet provided by the Attorney General's Office defines the rights and responsibilities of crime victims. This pamphlet fulfills the officer's aforementioned obligation to provide

information in writing with exception of local telephone numbers, local addresses, local services available, and the name of the officer assigned to the case or the prosecutor on the case. This information can be written in the note section of the pamphlet, by the victim or the officer, and business cards can be attached to the pamphlet. The "Picking Up the Pieces" pamphlet will be given to the victim by the officer assigned to the complaint.

4. Within a reasonable period of time after the arrest or detention of a defendant or an alleged juvenile offender for a crime or specified delinquent act, the on duty supervisor will have the victim provided the following: (Pursuant to ORC 2930.05)

Notice of the arrest or detention.

The name of the defendant or alleged juvenile offender.

Whether the defendant or alleged juvenile offender is eligible for pretrial release or for release from detention.

The victim's right to telephone the agency to ascertain whether the defendant or alleged juvenile offender has been released from custody or from detention.

- 5. Officers will provide the victim/witness available options, if an offender directly or indirectly engages in threats or intimidation.
- 6. Officers will determine if the victim/ witness's needs are being met considering the impact and severity of the incident.

VICTIM WITNESS ADVOCATES

- 1. The Victims / Witness Division of the Fayette County Prosecutor's Office is available to assist with the needs of victims and witnesses.
- 2. Victim / Witness advocates respond to most crimes where the officer determines it would benefit or meet the needs of a victim and/or when requested by the victim.
- 3. A Sexual Assault Protocol has been adopted for sexual assault cases in Fayette County. Whenever possible this protocol should be observed. However, the Fayette County Protocol on Sexual Assault does not create any legal recognizable claims or cause of action in the law or equity on behalf of any persons, organizations or agencies against any signatory to the protocol, the State of Ohio or Fayette County in any court or proceeding when such claims or cause of action is base upon non-compliance with any of the guidelines set forth in the protocol. (See Fayette County Protocol on Sexual Assault).

Since each case is unique, the protocol contains guidelines, rather than rigid rules.

Procedure: 2.303Title:RELATIONSHIPS WITH OTHER AGENCIES

Date Issued: 01/03/2005

PURPOSE:

To develop and maintain an effective working relationship with other law enforcement, criminal justice, social and peripheral support agencies.

POLICY:

Establishing and maintaining effective channels of communication between law enforcement agencies and other agencies are essential first steps in improving cooperation. The Police Department shall attempt to develop a liaison with other agencies interested in similar concerns involving the criminal justice system.

PROCEDURE: LIAISON WITH CRIMINAL JUSTICE AGENCIES

- 1. The goals and objectives of the Police Department cannot be achieved without the assistance and cooperation of other criminal justice agencies.
- 2. Assistance and cooperation can only be achieved by positive exchange with local juvenile and adult courts; prosecutors; probation and parole agencies; and adult and juvenile correctional agencies.
- 3. Department members are encouraged, in the course of their duties, to establish contact with the various criminal justice agencies when such contact will aid either the criminal justice agency or the Department.

LIAISON WITH LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES

- 1. Law enforcement agencies should assist and cooperate with other Federal, State and local law enforcement agencies. Such cooperation facilitates the exchange of information needed in criminal investigations; helps develop joint plans for dealing with matters of common concern and the sharing of statistical and support services.
- 2. The Chief of Police, or his designated representative, will attend regularly scheduled meetings of criminal justice and public safety agencies. These meetings enable participants to discuss matters of mutual concern, review policies and procedures, and to plan for events of a multi-jurisdictional nature.

TASER® CEW CRITICAL EVENT REMINDER SUMMARY

- The TASER CEW Event Analysis and Evidence Collection Checklist PDF is a crucial investigative reminder about issues that should be addressed such as AED strip readouts (if used), body core temperature, TASER logs, probe locations, hair, and nail samples, etc. in the event of an arrest related death (ARD) and/or critical event. Make sure to note if the TASER device was effective or ineffective which is crucial to make sure the probes are collected as well as the clothes they may have hit. Sometimes probes miss or don't make proper contact but they must be preserved to prove this fact.
- 2. It's critical to provide accurate timing of the incident, the time of the last TASER deployment, the time of a medical crisis response from the suspect and/or at what time did law enforcement see an emergency response from the subject to the timing of emergency response on scene.
- 3. Documenting the subject's behavior prior AND the behavior after the last application of the TASER CEW cycle to the incident is imperative (see the attached PDF called ARD-1C Chklst DRAFT Crit Inc Obj Inv Timeline 2020--04-13 004).
- Please share the TASER CEW checklist and other attachments with your Medical Examiner/Coroner, investigators or any outside agencies that may have taken over the investigation.

Summary

Conducted electrical weapons are, after all, weapons, and are used in violent and dangerous situations. They have indeed contributed to deaths from head injuries and ignition of flammable fumes. While electrocution remains a theoretical possibility, the notion that an electrical weapon has ever electrocuted anyone is an urban myth.

Investigator Checklist

Highly Perishable Evidence

- □ AED/Cardiac Monitor Downloads: Get the AED (Automated External Defibrillator) or cardiac monitor downloads, including rhythm strips, electronic data downloads, and technical operational downloads. This is often erased or deleted when the next paramedic shift starts. This information can eliminate "electrocution" by the TASER CEW (Conducted Electrical Weapon) 95% of the time (Swerdlow, Fishbein, Chaman, Lakkireddy, & Tchou, 2009). However, it is erased 80% of the time. Note that there can be four or more defibrillators/heart monitors: (1) squad car, (2) paramedics, (3) ambulance, and (4) hospital.
- □ **Person's Clothing:** Acquire and handle as perishable evidence the person's clothing, especially any clothing where a CEW probe may have struck, punctured, or attached.
- □ CEW Wires/Probes/Cartridges: Maintain as evidence the CEW wires, probes and cartridges! Microscopic analysis of the probes and wires can often show that no electrical current was delivered (as a probe missed) and eliminate the TASER CEW as a factor (Wyant & Hinz, 2009). DNA analysis of the probes may show who, if anyone, had a probe insertion. Do NOT let anyone put the probes/wires into a "sharps" container. These are valuable evidence.
- □ **Probe Impact, Attach or Penetrate:** Carefully acquire all data regarding probes and where and if they impacted, attached or penetrated clothing or skin. Millimeters matter, thus, very carefully acquire this information and fully document (with complete annotations).
- □ **CEW Spark Tests/Cartridge Removal Discharges:** Carefully determine and document any CEW spark tests or cartridge removals, including "3-point" deployments or drive stun after cartridge removal, and drive stun with deployed cartridge remaining in place on the CEW.
- □ **Core (rectal or liver) Body Temperatures:** Taken as close as possible to time of collapse. Not always thought important by Emergency Medical Services (EMS) or Emergency Department (ED) staff for therapy, but may be important for Excited Delirium diagnosis, *so politely ask for it!* (Karch, 2012; Vilke, Payne-James, & Karch, 2012).
- **Pulse Oximeter:** Paramedic pulse oximeter recording, if available.
- □ Antemortem (pre-death) Blood Sample(s): From ED grey-top vacutainer tubes for "quantitative" analysis—not just "qualitative" analysis. The "grey-tops" contain sodium fluoride, which will prevent the breakdown of cocaine. Note that the subject is a "patient" up until death is pronounced and only then becomes a body for the coroner/ME investigation. The ED is doing you a big favor if he/she will share a 10ml antemortem blood sample.
- □ **Postmortem Blood Sample(s):** Get several blood samples (especially peripheral samples) and place in "grey-top" tubes for quantitative analysis. Be sure to fully document where blood was taken from and time of sample acquisition. Be extra nice here. Law enforcement has a right to

evidence to help the coroner/ME investigation but the ED staff does not have to take these blood samples for you.

□ Urine Samples.

Important Requests for ME (Medical Examiner)

- ☐ Hair sample and chronic drug use analysis (\$75). At least save a sufficient head hair sample (pencil thick when twisted) and a pubic hair sample (Berankova et al., 2005; Paterson, Cordero, & Stearns, 2009; Politi, Zucchella, Morini, Stramesi, & Polettini, 2007).
- □ Dr. Deborah Mash Miami brain test (\$400), (1-800-UM-BRAIN and www.exciteddelirium. org) (Mash et al., 2009; Mash et al., 2003; Stephens, Jentzen, Karch, Wetli, & Mash, 2004). Must be properly collected, prepped and frozen, usually within 24 hours of death. Ideally frozen in dry ice. Otherwise, collect coronal slices flat in bags and freeze in normal freezer (-4°F or -20°C).
- □ If cocaine is suspected, request analysis of brain for cocaine and its metabolite.
- □ Due to the importance of the hair and brain test, the LEA (Law Enforcement Agency) should offer to pay for them. The \$475 is nothing compared to the typical \$1 million settlement, or thousands in attorney's fees, for an ARD (arrest-related death).
- □ Save the heart (histologic heart blocks may be very important). Heart tissue slides can be critical in establishing myocarditis, which is a very common cause of exertional sudden death in young men (Amital et al., 2004; Kroll et al., 2014a; Phillips et al., 1986).
- □ If any TASER CEW probes were within 5 cm (2 inches) of the heart, ME should measure the exact distance (in millimeters) from the tip of the probe to the outer surface of the heart (Kroll et al., 2011; Rahko, 2008). Document all probe locations. Fully document what tissues a probe penetrated (entered) and perforated (went through), starting at the outside of the skin and moving closer to the heart, including, but not limited to: epidermis, dermis, dermal fat layer, skeletal muscle, intercostal muscle, pericardial sac. Document if probe was in bone. Document if bone, including sternum, was between the CEW probe and the heart. *Have a histological section taken of all probe marks*.
- □ Save blood sample for genetic testing for "long QT" syndrome.
- ☐ The entire gastric content should be submitted for drug analysis and the total amount of drug remaining in the stomach should be quantified.
- Test for the classical drugs (heroin, methamphetamine, MDMA, LSD, and cocaine). Also, test for THC as this is being increasingly linked to unexpected death (Bachs & Morland, 2001; Sattout & Nicol, 2009). Also, request testing for newer dangerous synthetics, such as K2/Spice, bath salts and JWH-018 (found in fake marijuana) (Angoa-Perez et al., 2011; Murray, Murphy, & Beuhler, 2012; Prosser & Nelson, 2011; Rosenbaum, Carreiro, & Babu, 2012; Ross, Watson, & Goldberger, 2011; Spiller, Ryan, Weston, & Jansen, 2011). (See Chronic Medical Information section.)
- Test premortem, postmortem, vitreous, and urine samples.
- □ There is no need to interfere with organ and tissue donation prior to autopsy, unless the ME cannot examine the body before procurement. Protocols have been established to allow the ME to examine the body prior to procurement of organs. The ME has the authority to restrict the taking of certain organs or tissues, depending on the circumstances of death, but a blanket denial is not justified. The issue has been thoroughly addressed by the National Association of Medical Examiners and published as a position paper several years ago. It is about to be revised but blanket denials will still be unjustified in the update. Note, however, that in areas where there is no ME

or Forensic Pathologist, then a blanket denial may be justified. Hopefully, that would be a rare occurrence in the U.S. The main thing is to be sure the ME is apprised of the circumstances of death and has the ability to examine the body prior to organ procurement (virtually all tissues can be obtained after autopsy).

□ If the victim is African-American or of African descent, request a hemoglobin electrophoresis. This is the best method to determine sickle cell trait.

Acute Medical Information

- □ Body Core (rectal or liver) temperature at time of death and as close to collapse as possible (Karch, 2012; Kroll et al., 2009; Vilke et al., 2011; Vilke et al., 2012).
- □ (Premortem) Collect 10 ml (milliliters) of blood as soon as possible after ED arrival for later quantitative drug testing.
- □ Document (ideally photograph) all TASER CEW probe and wound locations and marks. Be sure to photograph for context—including inch or cm rulers and body landmarks. Record if they removed the probes or subject arrived without. Millimeters matter, thus, it is very important to carefully document exact locations of probes, marks, etc.
- □ Within 24 (preferably less than 12) hours of collapse, brain samples must be properly collected and frozen. Call 1-800-UM-BRAIN (also www.exciteddelirium.org) for shipping instructions.
- □ In suspected cocaine, methamphetamine, PCP, LSD, THC, etc., smoking cases, swabs of mouth and bronchial tree are helpful for chemical analysis.
- □ Politely remind treating physicians to keep documentation objective and do not speculate or write or document about things they do not understand. Occasionally hospital records will include statements about a "TASER" wound even though there was no TASER CEW used near that specific location.
- □ Preemptively stop anyone from attempting to harvest or harvesting any organs or body materials for transplant or other purposes prior to autopsy.

Chronic Medical Information

- Obtaining hair and toenail samples (Berankova, Habrdova, Balikova, & Strejc, 2005; Paterson, Cordero, & Stearns, 2009; Politi, Zucchella, Morini, Stramesi, & Polettini, 2007). Twist strands of longest head hair available like a lock, about as thick as a pencil lead, hold together to keep strands aligned. Try to include the hair root so the time of drug ingestion can be estimated. Transfer lock to tin foil or paper, fold (to hold together), and secure. Collect similar samples from longest public or groin hair.
- □ Collect three "gray top" tubes of peripheral blood (or cardiac if necessary) for possible later testing of synthetic drugs such as "bath salts" etc. Note that the normal toxicology laboratory used by your medical examiner is probably not equipped to do these tests (Banks, Worst, Rusyniak, & Sprague, 2014; Smith, Metters, Khreit, Sutcliffe, & Banks, 2014).
- □ Obtain all available past medical records.
- □ Obtain all psychological/psychiatric records (Karch, 2012; Vilke et al., 2012).
- □ Obtain printouts from pharmacies used by suspect for past two years.
- □ Obtain all rehabilitation and treatment records.

Circumstances Regarding Arrest

- □ Create highly detailed fully annotated timeline of event, clearly noting those times which are beyond dispute (e.g., dispatch records with dispatch time stamping tied to Internet time).
- Distance CEW deployed (fired), probe spread, *probe locations*, number of cycles, timing of cycles, and duration of cycles.
- Download CEW as soon as reasonably possible after event. Carefully set internal clock (as necessary) to determine clock drift.
- □ TASER CEW effects (such as change in behavior).
- □ Subject's influence (drugs, alcohol, emotionally disturbed).
- □ Any other use of force employed?
- □ Was an AED, defibrillator, or cardiac monitor used? (Note ownership, manufacturer, model, serial number, and all recent maintenance records.)
- Did the AED report a shockable rhythm? (Very important to determine which type of shockable rhythm.) Did the AED or defibrillator operator manually trigger a defibrillation shock?
- □ Expeditiously acquire clean printout (download), electronic data download and maintenance download from the AED or cardiac monitor.
- □ How long between the CEW exposure and the subject's collapse? Specifically detailed chronicle of all witnessed behaviors, actions, inactions, physiological status, etc. Plaintiff's lawyers will try to confuse postural collapse (falling down) with cardiovascular collapse (cardiac arrest). Do not add to this confusion.
- □ Was the subject walking, fighting, talking, moaning, groaning, or breathing after the CEW exposure? And, for how long—*do not guess*—be as precise as possible. Normal breathing ceases within 12–60 seconds of cardiac arrest (Haouzi et al., 2010; Zuercher et al., 2010).
- □ Carefully document all signs of life including pulse (where on body taken, for how long, and by whom), breathing, moving, moaning, and groaning, and carefully include in fully annotated event timeline.
- □ Collect all clothing and treat as evidence: especially any clothing where a CEW probe may have landed, penetrated, punctured, or attached.
- □ ME contact info or supporting info from medical attendants and ED.
- □ Hospital exam information (if conducted).

Interviews

- □ First, expeditiously create *known* timeline—dispatch times, CEW downloads (with clock drift corrections), video/audio recordings, AED/cardiac monitor downloads, hospital emergency records, ambulance/fire dispatch, and action times. Then, use the interviews to carefully fill in and document the time line—with full annotations.
- □ Treat the EMTs (Emergency Medical Technicians) and Paramedics at the scene like any other witnesses. Get complete readable, detailed, time chronological statements from them about what they observed and what interventions they made. EMTs do not always perfectly document the event. However, they can make medical observations that the LEOs (Law Enforcement Officers) might not realize are important but they will have forgotten by the time their depositions are taken two or three years later. Where did the probes land? Don't assume that their standard report has enough information—it does not.

- □ Try to get eyewitness statements that address the rapidity with which the subject went from screaming, struggling, and yelling to unconscious, not breathing and pulseless. (Remember a respiratory death takes minutes, whereas a cardiac death takes only a few seconds.) Try to specifically determine the time sequence as clearly and carefully as possible in the early phase of the investigation. Advise LEOs to collect as much information about the passage from activity to unconsciousness as possible. The sequence of events for a sudden cardiac-arrest death as opposed to a respiratory death are markedly different and chronicling exactly what happened, how fast, when, and whether there was resistance, exertion, struggling, or fighting until "all of a sudden" or like a "light switch" things changed, can be the most important information.
- Get statements that include whether or not the subject could be heard to be breathing, screaming, yelling, or moaning throughout their confrontation against LEOs' efforts to capture, control, and restrain. Screaming and yelling require that air is moving over the vocal cords and demonstrate that at least some degree of ventilation had to take place. How much yelling and screaming?
- □ Debrief LEOs and witnesses regarding words and actions manifested by subject. Get details of patterns of walking, talking, gestures, facial expressions, breathing, pulse, etc. Ask interviewees to replay their memory with attention to DUI (Driving Under the Influence)/DRE (Drug Recognition Expert) type details. Sounds, even grunts, growls, and snarls, can be important. Get collaborative reports.
 - Was suspect growling? How?
 - Keening or wailing?
 - What words could you make out?
 - Huffing and puffing?
 - Sweating?
 - Drooling?
 - Eye movements?
 - Balance?
- □ If subject is only injured and survives, debrief as soon as possible about subjective feelings, thoughts, and drug effects. They were the only ones inside their bodies and looking out so ask how they saw and heard the world. Don't translate anything into your own words but describe mannerisms and expressions accompanying their descriptions.
- □ Sounds: Ask all witnesses to describe any unusual sounds they heard. If they describe sounds like "arcing" or "electrical short" there was probably a connection break and the suspect was not getting current delivered at that time. Even "clicking" heard in a noisy situation or from less than 10 feet in a quiet situation, is indicative of a broken connection. Like a car or refrigerator, when the TASER CEW is making noise, there is usually something wrong. Adverse witnesses love to go on about hearing the electrical noise, thinking they are hurting the police when the opposite is true.
- □ Blue lights or lighting: determine whether anyone saw "blue lights" or "lightning" in the LEO's hand. This indicates that the CEW is arcing at the CEW and not delivering an electrical charge to the person.

Evidence Collection

□ Photos, including contextual, of wounds, marks, etc., and CEW probe or drive-stun impacts with ruler.

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- Dependence of probe or drive-stun spread (i.e., with ruler).
- □ Keep the original CEW battery in the CEW (*do not remove*). This will maintain the integrity of the internal clock.
- Do not discard probes or wires (treat them as evidence). Do not let EMS place probes in "sharps" container as information can be gathered from the probes and wires as to whether or not they actually delivered current.
- Download CEW data as expeditiously as reasonable (at least within 48 hours) of the event and maintain evidentiary copy of download (including time drift and time drift correction).
- □ Collect two to three AFID (Anti-Felon Identification) tags and note their location; this will be helpful if multiple CEWs or cartridges were deployed.
- □ Collect all audio recordings. Computer analysis can differentiate between the "crackling" sound of a missed (or broken) connection and the "clicking" sound of a good connection. These recording sources may include:
 - Dash cameras
 - TASER CAM
 - TASER Axon
 - Tactical radio
 - 911 recordings
 - Witness mobile phones

Medical/Autopsy Data and Tissues

- □ All treatment records
 - EMS
 - Emergency department
- □ Autopsy report
- Autopsy microscopic slides (if any were prepared)
- □ Autopsy gross tissues (if any were retained)
 - Heart is especially useful
- □ Autopsy photos (it is just as important to determine that there is no mark or sign of injury on the body as it is to show what injuries did occur).

If the CEW Did Not Perform as Expected

- □ What was the failure or challenge?
- What was the subject wearing (especially multiple or thick layers or loose clothing)?
- □ Was the CEW dropped or subject to a high-moisture environment?
- \Box What were the operating conditions?
- □ Did the CEW fire?
- Did LEOs hear loud arcing—especially across the front of the CEW?
- Drive-stun or probe deployment?
- □ When was a last successful download or spark test done?

Excited Delirium Syndrome (ExDS) Features Checklist

"Key" ExDS epidemiological studies (6 300 000+ police-public interactions) include: Ross (2018)¹, Baldwin (2016)², Hall (2013)³, and others⁴. Numerous papers and book chapters recommend Conducted Energy Weapons (CEWs), in broad-probe spread deployment mode, to rapidly capture, restrain, and control ExDS^{1,2,5-10}.

Excited delirium or excited delirium syndrome (ExDS) is only one form of potential sudden death that law enforcement officers may encounter. Other potential causes of unexpected law enforcement temporal arrest-related deaths (ARDs) include, but are not limited to: sudden unexpected death in epilepsy (SUDEP)^{11,12}, sickle cell sudden death,¹³ various cardiomyopathies,¹⁴ drug induced arrhythmias (including those caused by alcohol^{15,16} and marijuana¹⁷⁻²⁰), psychiatric arrhythmias (whether due to schizophrenia²¹ or medications²²), severe coronary artery disease, and stress^{23,24}.

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Notes:

A syndrome is an aggregate of signs and symptoms that define a medical condition. Not all persons with a certain syndrome have all the same signs and symptoms. Not all cases of a syndrome result from the same cause. For example, some persons with carpal tunnel syndrome will have numbness and tingling, while others will have weakness and pain. Also, some persons with carpal tunnel syndrome will have it because of trauma, while others will have the syndrome because of pregnancy, diabetes, rheumatoid arthritis, or thyroid disease.

Persons with the excited delirium syndrome will have various combinations of some of the signs and symptoms listed above. The cause (etiology) of the excited delirium syndrome in any individual may be due to one or more of a number of conditions. The most common conditions are mental illness and illegal stimulant abuse (especially cocaine and methamphetamine).⁵²

Because the term "excited delirium syndrome" has not been widely used until recent years, many physicians do not recognize the term even though they may be very familiar with agitation and deaths due to drugs and other conditions.⁷⁵ It is important to avoid the distraction of the various terms that have been applied to this syndrome. For example, what is now referred to as excited delirium^{26-28,38,44,45,48,50-52,57-60,63,66,67,76-83} or agitated delirium^{53,69,84-129} has also been called: Bell's mania,⁴² acute exhaustive mania,¹³⁰ acute delirious mania,⁴² delirium grave,⁴² typhoma,⁴² acute delirium,⁴² manic-depressive exhaustion,³⁶ excited catatonia,¹⁰³ lethal catatonia,¹³¹ and neuroleptic malignant syndrome.

Statistical Confidence:

There must be at least 5 positive criteria to diagnose excite delirium syndrome. For 12 or more positive criteria the confidence level is at least 99.9%. For less than 12 positive criteria the confidence depends on the number of criteria for which information is available.

For example, the brain and hair tests are, unfortunately, typically not done. Often the blood tests for rhabdomyolysis is not done. In this case there will only be information on 19 criteria. If 8 of these 19 criteria were positive then the confidence in the diagnosis would be 93%.
