Narrative:

On Tuesday, March 24, 2026, at 1242 hours, Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI) Special Agent (SA) Douglas Burke (SA Burke) and SA Joe Lamping (SA Lamping) interviewed Parma Police Department (PPD) [REDACTED] who was accompanied by his attorney, Dan Leffler, from the Ohio Patrolmen's Benevolent Association (OPBA). The interview took place at 10147 Royalton Rd., North Royalton, OH, 44133, Ohio Patrolmen Benevolent Association Office (OPBA). The interview was audio and video recorded.

SA Burke read [REDACTED] the BCI Criminal Investigation Notification form. When SA Burke concluded the reading of this form to [REDACTED] signed and dated the BCI Criminal Notification Form without incident in the presence of OPBA Atty. Dan Leffler. SA Burke then signed the BCI Criminal Notification Form as a witness. The BCI Criminal Notification Form is attached to this report.

This report only summarizes the information deemed by the author to be of the most relevance to the investigation and does not purport to contain all questions and answers from the interview. Further, this report was placed in a chronology to aid the reader's overall understanding of the information elicited during the interview and may not be reflective of the actual sequencing of questions. It is suggested that the full recording be reviewed to clarify any content or contextual questions regarding the information from the interview.

SA Burke asked [REDACTED] if he had watched or reviewed any of his Body Worn Camera (BWC) or his Cruiser Dash Cam Footage which pertained to the Officer-Involved Critical Incident (OICI) in the area of Brookpark Rd., Brooklyn, OH on February 24, 2026. [REDACTED] stated he had not watched or reviewed any of the BWC or Cruiser Dash Cam Footage which pertained to the OICI on February 24, 2026. Throughout this investigation, it had been learned that the name of the involved subject was Ricardo Yuuki Davis (Ricardo).

SA Burke asked [REDACTED] how he received information about the welfare check of Ricardo. [REDACTED] had indicated a friend (Henry Siekaniec) of Ricardo's had called PPD Dispatch to conduct a welfare check on Ricardo. This had been due to a text message which Henry had received from Ricardo earlier on Tuesday, February 24, 2026, stating "Goodbye." [REDACTED] and another PPD Ofc. Jim Mack (Mack) then responded to the Knollwood Apartments, Apartment (Apt.) #8 where Ricardo had lived, to conduct a welfare check on Ricardo.

SA Burke asked [REDACTED] if he had any prior encounters with or had been familiar with Ricardo. [REDACTED] stated he was not familiar with Ricardo and had never been to Ricardo's apartment for any other law enforcement actions. Prior to attempting to

get into Ricardo's apartment, [REDACTED] and Ofc. Mack had been advised by PPD dispatch that PPD had been to Ricardo's apartment in the past for past suicidal attempts.

Upon arriving at the Knollwood Apartments where Ricardo lived, [REDACTED] and Ofc. Mack discussed how the two (2) were going to approach the situation with Ricardo. Once inside the apartment building and up the stairs to Ricardo's apartment door, [REDACTED] noticed two (2) pieces of notebook paper taped on the outside of Ricardo's apartment door. [REDACTED] stated the writing on the notebook paper had been worded, indicating some sort of suicide note from Ricardo, particularly stating **"Apologizing for being a lousy person, and things of that nature"** (17:03).

Once observing the suicide notes on the outside of Ricardo's apartment door, [REDACTED] and Ofc. Mack notified PPD Dispatch about what they had located. The PPD Ofcs. then attempted to contact neighbors in the surrounding apartments close to Ricardo's apartment to see if anyone had heard or seen anyone Ricardo recently.

Due to not finding anyone who had seen or heard from Ricardo, numerous loud knocks on Ricardo's door, and announcements through Ricardo's door were completed with no answer. PPD Ofcs. determined at some point they were going to have to make entry to Ricardo's apartment to check the well-being of Ricardo. Shortly thereafter, a maintenance member from the Knollwood Apartment Complex arrived to unlock the door to Ricardo's apartment so [REDACTED] and Ofc. Mack could go inside Ricardo's apartment to attempt to locate Ricardo.

Ricardo's door had been unlocked by the maintenance member. [REDACTED] and Ofc. Mack then searched for Ricardo in the apartment. After conducting a primary and secondary search of the apartment, Ricardo was not located. [REDACTED] stated that even though Ricardo was not located, further items of interest had been located within the apartment.

In the main living area of Ricardo's apartment, PPD Ofcs. had located personal effects, believed to be people's and possibly family members' names on particular personal effects. [REDACTED] said there had been a computer desk located in the main living area also which appeared to have another suicide note which stated in part, **"This is the information for my (Ricardo's) death certificate. He (Ricardo) had all of his information of his (Ricardo's) doctor and everything for his (Ricardo's) death certificate that we would've need for a death investigation"** (19:58).

Another important item that was located on the computer desk of Ricardo by [REDACTED] had been a receipt from Parma Armory for a Taurus handgun. [REDACTED] said he had radioed to PPD dispatch as to what had been located as far as the firearm receipt, the suicidal notes, death certificate information, etc., and the fact Ricardo had not been located inside the apartment. [REDACTED] also requested PPD dispatch to have Ricardo's license plate ran through a database called the **"FLOCK System"** and to put a **"Be On the Lookout" (BOLO)** out for Ricardo's well-being due to what had been located inside Ricardo's apartment. This information had also been transmitted to other PPD Ofcs. who were assisting in attempting to locate Ricardo. [REDACTED] stated, he also made it known to PPD Dispatch and the other PPD Ofcs., **"He (Ricardo) was potentially armed with a handgun because of the receipt that I [REDACTED] had found from Parma Armory"** (21:27).

Upon [REDACTED] giving all that information to PPD dispatch, PPD dispatch had advised [REDACTED], along with all the other PPD Ofcs., that Ricardo did have a Carry Conceal Weapon (CCW) License. However, the license had expired. [REDACTED] and Ofc. Mack walked to the parking lot of the Knollwood Apartment Complex to look for Ricardo's vehicle, a red Toyota Corolla. Ricardo's vehicle was not located in the apartment complex parking lot.

[REDACTED] advised PPD dispatch to attempt to start an "emergency ping" on Ricardo's cell phone so PPD Ofcs. could attempt to locate Ricardo. According to [REDACTED] Ofc. Mack had gone back to Ricardo's apartment to obtain correct cellular carrier information to start a cell phone ping on Ricardo's phone. [REDACTED] returned to his PPD cruiser to patrol the immediate area, Metro Park, other parking lot, etc. to attempt to locate Ricardo's vehicle.

Shortly thereafter, PPD Dispatch received information from the emergency cell phone pings on possible locations of Ricardo's whereabouts and transmitted that information to PPD Ofcs. According to [REDACTED] Ofc. Chris Smith (Smith) had radioed to PPD

dispatch and other PPD Ofcs. that Ofc. Smith had possibly located Ricardo's vehicle leaving the parking lot of Wal-Mart on Brookpark Rd. [REDACTED] overheard the radio traffic about Ofc. Smith trying to conduct a traffic stop on Ricardo's vehicle and the vehicle was not stopping for Ofc. Smith's lights or sirens. At that time, [REDACTED] activated his emergency lights and siren on his PPD Cruiser and responded to the immediate area of Ofc. Smith's location on Brookpark Rd.

Upon arriving in the area of Brookpark Rd. where Ofc. Smith had attempted to conduct a traffic stop of Ricardo's vehicle, [REDACTED] (traveling westbound on Brookpark Rd.) located Ofc. Smith and [REDACTED], now stopped on Brookpark Rd. in front of the IHOP Restaurant. [REDACTED] stated the way Ofc. Smith and [REDACTED] had placed their PPD cruisers, it had appeared as though they were conducting a felony traffic stop of Ricardo's vehicle. [REDACTED] explained the way [REDACTED] had positioned his PPD cruiser upon arrival.

[REDACTED] started to exit his cruiser and had noticed Ricardo reaching in the backseat for something.

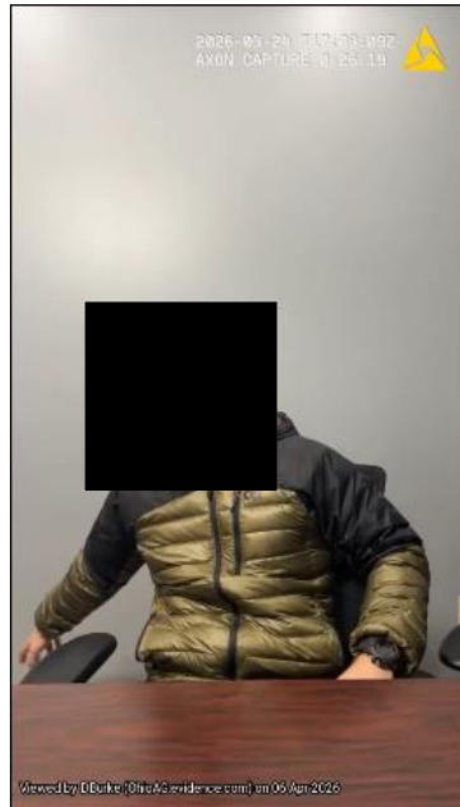

[REDACTED] said he did not know and could not tell what Ricardo had been reaching for in the backseat of Ricardo's vehicle. Once out of the [REDACTED] PPD cruiser, [REDACTED] stated he heard Ofc. Smith transmit over the radio, **"He's (Ricardo) reaching for something"** (26:26). [REDACTED] stated, **"Drew my [REDACTED] firearm, pointed it at the driver's side door"** (26:32). [REDACTED] explained, after Ricardo had reached in the backseat, Ricardo had been facing forward in the driver's seat of Ricardo's vehicle, **"Giving a thousand-yard stare. He (Ricardo) was not looking around, he (Ricardo) had sunglasses on, but it appeared he (Ricardo) was frozen in this position"** (26:51).

According to [REDACTED], the next thing [REDACTED] noticed, Ricardo abruptly **"Flung the door open, driver's side door open, and he (Ricardo) exited the vehicle and turned immediately to his (Ricardo's) six o'clock (east) facing head-on with [REDACTED] and Ofc. Smith"** (27:08). [REDACTED] stated he did not observe or notice Ricardo stop to look at or observe [REDACTED] at any time when Ricardo had exited his vehicle.

[REDACTED] next stated he, **"Noticed a tan colored Taurus looking handgun, in his (Ricardo) right hand, and he (Ricardo) was holding it down by his right leg"** (27:42). PPD Ofcs. called out, **"He (Ricardo) had a gun, and he (Ricardo) began walking eastbound directly toward [REDACTED] and Ofc. Smith with the gun in his (Ricardo's) hand"** (27:53).

According to [REDACTED] "I fired my duty weapon, and the male (Ricardo), from what I ([REDACTED]) recall slumped forward and fell facedown onto the pavement" (28:11).

At that time, [REDACTED] stated he and other PPD Ofcs. closed in on Ricardo. Upon closing in on Ricardo, [REDACTED] stated a PPD Ofc. (could not recall which Ofc.) had "kicked" the firearm Ricardo had in Ricardo's possession away from the immediate area of Ricardo. Ricardo had been secured (placed in handcuffs) by PPD Ofcs., assessed for gunshot wounds, and PPD Ofcs. began to render aid to Ricardo.

The area on Brookpark RD. began to become congested with vehicle traffic, so [REDACTED] repositioned his PPD cruiser for traffic control reasons. Once re-positioning [REDACTED] PPD cruiser, he then went back to where PPD Ofcs. had been rendering aid to Ricardo. [REDACTED] stated he specifically assisted placing tourniquet(s) to Ricardo's right leg. Shortly thereafter, Parma Fire Department (PFD) arrived on scene,

loaded Ricardo onto a flat board (gurney) and took Ricardo to the hospital. [REDACTED]
[REDACTED] then removed himself from the immediate area of the scene.

SA Burke asked [REDACTED] why he decided to discharge his service weapon toward Ricardo. [REDACTED] said, **"I perceived the subject (Ricardo) being a threat to not only myself, but other officers and potentially citizens. Once he (Ricardo) began advancing on the other officers, that's when I ([REDACTED]) decided to fire my weapon."** (32:39) SA Burke asked [REDACTED] if [REDACTED] was in fear of his life and the lives of others because of Ricardo's actions. [REDACTED] said, **"Yes."** SA Burke asked [REDACTED] how many rounds [REDACTED] believed he fired towards Ricardo. [REDACTED] said he believed he fired seven (7) rounds at Ricardo. SA Burke asked [REDACTED] what he believed the distance had been when [REDACTED] fired his weapon at Ricardo and [REDACTED] believed the distance to be approximately thirty (30) to thirty-five (35) feet.

SA Burke asked [REDACTED] whether, upon exiting his cruiser, he had any opportunity to order Ricardo to drop the weapon which Ricardo in his right hand before firing his service weapon. [REDACTED] replied, **"No"** (34:05 [REDACTED] explained that, based on his training and experience on felony traffic stops, only one (1) officer should issue commands to avoid confusing the subject. SA Burke then asked [REDACTED] if [REDACTED] if he had heard any other PPD Ofcs. order Ricardo to **"drop"** the weapon [REDACTED] stated he remembered hearing [REDACTED] say, **"Drop the gun"** (34:39).

SA Burke asked [REDACTED] about rendering aid to Ricardo, after the OICI. [REDACTED] stated he had approached Ricardo with caution, noticed the gun Ricardo had in Ricardo's right hand during the OICI had been "kicked" away from the immediate area of Ricardo. [REDACTED] said he noticed numerous other PPD Ofcs. securing (with handcuffs), assessing, then rendering aid to Ricardo. Furthermore, [REDACTED] said that Brookpark Rd. was a highly traveled roadway, so he went to re-position his PPD cruiser to block traffic. [REDACTED] then went back to assist in rendering aid to Ricardo, specifically assisting with tourniquet placement on Ricardo's right leg.

SA Burke asked [REDACTED] if the actions he had taken during the OICI were consistent with his law enforcement officer training. [REDACTED] said, **"Yes"** (35:40).

SA Burke asked [REDACTED] if [REDACTED] believed he had fired his service weapon at Ricardo first (1st) or if [REDACTED] believed [REDACTED] had fired his service weapon first (1st) at Ricardo during the OICI. [REDACTED] stated, **"From how I ([REDACTED]) remembered it, it was simultaneously. I ([REDACTED]) couldn't tell you who pulled the trigger first"** (36:02). SA Burke asked [REDACTED] if he could recall Ricardo making any comments to PPD Ofcs. while in his vehicle, as he exited his

vehicle, when he approached Ofc. Smith and [REDACTED], or while PPD Ofcs. rendered aid to Ricardo. [REDACTED] said that Ricardo never made any statements or comments to anyone before, during, or after the OICI.

SA Burke asked [REDACTED] if he had experienced any tunnel vision or time distortion throughout the OICI and [REDACTED] said he did not. SA Burke asked [REDACTED] if [REDACTED] felt he had acted within the Use of Force Policy of the PPD during the OICI and [REDACTED] replied, **"Yes"** (37:36).

SA Lamping asked [REDACTED] if he had been made aware of the method(s) of the prior suicide attempts of Ricardo prior to arriving at Ricardo's apartment on Tuesday, February 24, 2026. [REDACTED] stated he had not been made aware of Ricardo's prior suicidal method(s). SA Lamping asked [REDACTED] about his plan of action responding to Ricardo's apartment, due to the nature of the call (welfare check). [REDACTED] had explained what PPD Ofcs. had anticipated doing once at Ricardo's apartment. Upon noticing the suicidal notes posted on Ricardo's door, this had heightened [REDACTED] thought process on how to approach the involvement of Ricardo. [REDACTED] initially believed Ricardo would be located deceased within Ricardo's apartment. Then upon searching the inside of Ricardo's apartment and not locating Ricardo inside the apartment, but locating further suicidal indicators inside Ricardo's apartment, [REDACTED] thought Ricardo may have gone elsewhere to carry out Ricardo's intentions of suicide.

SA Lamping asked as [REDACTED] had read through the suicidal notes left by Ricardo, had there been any indication Ricardo had planned a **"suicide by cop"** scenario and [REDACTED] replied, **"No"** (39:22).

Lastly, SA Burke asked [REDACTED] if he believed Ricardo had ever fired the firearm Ricardo had in his right hand. [REDACTED] stated, **"I ([REDACTED]) do not recall if he (Ricardo) fired his firearm"** (39:37).
