Narrative:

On March 3, 2025, at approximately 1014 hours, Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI) Special Agents Dave Hornyak and Steve Seitzman interviewed Lieutenant Marcos Rodriguez of the Piqua Police Department relative to the officer-involved critical incident that occurred on February 21, 2025, at 236 McKinley Avenue, Piqua, Ohio. The interview took place at the Piqua Police Department. Also present for the interview was Attorney Joe Hegedus, legal counsel for Lt. Rodriguez. The purpose of the interview was to obtain all relevant information of the incident known or observed by this individual.

Prior to the interview, Mr. Hegedus cooperatively informed the agents that he would only allow Lt. Rodriguez to be interviewed if the interview were to be audio recorded only, and not video recorded. In order to accomplish the interview on Mr. Hegedus' terms, through the Piqua Police Department, the agents arranged for the interview to be conducted in a non-recorded meeting room in the city building.

Immediately prior to the interview, the agents provided Lt. Rodriguez and Mr. Hegedus with a copy of the BCI Criminal Investigation Notification form, asking them to review and have Lt. Rodriguez sign if they wanted to proceed with the interview. Lt. Rodriguez reviewed and signed the form in the presence of Mr. Hegedus and returned it to the agents.

Lt. Rodriguez verified that he was voluntarily attending the interview and then provided the following information:

Lt. Rodriguez has specialty training in Crisis Intervention Training (CIT), Hostage Negotiation training, and has completed the 2-week OPOTA Basic Training Instructor course. He has worked as a hostage negotiator for the Piqua/Sidney joint regional SWAT team and has been with the team for approximately five years.

Prior to February 21, 2025, he had one previous encounter with David West, the subject who died during the officer-involved critical incident. During that previous encounter, Lt. Rodriguez responded to West's then-residence on Broadway in Piqua. Lt. Rodriguez recalls this as having occurred in the summertime approximately two years ago. The extent of the encounter involved Lt. Rodriguez speaking with West from outside the residence through a window. West remained inside during the entire encounter and the police left the residence without further incident.

Lt. Rodriguez is aware that West had previously threatened "Job and Family Services," had reported his child as being kidnapped, and had received a criminal charge that resulted in him being sent to a mental health facility in Toledo, Ohio, for multiple weeks. Lt. Rodriguez also verified that West had never previously assaulted him.

Lt. Rodriguez stated that, on February 21, 2025, he was working

He was well-rested and had not consumed any alcohol in approximately multiple months. He was in a standard PPD uniform, which was well-marked identifying him as a police officer. He was armed with his Sig Sauer 320 9mm duty pistol and was also carrying a Taser, pepper spray, and a baton.

Shortly before 1700 hours, a domestic call was received involving David West. Lt. Rodriguez believed he was going to end up at the call "one way or another" and responded to 236

McKinley. Prior to the incident, Lt. Rodriguez had believed that West still resided at the property on Broadway and did not associate him with the McKinley address.

At the residence, Lt. Rodriguez activated his body-worn camera (BWC). After noticing that it appeared not to be working, Lt. Rodriguez activated a video recording from his cell phone and placed it in his vest pocket with the camera facing out in order to ensure the incident was properly documented. (<u>Agent's Note</u>: On the evening of February 21, 2025, hours after the incident, Lt. Rodriguez's labor attorney Joe Hegedus reported this to BCI investigators and provided the cell phone; however, when BWC video was later provided by PPD, it was found that Lt. Rodriguez's BWC had been functioning properly and had fully recorded the incident.)

Other PPD officers responding to the domestic situation were Officers Adam Kimpel, Hunter Mote, and Jackson Heath. Inside the residence, David West's mother (Tammy West) informed officers that West had shoved her with "...a two-hand shove." West's father told officers that West was armed with a pepper ball gun. Mrs. West told officers that West had "...some sort of Taser gun." After the parents told officers that West was in the basement, Lt. Rodriguez and other officers went to the basement door. As they first began moving downstairs, West announced to officers that he had a pistol. The officers then held at the top of the stairs and Lt. Rodriguez began giving orders for West to "come out." Lt. Rodriguez stated that the first time he saw West, West moved toward the stairs and the lower part of his torso was visible, but not his hands. Lt. Rodriguez said that due to this posture, he assumed West had a weapon in his hands and began giving commands for West, specifically saying, "Put the gun down. Put the gun down." Lt. Rodriguez said he then told his fellow officers what he had seen just before West appeared again and displayed what looked to be a handgun pointed up the stairs at Lt. Rodriguez. Lt. Rodriguez said that, in response, he fired four rounds at West who then disappeared into the basement.

Lt. Rodriguez stated that he called out to West multiple times with no response before hearing what sounded to be a snoring noise that Lt. Rodriguez knows to be associated with "agonal" or labored breathing. Lt. Rodriguez said that, knowing he had struck West with gunfire, he made the decision to go down the basement where he then found West lying on the far end of the basement floor with what looked to be a handgun at his feet. Lt. Rodriguez "kicked that away" and instructed Officer Heath to "glove up" and begin CPR on West. Lt. Rodriguez then went upstairs giving further instruction from there until Officer Marrs arrived, became the officer-in-charge. Due to being the officer involved in the shooting, Lt. Rodriguez then placed himself out-of-service.

In response to questions from the agents, Lt. Rodriguez said that at the beginning of the direct encounter, he was positioned on the left side of the basement doorway and that the basement opened up to the right. Lt. Rodriguez said he assumed that West had a real firearm because West had specifically announced to officers that he had "...a gun." Lt. Rodriguez acknowledged that even though West's family members had stated that West was only armed with less-lethal weapon, officers had no way of being certain that the pistol brandished by West was not an actual firearm.

When Lt. Rodriguez did first see the gun in West's hands, it looked to Lt. Rodriguez to be a black, semi-automatic handgun. When West pointed the gun at Lt. Rodriguez, West used a two-handed grip with both arms fully extended and pointed up the stairs "directly" at Lt.

Rodriguez.

Lt. Rodriguez said he fired at West when he first came to believe that his own life was in danger and that West was about to shoot him. Lt. Rodriguez said he stopped firing when "...the threat was gone." Lt. Rodriguez acknowledged that he had no way of knowing for certain whether or not West was still a deadly threat when he went downstairs to check on him. Lt. Rodriguez stated that, due to believing West was armed with a real firearm, it was necessary for the primary officer to have his duty weapon out instead of beginning with a less-lethal option. Lt. Rodriguez stated that it could be appropriate for a secondary officer to be ready with a less-lethal option, but that the layout of this situation did not allow officers the opportunity to attempt to deploy a less-lethal tool. Specifically, Lt. Rodriguez stated that he did not believe other officers could even see West from their positions on the other side of the doorway. Had they been able to see West, Lt. Rodriguez stated that the distance would also have been an impediment to deploying a Taser.

Near the beginning of the BCI interview, Lt. Rodriguez informed the agents that he had seen his BWC video and having watched it, would not have done anything different during the encounter. The interview then terminated at approximately 1053 hours.

The interview was recorded on a handheld digital recording device. This report is a summary only. The entire interview can be reviewed on the recording.




