  - EMS Run Sheet- When a run sheet created and maintained by a county emergency medical services (EMS) organization documents treatment of a living patient, the EMS organization may redact information that pertains to the patient's medical history, diagnosis, prognosis, or medical condition R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(a), and physician-patient privilege R.C.149.43(A)(1)(v), R.C. 2317.02(B), *State ex rel. Nix v. Cleveland*, 83 Ohio St.3d 379 (1998).
- <u>Telephone number of witnesses</u>- Telephone numbers of victims or witnesses to a crime that are listed on a law enforcement record or report, pursuant to R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(mm)
- <u>Sealed search warrant or court records-have</u> been withheld pursuant to *Pepper Pike v. Doe*, 66 Ohio St.2d 374, 376 (1981) and R.C.149.43(A)(1)(v)
