- Dates of employment with PD- Confidential Law Enforcement Investigatory Records (CLEIRS), pursuant to R.C. 149.43(A)(2)(a)-(d) Records pertain to a law enforcement matter and disclosure would create a high probability of revealing: The identity of an uncharged suspect, R.C. 149.43(A)(2)(a)
- Work shift-Confidential Law Enforcement Investigatory Records (CLEIRS), pursuant to R.C. 149.43(A)(2)(a)-(d) Records pertain to a law enforcement matter and disclosure would create a high probability of revealing: The identity of an uncharged suspect, R.C. 149.43(A)(2)(a). Also redacted under R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(uu). Records of the past, current, and future work schedule of a designated public service worker. As used in division (A)(1)(uu) of this section, 'work schedule' does not include the docket of cases of a court, judge, or magistrate.
- Days Off- Confidential Law Enforcement Investigatory Records (CLEIRS), pursuant to R.C. 149.43(A)(2)(a)-(d) Records pertain to a law enforcement matter and disclosure would create a high probability of revealing: The identity of an uncharged suspect, R.C. 149.43(A)(2)(a)of an uncharged suspect, R.C. 149.43(A)(2)(a). Also redacted under R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(uu). Records of the past, current, and future work schedule of a designated public service worker. As used

- Medical Records- 149.43(A)(1)(a). Information obtained from medical records redacted. R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(a).
- Victim’s Rights aka Marsy’s Law (name, address, phone number, and family member names), and 149.43(A)(1)(ii)(i). Victim's Rights O.R.C. 149.43 (A)(1)(rr) records, documents, and information the release of which is prohibited under sections R.C. 2930.04 and R.C. 2930.07. Crime victims are provided certain rights detailed in the Ohio Constitution Article I, Section 10(a) and the Ohio Revised Code, often called “Marsy’s Law” or the Ohio Crime Victims’ Bill of Rights.
- Photos of victim redacted per Ohio R.C.149.43 (A)(1)(ii). Any depiction by photograph, film, videotape, or printed or digital image under either of the following circumstances: (i) The depiction is that of a victim of an offense the release of which would be, to a reasonable person of ordinary sensibilities, an offensive and objectionable intrusion into the victim's expectation of bodily privacy and integrity. Due to their highly sensitive nature, photos of the victim at the scene of the death have been withheld.

- Driver’s license number-R.C. 149.45(A)(1)(C)18 U.S.C. § 2741, Driver’s license numbers are considered personal information, exempt from disclosure, pursuant to R.C. 149.45(A)(1)(c), and are further protected from disclosure by the Driver’s Privacy Protection Act of 1994. 18 U.S.C. § 2741.
- ATF Reports - Records from ATF Trace Reports redacted - Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2005, Pub. L. No. 108-477, 118 Stat. 2809, 2859 (2004); Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2008, Pub. L. No. 110-161, 121 Stat. 2859 (2004); *Higgins v. U.S. Dept. of Justice*, 919 F. Supp.2d 131, 144-45 (D.D.C. 2013).
- Law Enforcement firearm serial number – serial number of law enforcement firearm redacted under R.C. 149.433.
- Telephone numbers of witnesses and victims contained on a law enforcement record or report – R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(mm).

- EMS Run Sheet- When a run sheet created and maintained by a county emergency medical services (EMS) organization documents treatment of a living patient, the EMS organization may redact information that pertains to the patient's medical history, diagnosis, prognosis, or medical condition R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(a), and physician-patient privilege R.C.149.43(A)(1)(v), R.C. 2317.02(B), *State ex rel. Nix v. Cleveland*, 83 Ohio St.3d 379 (1998).
- Law enforcement incident number. Records pertain to a law enforcement matter and disclosure would create a high probability of revealing: the identity of uncharged suspect, R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(h) and (A)(2)(a).
- PII (confidential personal information)- Personal information as defined by Ohio Revised Code Chapter 1347 is not a public record pursuant to R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(v) and Federal Privacy Act of 1974.
- Any complaint numbers-including officer's name on report- Confidential Law Enforcement Investigatory Records (CLEIRS), pursuant to R.C. 149.43(A)(2)(a)-(d) Records pertain to a law enforcement matter and disclosure would create a high probability of revealing: The identity of an uncharged suspect, R.C. 149.43(A)(2)(a)
- Employee ID numbers withheld pursuant to R.C. 1306.23, R.C.149.433 (2) and (3). Employee ID numbers are not public record, pursuant to R.C. 149.433 (2) and (3). See also *Jones v. Dept. of Youth Servs.*, 2024-Ohio-815, ¶ 10 (Ct. of Cl.).
- Any partners names and other identifying information- Confidential Law Enforcement Investigatory Records (CLEIRS), pursuant to R.C. 149.43(A)(2)(a)-(d) Records pertain to a law enforcement matter and disclosure would create a high probability of revealing: The identity of an uncharged suspect, R.C. 149.43(A)(2)(a)
- Autopsy photos & reports- Autopsy photographs and reports, redacted pursuant to R.C. 313.10(D) Information obtained from medical records redacted - R.C. 149.43(A)(1)(a).
- Grand jury records withheld – Ohio Criminal Rule 6(E).
- Records obtained via sealed search warrant redacted - R.C. 149.43 (A)(1)(v).
- Ohio Police & Fire Pension Fund Personal History forms - R.C. 742.41(B).
- Employment benefit deductions and beneficiary information is a non-record.
- Tax records are redacted under 26 U.S.C. 6103, R.C. 5747.18; R.C. 718.13.
